National Library of Nigeria Marks World Read Aloud Day Across Nigeria

The National Library of Nigeria on Wednesday 4th of February 2026 commemorated the 2026 World Read Aloud Day with a series of literacy-focused programmes held at its Headquarters in Abuja and across State Branches nationwide.

Speaking before the commencement of the reading session which held in the boardroom at the headquarter, the National Librarian and Chief Executive Officer, Professor Chinwe Veronica Anunobi, shared personal experiences of storytelling during her childhood, describing how such moments strengthened family bonds and nurtured a lifelong love for reading.

Prof. Anunobi emphasized that reading aloud improves pronunciation, listening skills and social interaction, stimulates curiosity and problem-solving abilities, and promotes empathy through shared emotional experiences found in books. The event featured readings from selected books in various Nigerian indigenous languages, with interpretations provided for participants.

Earlier in his welcome address, the Director of Public Services, Mr. Kehinde Ojo, explained that World Read Aloud Day, founded in 2010 and observed globally on the first Wednesday of February, promotes literacy and the joy of reading. He noted that reading aloud encourages vocabulary development, word recognition, listening comprehension, empathy and cultural understanding, particularly when introduced from early childhood.

National Library Commemorates International Mother Language Day Nationwide

The National Library of Nigeria on Monday, February 23, 2026, commemorated the International Mother Language Day at its headquarters and across its branches nationwide, with a renewed call for the preservation and promotion of indigenous languages. Speaking at the headquarters, the National Librarian/Chief Executive Officer, Professor Chinwe Veronica Anunobi, expressed concern over the steady decline of indigenous languages globally. She warned that many languages are facing gradual extinction due to neglect and reduced intergenerational transmission.

Addressing the theme, "Youth Voices on Multilingual Education," Prof. Anunobi emphasized the critical role of parents in reversing the trend. She urged them to deliberately speak indigenous languages at home and encourage their children to learn and use them confidently.

She further charged members of staff, particularly young professionals, to serve as ambassadors of multilingual education by promoting and preserving their native languages.

Across the country, State Branches of the National Library of Nigeria organized similar programmes to mark the day.

In Abia State, the Branch celebrated World Read Aloud Day on 5 February 2026 at School Road Primary School, Umuahia, with pupils from Urban Primary School 1, School Road Primary School and City Road Primary School.

Pupils were sensitized on the origin and benefits of reading aloud by Mr. Efoli Ikpe Enang., while Mrs. Joseph Eberechukwu. read aloud from A Friend Worth Having and Other Stories. Two pupils from each school also read aloud during the session. Book gifts were presented to participants, with special recognition given to Nwoha Excellent from School Road Primary School.

In Benue State, the Branch marked the 2026 World Read Aloud Day on 5 February 2026 at ECWA Primary and Secondary School, Makurdi. Students used their English readers thereby ensuring each child had a copy and participated and read aloud in small groups alongside staff and teachers.

The Head of Branch, Ms. Patience Kersha encouraged regular library visits and lifelong reading habits. She also requested, they read books by Chinua Achebe, Chimamanda Adichie and several others at different levels of their lives for a better understanding of the same text as they grow older. Thus, making reading a continual lifelong learning.

The Ebonyi State Branch commemorated the day on 4 February 2026 with the Association of Heads of Federal Establishments at the Old Government House, Abakaliki, under the theme "Celebrate Learning." The programme highlighted reading aloud as a brain-building tool and provided an opportunity to educate participants on the functions and services of the National Library of Nigeria.

In Enugu State, the celebration took place at the Branch Office In Independence Layout, Enugu with pupils from CornerStone Primary School and JuliaGee Secondary School.

The Head of Branch, Mrs. Onyekachi Essien reiterated the history and importance of World Read Aloud Day; while reading sessions and a word-power test were anchored by library staff Mrs. Igwe Ogbonna using the book Happy Christmas by Prince Chukwuma.

The Kaduna State Branch celebrated the day with students of EL-BIHAJO Academy Nursery, Primary and College under the theme "Celebrate Learning." The event held at the branch office, Activities which included storytelling, poetry, songs in Hausa and Fulfulde, library orientation and a guided tour of the facility.

The head of branch, Mrs. Martina Egwuibe donated books to the school library.

In Lagos State, the Branch marked the Day on 4 February 2026 at Ever Green Royal School, Onike, Yaba with Pupils educated on the origin and benefits of reading aloud. Several Participants took turns to read from different books with Mrs.

Agwunobi Chidimma reading from The Brave Boy. One of the pupils, Precious also read aloud. Book gifts were presented to pupils who answered questions correctly and to the school library.

The Nasarawa State Branch commemorated the World Read Aloud Day at Kaka Maina School of Science and Arabic Studies, Lafia, with the participation of students, teachers, and library staff.

In her opening remarks, the Head of Branch, Mrs. Angela Anya, highlighted the history and significance of World Read Aloud Day. She identified the three essential components of reading aloud as a book, a reader, and a listener. She further emphasized that reading aloud enhances vocabulary, improves comprehension, builds confidence, boosts academic performance, and promotes lifelong learning.



The read-aloud session was facilitated by Mrs. Jighjigh-Abeda Janet, Librarian I, using the book What Goes Around by Paul Ugha. Students actively participated in discussions and question-and-answer sessions designed to assess their understanding of the text. Additionally, three students were selected to read aloud from the same book, demonstrating their reading skills and building confidence.

The programme also featured a library awareness session, during which participants were educated on the services offered by the National Library of Nigeria, Lafia Branch. Reading materials and educational items were presented to the school and to outstanding students. In appreciation, a student presented a graphic award to the Head of Branch.

The principal of the school, Mr. Sadiq, delivered the vote of thanks, commending the National Library of Nigeria for the initiative. The programme concluded with a closing prayer, and the school's newly established book club was officially named the Kaka Maina Book Club.

In Niger State, the Branch marked the day at Meema Nursery, Primary and Secondary School, Minna.

The Head of Branch, Mrs. Christianah Ogunmade., introduced the library team and sensitized students on the importance of libraries. A chapter from Always Obey Your Teachers was read aloud, followed by interactive comprehension exercises. Stationery items and refreshments were distributed to students.

The Ogun State Branch, in collaboration with the Abeokuta North National Association of Proprietors of Private Schools Readers Club, hosted pupils and students from several schools at the National Library of Nigeria, Ake, Abeokuta North. Activities included a children's read-aloud relay, interactive sessions, guided library tours and the presentation of certificates to participants.

In Osun State, the Branch celebrated World Read Aloud Day at Union Baptist Church Model School. The programme featured reading-aloud sessions, storytelling, competitions, book exhibitions, a guided library visit and the donation of reading materials to the school library. The school management expressed appreciation for the initiative.

The Taraba State Branch commemorated the day at the National Library premises in Jalingo with students from Government Technical Training School.

The Head of Branch, Mrs. Rhoda Aranda, read aloud The Animal in You, while students participated in reading sessions, quizzes and received book gifts.

Through the coordinated celebrations at the Headquarters and across its State Branches, the National Library of Nigeria reaffirmed its commitment to promoting literacy, encouraging a reading culture and advancing lifelong learning in line with global best practices.

Nasarawa State Branch Receives Visitors.

The Nasarawa State Branch of the National Library of Nigeria, Lafia, on February 2, 2026, received the Editor of EggonNews, Lafia, Mr. Matthew Kuju, and former Permanent Secretary of the Nasarawa State Universal Basic Education Board (NSUBEB). “Speak your mother tongue with pride. Document it. Teach it, digitize it, and celebrate it,” she said.

Also speaking at the event, Ms. Yachat Nuhu, a representative of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, highlighted the global importance of preserving indigenous languages as a means of safeguarding cultural diversity and promoting inclusive education. She noted that UNESCO continues to support initiatives aimed at encouraging mother-tongue instruction, strengthening local content development, and empowering communities to sustain their linguistic heritage.

The ceremony featured cultural displays, including the rendition of poems, folktales, and proverbs in various Nigerian languages such as Igbo, Tiv, Hausa, Igbira, and Yoruba, reflecting the country’s rich linguistic diversity.

International Mother Language Day is celebrated globally every February 21. The observance was proclaimed by UNESCO in 1999 and formally recognized by the United Nations in 2002. It originated from the 1952 Bengali Language Movement in Bangladesh, which advocated for the recognition of the Bengali language and the protection of linguistic rights.



The National Library of Nigeria began commemorating the event in 2022, in alignment with Agenda II of Prof. Anunobi’s Eight-Point Agenda, aimed at promoting literacy, cultural heritage, and national development.

Bauchi

The celebration held at the Bauchi State Branch premises brought together library staff, students, and teachers under the leadership of the Head of Branch, Dr. Regina Olohiliye Ngorngor. Activities included reading sessions in indigenous languages, storytelling sessions, a spelling bee competition, and the presentation of gifts to participating schools. In her keynote address, Dr. Ngorngor emphasized that the mother tongue is the foundation of identity, culture, and intellectual development, urging parents, educators, and stakeholders to ensure children

learn and speak their native languages.

The Enugu State Branch, in collaboration with Otu Igbo Efula, hosted a vibrant cultural programme attended by students and teachers from Queens School, Enugu; Uwani Secondary School, Enugu; and seven other participating schools, alongside traditional rulers, professors, and representatives of the state government and Ministry of Education. Activities featured an Igbo proverb competition titled “Asomumpi n’Ilu Igbo,” traditional dance performances (Egwu Odinala), and educational talks. The programme emphasized youth participation in preserving indigenous languages, with Queens School emerging first and Uwani Secondary School placing second.

At the Kwara State Branch in Ilorin, the celebration involved students and teachers from Glory G. Great Academy. The Acting Head of Branch, Mr. Mustapha U.A., addressed participants on the importance of mother languages as tools for personal growth and national development. Mrs. Grace Umeh, the school’s proprietress, read a storybook in Igbo, while a corps member presented another in Yoruba. The students were also taken on a guided tour of the library to explore collections of indigenous language materials, reinforcing the role of language in unity and cultural preservation.

The Lagos State Branch celebrated the event in collaboration with Walnut Publishing Limited and Everything Literature, bringing together students from Oke Odo Junior High School, Aje Comprehensive Junior High School, All Nations Shalom Nursery & Primary School, Mobalaji Bank Anthony Junior School, Wesley Girls Junior School, Systems College, Christ Divine Favour College, Evergreen Royal Private School, Sovereign Lord International Academy, and Aunty May Primary School. The programme featured traditional dances, playlets, and spoken word performances in indigenous languages. The event encouraged students to embrace their linguistic heritage and promoted cultural pride and awareness.

The celebration at the Nasarawa State Branch in Lafia drew participation from staff, parents, library users, and members of the public. Led by the Head of Branch, Mrs. Angela Anya, the programme included a road walk to create awareness, cultural displays with staff dressed in various ethnic attires such as Eggon, Tiv, Igbo, Hausa, Kanuri, and Yoruba, drama presentations in indigenous languages, and a book exhibition featuring languages such as Eggon, Alago, Rindre, Mada, Tiv, and others. An interactive session with a library user highlighted the real-life impact of language loss, prompting a renewed commitment to teaching indigenous languages to future generations.

Mrs. Anya emphasized the need for parents and educators to actively promote mother tongues.

The Ogun State Branch marked the day through outreach and in-house activities involving students and teachers from Wisdom Light International School, Obantoko, and Nikky Ade Memorial Nursery and Primary School. The Head of Branch, Dr. Abosede Katumi Sangosanya, led the engagement, encouraging pupils to take pride in their native languages and warning against the neglect of indigenous languages due to foreign influence. Activities included poetry recitations, storytelling sessions, and cultural displays, all reinforcing the importance of language in preserving identity and heritage.

The Osun State Branch commemorated the event at its premises through an exhibition of books and reference materials promoting indigenous languages. The exhibition attracted library users and stakeholders and highlighted the importance of documentation and accessibility in preserving linguistic heritage and promoting multilingual education.

The Plateau State Branch, in collaboration with the Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL), celebrated the day with students, teachers, university lecturers, and representatives from the Ministry of Education. The programme featured a road walk, educational talks, and storytelling sessions in indigenous languages such as Ngas, Mwaghavul, Berom, and Hausa. A translation exercise from Hausa to English further demonstrated the relevance of multilingual education. The event emphasized the integration of indigenous languages into formal education and the vital role of youth in sustaining linguistic diversity.



The 2026 International Mother Language Day celebration by the National Library of Nigeria recorded significant participation across Abuja and its state branches, with schools, cultural organizations, and community stakeholders actively engaged.

Through storytelling, competitions, exhibitions, performances, and public sensitization, the celebrations delivered a unified message on the urgent need to preserve indigenous languages. The involvement of young people, in particular, underscored a renewed commitment to ensuring that Nigeria’s rich linguistic heritage is not only protected but continuously passed on to future generations as a vital instrument of identity, unity, and national development.

Kaduna Branch Marks International Day of Education

The Kaduna State Branch, on Tuesday, 27th January 2026, celebrated the International Day of Education with a programme themed “The Power of Youth in Co-Creating Education.” The event, originally slated for 24th January, was rescheduled due to the date falling on a weekend.

The International Day of Education is aimed at underscoring education as a fundamental human right and highlighting the critical role of youth and libraries in promoting inclusive, equitable, and sustainable education in Nigeria.

Speaking during the opening ceremony, the Head of Branch (HOB), Mrs. Martina Egwuibe, emphasized the significance of the International Day of Education, noting that empowering young people through education remains central to national development and reaffirmed the commitment of the National Library of Nigeria to supporting access to quality education.



The ceremony included a panel discussion bringing together authors, publishers, journalists, librarians, and education professionals. The panel deliberated extensively on the theme, focusing on youth participation in education, challenges within the Nigerian education system, inclusivity, digital learning, and the role of libraries in national development.

A paper titled “Uses, Importance, and Roles of Libraries in Education” was presented by Gora Rahila Chirai, a Librarian. The presentation highlighted the contributions of libraries to learning, research, literacy development, and digital education, stressing their relevance in the evolving educational landscape.

Students from Nabeela Academy, Mufnaj International School, Betty Queen International School, and St. Michael Schools were among the participating audience. Highlights of the students’ presentations included the rendition of the National Anthem in Sign Language by students of Nabeela Academy, a spoken word performance on education by Mufnaj International School, and an inter-school debate on the topic “Science is Better than Arts.”

As part of efforts to support school libraries and encourage reading culture, the brand donated books to all participating schools, while students who took part in the various activities also received books.

A total of 93 Participants Included students, school management representatives, panelists, media personnel, National Library staff, corps members, IT students, and Friends of the Library.

During the visit, the delegation requested the generation of a barcode for a previously assigned International Standard Book Number (ISBN) for a publication. They also deposited materials with the library in fulfillment of their statutory legal deposit obligations.

National Library Signs MoU with Nigeria University for the Third Age



The National Library of Nigeria and the Nigeria University for the Third Age had on 29th January, 2026 signed an MoU to seal agreement of their unified commitment to life-long learning and community engagement.

Speaking during the event, the National Librarian, Prof. Chinwe Anunobi stated that the program will benefit not just retirees of

the National Library of Nigeria but other Nigerians - senior citizens and the elderly.

Prof. Chinwe Anunobi applauded the Director of NU3A for identifying the worthiness of the NLN to house this great initiative, intended to promote continuous engagement of retirees and the elderly. The program will bring together those who felt that they had been isolated by family or society, to be re-engaged, relax, socialize and still give back to the society through their wealth of experiences gathered while in service in their various capacities. She further stated that the program will help Nigerians to be re-oriented on the state/operations of libraries, not just a place for research but a hub for social/community engagement, relaxation and life-long learning. She assured the commitment of the organization to achieving this noble initiative.

On their part, the Director of NU3A, Dr. Ifeanyi Mbanefo espoused that the mission of the program is to empower older adults through education, research and community service by harnessing the wealth of knowledge and experiences of senior citizens and the elderly to promote active aging and societal development. The MoU empowers both parties to jointly organize seminars, workshops and other community-based activities for retirees of the NLN and other members of the public under the third age bracket. Facilities of NLN across the state branches will serve as focal points whereas NU3A provides the program contents and facilitators. He further appreciated the National Librarian/CEO for accepting the idea and immediately keying into it to ensure that it germinates in accordance with the vision.

The MoU was signed by the National Librarian/CEO, Prof. Chinwe Anunobi on behalf of the NLN, while Dr. Ifeanyi Mbanefo the Director of NU3A, signed on behalf of NU3A. Whereas the Legal Officer Barr. Pauline Ogbu signed as a witness for the NLN, Dr. Rosemary Nwangwu, the Dean of Studies witnessed for NU3A.

Some members of the management team who witnessed the event include: Mrs. Ngozi Odogwu, Director Planning Research & Statistics, Mr. Joseph Ojo, Director Public Service Department and Mr. Bashiru Salawu. Director Virtual Library Services, Others are Mrs. Kikelomo Abdulazez, Head of Legal Deposit, Mr. Shuaibu Abubakar Abdulharman Director Human Resource & Administration, and the Ag. Head Finance & Account, Mr. Augustine Yue.



She also affirmed that the initiative aligns with the mandate of the NLN as captured under the 2025-2030 Strategic Plan; including, inclusivity, innovation, life-long learning and collaboration. She admitted that the concept is wonderful bearing in mind that it will help a whole lot of people who waste away in idleness after retirement, having been in active service for 35 years. According to her, the program engenders re-engagement to social life and will also elongate the life of the retiree. Prof. Anunobi therefore, assured her guests that the National Library of Nigeria will play her role in the partnership when an MoU is fully signed to that effect.

Earlier, the President of the Nigeria University for the Third Age, Dr. Ifeanyi Mbanefo who was accompanied by the University Dean of Studies, Dr. Rosemary Nwangwu while briefing the National Librarian/ CEO informed that NU3A, also known as the Center for the Non- Formal Education and Training- CENFET is a non-governmental organization set to build an engaging society where even retirees will have a lot to offer back to the society. Mr. Mbanefo lamented that high rate of mortality prevalence among the third age is caused when one is cut from social circle. There is a need for re-engagement. He also observed that the brain functions optimally between the ages of 60-65 scientifically, but unfortunately that is the age when people retire from active service. The institution therefore seems to partner with the NLN noting that the apex library is most advocate for books, reading and life-long learning.

The meeting was graced by the entire management team who collaboratively shared their views regarding the initiatives. Also in attendance were the Special Assistant on professional matters, Mr. Baba Mohammed and the Legal Officer, Barr. Lucky Ndah.

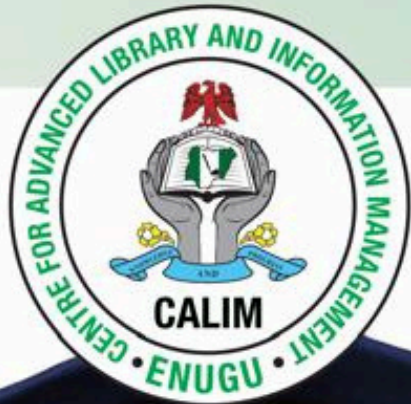
