Speakers were on hand to enlighten participants on issues of public interest. Interview with Mr. Uche Iroabuchi

Mr. Iroabuchi is the Head of the International Standard Book Number (ISBN) Division, in the Department of International Standards and Programmes (IS&PD), National Library of Nigeria.

ONB: Please can we meet you sir?

Uche: My name is Uche Iroabuchi, an Assistant Chief Librarian and the Head of ISBN/CIP Division in the Department of International Standard and Programmes Department (IS&PD), National Library of Nigeria

ONB: Why is ISBN important to authors and publishers?

Uche: The ISBN is a global distinctive identity for every published book. It is a necessary requirement for selling books through book sellers, wholesalers and distributors. ISBN is of great importance to the author in the sense that if an author publishes his/her book with ISBN, such book will be included in the National Bibliography of Nigeria which invariably will help such material to be circulated among authors, publishers, book users and others.

ONB: What are the necessary requirements for obtaining the ISBN?

Uche: For one to obtain an ISBN, the person has to make a formal written request in the form of an application to the Director, International Standard and Programmes Department (IS&PD), stating his intentions. Other attachment required is the manuscript of the proposed book. If the manuscript is bulky, then he has to get the photocopy of the preliminary pages, i.e. the content, the preface, the title page and all that. Then if the person is an author-publisher, he will attach the photocopy of his identity card, driver's license, International Passport or the permanent voters card (PVC). In the case of big publishing firms, the application has to come on the Company's letter headed paper, and a Certificate of Incorporation of that company will be attached. If those requirements are met satisfactorily, then the client is expected to go back and pay the administrative charges. Because of the TSA, we do not accept cash from anybody. All payments regarding our services are

Cataloguing in Publication, if he asserts, then he has to drop the manuscript or the preliminary pages of his work. And within ten (10) working days, the CIP will be ready. However, the National Librarian has put us on our toes, to ensure that within 1-2 hours, the person can get ISBN.

ONB: Is it possible to obtain ISBN online?

Uche: For now, No. We are still developing a customized online application for that purpose. We are

paid through the bank using remittance platform. At the bank, they will generate the remittance, you pay and come back to us with your teller, then we process and issue you the numbers.

ONB: How long does it take one to obtain the ISBN.

Uche: Usually, from the day a client submits application, we normally ask the person if he is requesting for CIP i.e.

presently testing it and sooner than later, that will be possible. What it implies is for our client to access the ISBN even from the remotest part of the country. All that is needed is to log on to the system and access the services online. The present National Librarian, Prof. Lenrie O. Aina is assiduously working towards that. But then, you remember that clients make payment through the bank via TSA and a remittance is generated. So at the end of the

day, there may still be physical contact. However, the National Library is thinking towards that direction, that is, going digital fully.

ONB: Who are to use the ISBN and on what publication?

Uche: The users of ISBN are those in the book sector, i.e. the publishers, the authors, the book sellers, distributors, anybody that has anything to do with book publications. ISBN is meant specifically for books and book-like products, i.e. monographic books. But in the case of serial publications i.e. journals, newspapers and magazines, they go for ISSN. Anything book, be it in printed format or electronic format, they all require ISBN.

ONB: What is the compliance level of ISBN utilization by authors/publishers?

Uche: Well, for now the compliance level is encouraging in the sense that the law establishing National Library makes it mandatory for all publications done in the country to be deposited in the National Library depending on the category of the depositor. A private or commercial publisher is required by law to deposit three copies, and State or Federal government, are required to deposit 10 and 25 copies respectively.

Talking about compliance level, it is expected that any material deposited with National Library must have ISBN, if they don't have, we do not accept them as legal deposit. Invariably, any material without ISBN will not appear in the National Bibliography of Nigeria which is an annual publication of the National Library of Nigeria, containing the intellectual output of the nation which is circulated not just within the country but beyond the shores of the country. And of course, at the international level, whatever appear in National Bibliography of every nation, is what is being extracted in compiling the world bibliography.

ONB: Is there any other organization that issues ISBN apart from National Library of Nigeria?

Uche: No. as far as Nigeria is concerned, it is only the National Library of Nigeria that has the right to render services in ISBN, International Standard Serial Number (ISSN), and the International Standard Music Number (ISMN), even though, for now we do not render services

in ISMN. The reason being that ISBN as an international NGO normally appoints a country's representative and in the case of Nigeria, the National Library of Nigeria is the representative and has been given a Code number – 978. So, that is why any ISBN that emanates from Nigeria, you will see the code 978 after the first digit. That second digit represents Nigerian code. So, it is the sole responsibility of the National Library of Nigeria to issue ISBN, which no other organization in the country is permitted to do.

ONB: At what cost can one obtain ISBN?

Uche: It depends, we have ranges of numbers either as single numbers or in blocks. We have single numbers, block of 10 numbers, block of 100 numbers,

issues that came up from the International Standard Organisation. Bar code is usually 8-digit numbers. For you to have bar-code, you need first of all to have ISBN. It is with that ISBN 13-digit code that bar code will be generated. Any client who needs that, normally applies for it based on the ISBN number issued and that will be processed accordingly.

ONB: ISBN has 13-digit numbers, what are their connotations?

Uche: The 13-digit numbers of ISBN in all have five elements. The first 978 belongs to the international NGO in London. The second 978 is the country code, then the third digit is what we call “identifier”, to identify the publisher. Whereas the first two international and country codes have three digits, the third i.e. the identifier, ranges between 5 and 7 digits. Then the fourth one usually called the “title code” usually have about 3-4 digits, and the last one which is called “check digit”. So the 5 elements of 13 digits number represent the international code, the country code, the publisher, the title code and the check digit as I have mentioned earlier. So those are the connotations of a typical ISBN number. Each digit of the ISBN distinctively identifies the country where the book is published, the publisher and the title.

ONB: If a book is published in foreign language, should it have the ISBN of that country whose language it is published?

Uche: No, what actually happens is that at any point in time a book is published, it does not necessarily mean that the ISBN must be gotten in the language in which the work

is prepared. For instance, if somebody in America or London has written a book in WAZOBIA and that person resides in America or London, and is to publish his work there, he does not need to come to Nigeria to take ISBN simply because the title of the book is WAZOBIA. He will rather stay in America or London and obtain ISBN because the country code in America is one and the work is to be published there. This is so because, in issuing ISBN, you extract certain information about the author, such as the address, phone no, email address which are usually compiled periodically and sent to London.

ONB: Thank you for your time.

Uche: It is my pleasure.

Invariably, any material without ISBN will not appear in the National Bibliography of Nigeria which is an annual publication of the National Library of Nigeria

and block of 1000 numbers. Now, for one to get a single ISBN, it will cost N2,500 and for a block of 10 numbers, it will cost N5000 and for a block of 100 numbers it is N10,000, and for block of 1000 numbers, it will cost N20,000.

All ranges are meant for different categories of publishers. Basically, single numbers and block of 10 are meant for small-time publishers, otherwise known as author-publishers, but block of 100 numbers and 1000 numbers are meant for big time publishing firms, all those that publish in large quantities are those that go for blocks of 100 and 1000.

ONB: How can ISBN be issued in bar-code and how does one obtain it?

Uche: Bar code ordinarily is one of the

Prof. Aina Promises to Automate Operations of NLN

The National Librarian/Chief Executive Officer of the National Library of Nigeria, Professor Lenrie Olatokunbo Aina has promised to automate the operations of National Library of Nigeria so that the organization's clients would be able to access services in the comfort of their homes and offices.

He made this known on Wednesday 25th April, 2018 at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU), National Library Branch in the Boardroom, Corporate Headquarters, Central Business District, Abuja.

Professor Aina lamented that when he assumed office as the National Librarian, he discovered that the organization was operating mostly manually and according to him, manual operation had hindered the organization from competing with global standards.

He assured that very soon the organization would have most of its operations automated. He expressed appreciation to the management and the entire staff for giving him all the necessary support and

vision to move National Library forward was centered on the virtual library services department, but for that to happen, the department has to be staffed by experts in the field of Information Communication Technology (ICT).

On the issue of appointment of substantive directors for various departments, the National Librarian explained that the criteria for advertisement were based on the one that was done by one of his predecessors. He therefore reiterated his commitment to the progress of National Library of Nigeria and urged all staff to do the same in their respective duty posts.

Earlier in his speech, the Chairman, Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU), Comrade Sylvanus Idoko commended the National Librarian, in his efforts to restore the lost

to call on the entire staff to imbibe the culture of tenacity in order to make the organization one united family.

He stated that when staff were being motivated, the feelings of living together would naturally come which would improve the activities of the organization.

Comrade Idoko also presented some of the problems bedeviling the union such as: insecurity, overtime allowance, staff claims, scheme of service, training, appointment of substantive directors, furniture and equipment and internet services and the state of the headquarters building.

Present at the occasion were the Chairmen of Senior Staff Association of Universities, Teaching Hospitals, Research Institutes and Associated Institutions (SSAUTHRIAI), Comrade Kenneth Ahonsi, Academic Staff Union of Research Institutions (ASURI), Comrade Folashade Adepoju and National Union
