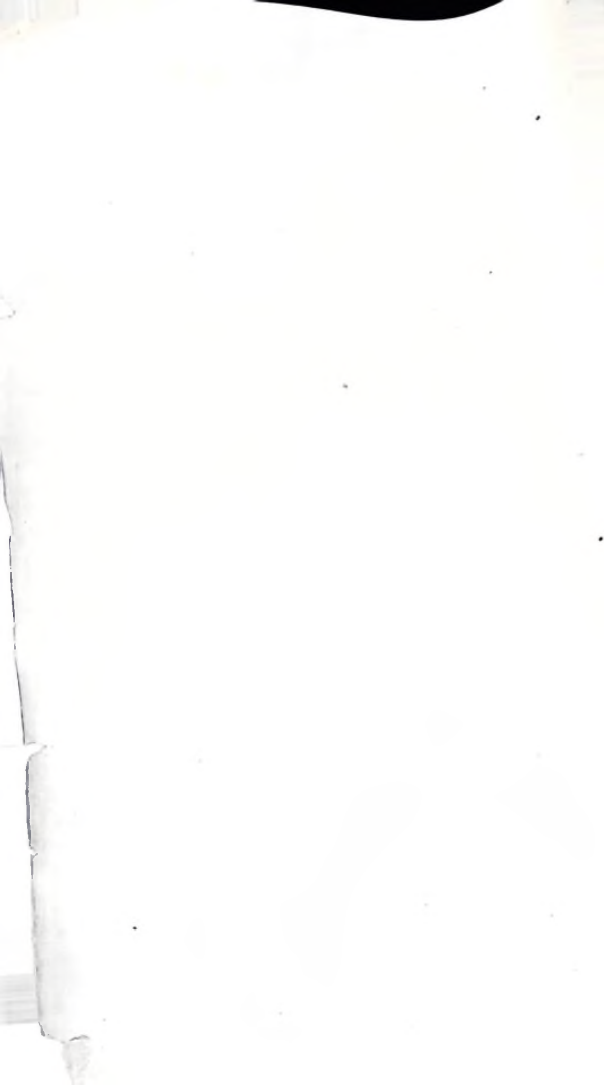

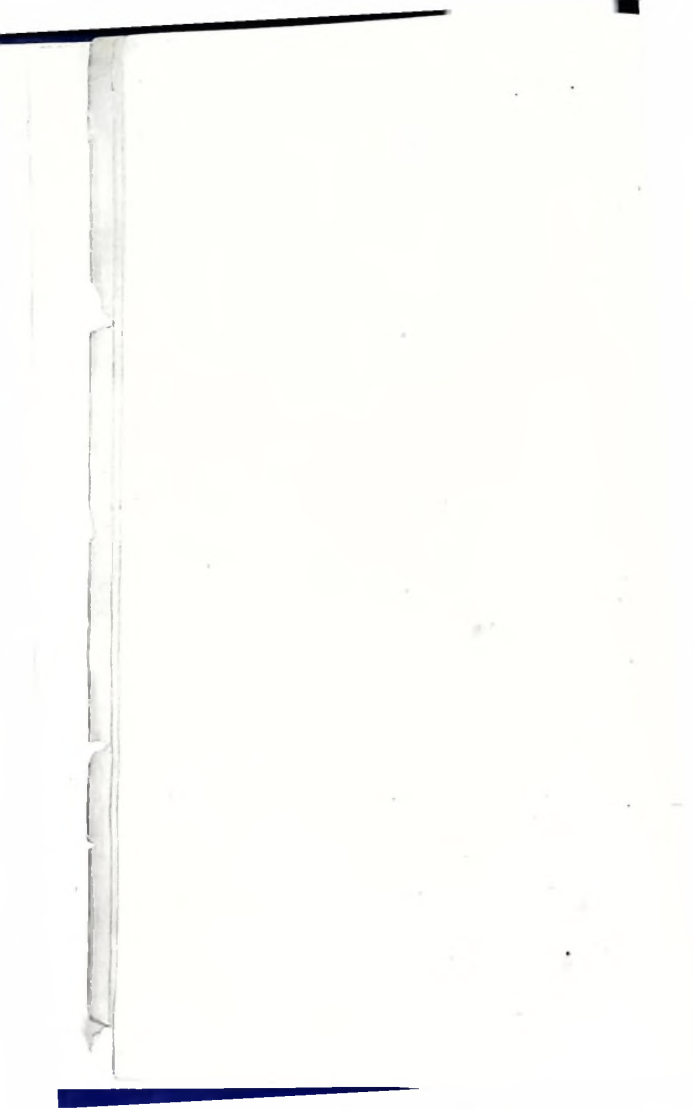

NIGERIA

Trade Report for the Year ending 31st December, 1932.

A welcome increase of £1,410,885 or 9.16 per cent shows in the trade volume for 1932 in comparison with 1931

The import values are up by £654,217 and this value increase would have been considerably more had not the country received very large quantities of cheap piece goods and ultra cheap lines of apparel. Government importations also decreased by £360,000. Exports show an increase of £705,049 and the quantity tables given on pages 10 to 17 indicate how satisfactory agricultural production has been during the year

It will be seen that the quantity of piece goods imported has increased over 1931 by 52,537,592 square yards or 81 per cent, and the value by £1,003,480 or 64 per cent. This increased activity is welcome, but large quantities of cheap foreign piece goods have arrived and have been readily absorbed, and this seeking for quantity instead of quality, although natural in times of financial stringency, is not so welcome a feature.

Food, Drink and Tobacco.

Ale, beer, etc.—The further decline in these figures is difficult to account for. Liquor consumption generally has decreased and cheap locally made palm wine may be taking the place of imported liquors.

Cigarettes and tobacco unmanufactured—Cigarette imports show a welcome increase of 390,000 hundreds and unmanufactured tobacco of 516,000 lb. This is an excellent indication of the improved purchasing power of the African population.

Dried fish.—These imports are up by 115,000 cwt and are a further indication that the poorer African producer is again able to afford small luxuries.

Kola nuts.—This trade continues to decrease and increased local production probably accounts for this.

Spirits.—All importations under this head are down. Gin, the principal item, has declined by 20,000 gallons, but I fear it is not entirely increased sobriety that is the cause of this. Illicit distilling still flourishes although strenuous efforts are being made to combat the production of the raw and unwholesome concoctions which are made and which cannot but be detrimental to the health of consumers.

Raw Materials and Articles Mainly Manufactured.

Kerosene.—It will be seen that there is a drop of over one million gallons in the importations of this commodity. Prices are too high to permit of ready sales since a substitute exists in palm oil which is readily and cheaply obtained. Candles also compete successfully.

Boots and shoes (other than leather).—This increase of 401,000 pairs is principally accounted for by the amazingly cheap shoes of Japanese origin which have been imported. Prices have been as low as 7s. 6d. per dozen pairs c.i.f.

Candles —An increase of 278,000 lb. of candles brings this trade back almost to normal

Gunpowder —Sales of this article continue to decline and 83,000 lb. less were imported in 1932 than in 1931

Soap —A further decline of 11,000 cwt. shows in soap imports but this may be ascribed to the activities of the local soap factory and as by no means harmful.

Palm oil.—Here we have a decrease in quantity of 2,110 tons and in value of £27,371. The decrease is small and may easily be accounted for by increased local consumption. After the first three months prices declined by 20 per cent, but have, since then, remained fairly stable, if somewhat low.

Palm kernels.—The 1932 figure of 309,061 tons is the highest ever recorded by Nigeria for this commodity. The increase over 1931 of 54,607 tons forms one of the most encouraging features of the year's trading. The increased value is given as £563,617. prices throughout the year having remained low though fairly stable

Cocoa.—In this commodity a record has also been reached and the 1931 figure has been exceeded by 18,229 tons. The total value of £1,461,451 exceeds the 1931 value by £368,197.

Groundnuts.—This is another record for Nigeria and we exceed our 1931 tonnage by 28,384 tons and our 1931 value by £363,140. Prices which showed signs of reviving early in the year have again declined. The Director of Agriculture reports that the production of this crop is still responding to the opening of the two new branch railways, and there seems reason to believe that it will continue to increase for several years yet.

Cotton Lint.—A decrease of 2,324 tons as compared with 1931 is somewhat disappointing but the demand for cotton for local hand manufacture was exceptionally keen and reduced the surplus for export.

ANIMAL PRODUCTS.

"Almost the only animal products exported from Nigeria are hides and skins but the trade in these products is a considerable one and of great economic importance to the country. In 1932 the total value of the hides and skins exported amounted to £552,478.

The Trade Returns for the year show a decrease in the export of cattle hides and goat skins but on the other hand there is a slight increase in sheep skins.

It is very satisfactory to note however, that in spite of the prevailing trade depression and the consequent reduced demand for these products, the average price obtained for goat skins was 4½d. per lb. higher than during last year. It would therefore appear that although fewer skins were exported they were on an average of better quantity.

In the past owing to careless flaying and improper drying large numbers of skins were classified in a lower grade, and consequently were reduced in value. Now as the result of the working of the scheme for the improvement of flaying and drying, the general quality of the skins has been much improved and export merchants have now no difficulty in meeting all overseas demands with good well-prepared skins. This scheme is now in operation not only throughout the Kano Province, where it was first begun, but also in the other Provinces in the North in which it is gradually being extended. A drying shed has been erected at each of several hundred markets and all skins slaughtered at these markets are stamped with a distinctive mark by which the place of origin of each skin is known.

There has been a slight increase in the number of sheep skins exported during the year and the price of about 1s. 3d. per lb. is much the same as last year.

The quantity of cattle hides exported show a decrease of nearly 1,000,000 lb. in weight and of nearly 1d. per lb. in price as compared with last year. For a time during the year there was no demand for hides at places off the Railway owing to the high cost of road transport which made the purchase of hides in these places an uneconomical proposition.

It is hoped in time to be able to bring about the same all round improvement in the preparation of hides as has been done with skins and so increase the demand for them in the overseas markets.

Clarified Butter Fat (Ghee).—There is no export trade in this commodity at present although a considerable local trade has recently been developed but endeavours are now being made in this direction in order to give an outlet for the large quantities which could be produced in the Northern Provinces during the wet season of the year when milk is plentiful.

At present in many parts of the North cattle owners can find no local market for all the milk and butter that is produced and in consequence cannot realise the full economic value of their herds.

Clarified butter fat is prepared by rendering down and clarifying good quality fresh butter and can be used for the same culinary purposes as lard and dripping. Properly made it will remain in perfect condition for months or even years and can be produced at 3d-4d. per lb."

Minerals.

Tin and coal are the only minerals mined to any extent in Nigeria. The value and quantity of tin exported for the last five years is shown in the following table:—

The Chief Inspector of Mines has kindly supplied the following notes on the Mining Activities of Nigeria during 1932:—

" The Mining Activities of Nigeria during 1932.

Tin.—The tin industry has shown little signs of improvement during the past year. In January the price of the metal stood at £141 per ton, but it fell to £103 by the middle of April. Later it improved to a maximum of £157; since when it has remained steadily around £150 per ton.

Government control of the production and export of tin as required by the International Restriction Scheme, continued throughout the year. The rate of restriction was increased by the International Committee in June, when the Nigerian quota was reduced to 3,431 tons metal, or 4,902 tons ore per annum. The output for the year was 6,000 tons ore. The average local f.o.r. cost is approximately £51 per ton of 70 per cent concentrate, as compared with £44 in 1931.

Gold.—The output for the year was 2,700 ounces bullion, valued at approximately £15,900. More than 2,000 ounces were won during the last six months of the year; the greater portion of the output came from Niger Province, and the remainder from Sokoto and Kano Provinces.

Silver lead.—The production for the year amounted to 683 tons of lead concentrate containing approximately 85,000 ounces of silver. The entire output was won by the Northern Nigeria Lead Mines, Limited, at Zuruk in Adamawa Province.

Mica.—During the year 0.836 ton of mica was won from the neighbourhood of Oghom in Kabba Province; but the heavy fall in the price of the mineral, has, for the time suspended further development."

The Director of Forests has kindly supplied the following notes on forest products:—

Timber—Despite the continued depression in trade there are welcome signs of a slight revival in the logging industry which is reflected in the greater amount of exploitation carried out during recent months. Some 6,600 trees were felled for export, an increase of 2,100 over last year; while these consisted chiefly of the mahogany group of timbers including cedars and walnuts, there was also a considerably enhanced consumption of obeche (African white wood, *Triplochiton schleroxyton*); the demand for ebony remained small.

An indication of the low level of world prices is that although the volume of timber exported increased by 47 per cent, the actual value showed a slight decrease.

A total of 28,640 trees were felled on permit for local use, an increase of 18 per cent compared with last year. There is little doubt that an import duty on cheap soft-woods would materially increase local development of the timber trade and this in turn would stimulate the export trade.

Afforestation work is proceeding, although on a reduced scale owing to the financial situation. The total areas regenerated were:—

- (a) by artificial means 520 acres approximately.
- (b) by natural regeneration 200 acres approximately.

5. SHIPPING.

The shipments of all principal exports were in excess of those of 1931. Palm oil is the outstanding item with an increase of 150 per cent and it is pleasing to note that the shipments of cocoa evacuated through this port from the Ondo Province were not only greater but of outstanding quality.

Reports received indicate that the trade of the coming year will stand an excellent chance not only of maintaining but of exceeding the 1932 figure.

The cocoa trade of the Ondo Province which must be capable of far greater development in future years finds a natural outlet through Koko and Warri and the figures in respect of this valuable item of export may be expected to show a useful increase during 1933.

Sapele—Situated some twenty miles east of Koko and on the same river, Sapele serves an entirely different district, or rather districts, for the rich and practically untapped Benin Province now sends most of its produce to the outer world through this port instead of through Koko as during the years previous to 1928. Imports and exports both showed welcome increases during the year under review save in kerosene which, owing to its present high price, showed a heavy fall. It is to be noted that although the cotton piece goods trade showed an increase of 300 per cent in quantity no proportionate increase of duty accrued owing to the low values of these goods. Timber exports were good with a striking increase of 8,000 tons whereas owing to the very low prices for rubber a sharp fall of 300,000 lb. in the export of this commodity has taken place.

Reports from traders and inquiries made bring us to the conclusion that there has been a slow but marked improvement in trade and hope is entertained locally that this improvement will at least be maintained during 1933. The fact that the improvement of the roads in the Warri-Benin area has continued with a resulting increase in the use of road transport coupled with the increased interest that is being taken in the still largely undeveloped Benin Province point to a considerable increase in the trade of this port when business conditions become more stable.

Warri—Notwithstanding the general adverse conditions which prevailed throughout the year trade was maintained at a considerably higher level than in 1931. In this petty traders took a not inconsiderable part and there are not wanting signs that the province will share to the full in any trade revival which may be in store.

Import duties closed with an advance of £46,800 while Export duties showed a rise of only £529. As with other ports in this province, however, a considerable amount of palm oil is sent to the Bulk Plant at Burutu and the duty is eventually brought to account in the figures of that port.

All imports have shown an encouraging increase save kerosene and gm. For the former the native cannot or will not pay the high price asked and he has resorted to palm oil for lighting purposes; in the case of the latter the combination of high duty and the traffic in illicit stills caused a decrease of nearly 5,000 gallons in the imports. In this connection it is interesting to note that the imports of sugar destined, it is believed, for these illicit stills, increased by over 100 per cent.

The development of river transport by Messrs. John Holt and Company for conveyance of cargo on the rivers Benin and Niger has continued during the year and Warri is their headquarters for this traffic.

It is interesting, if not disturbing from a revenue point of view, to note that tobacco grown in the Owo, Ikare and Ishan districts is increasing in popularity and its use is fostered by the fact that it retails

Some comments on the trade of the various ports are given below :—

Lagos (including Apapa).—This port is the gateway for the main trade of Nigeria. It collects more revenue than all the other ports put together and its commerce ranges from the ordinary staple importations of the usual trade lines common to all districts of the Southern Provinces to specialised articles peculiar to the trade of Kano and other important Northern centres.

No detailed examination of its traffic can be compared in brief notes on the trade of Nigerian ports since its trade runs the gamut of Japanese goods consigned from Alexandria, horse cloths and saddle bags from Tripoli, cigarettes made of Macedonian tobacco in Athens, artificial silks from Italy, embroideries from Switzerland, silks and satins from Lyons, wax block prints from Holland, cheap trade lines from Germany, artificial silks and cottons from Japan and the usual Manchester staples. In short the commerce passing through the port of Lagos derives from almost all the world.

As always, the increase in trade during the past year as compared with its predecessor has been reflected in Lagos to a greater extent than in any other Nigerian port.

A noticeable feature during 1932 has been the vast increase in the imports of cheap foreign textiles at prices far below anything possible from Manchester. These importations show every sign of maintaining their quantity during 1933.

There have not been lacking prophets who, in the past have foretold that as trade gradually pushed its way into the interior Lagos would, in time, become a mere port of entry serving up line stations from Apapa by rail and from Lagos by motor transport with a local trade dwindled almost to vanishing point. Time has proved them wrong and with its very large lagoon trade to say nothing of its attractions for buyers from places such as Ibadan, the premier port of Nigeria still shows no sign of degenerating into a mere entrepot for goods destined for country buying centres and continues to maintain its very large and important local trade.

The transit trade has continued to increase throughout the year and may be expected to keep pace with the development of the French territories North of Nigeria. If this development continues unabated Lagos can look forward to a very strong transit trade by rail in the near future.

Exports and imports have both increased during the year and the rise in duty collected as compared with 1931 is greater than that of all other ports added together.

Throughout the year, and especially during its closing months a good demand has been maintained for all the usual trade lines and there appears to be almost no limit to the amounts of cheap foreign cotton and artificial silk goods which the market can absorb.

Exports have been well maintained in respect of all items and many specially large cargoes of groundnuts left the port about the close of the year. This augurs well for the spending resources of the people of the North during 1933.

Koko.—Adverse conditions and changes in the transport methods of importers have caused this port greatly to decrease in importance during the past few years. Owing mainly to the erection of a bulk oil plant which attracted oil that might otherwise have been shipped from Sapele or Burutu the export duty realised was double that of the previous year. Thanks also to a surprising but unexplained increase in the imports of gin and to some revival in local demand for the staple lines imported duties from these sources were practically double those of 1931.

The shipments of all principal exports were in excess of those of 1931. Palm oil is the outstanding item with an increase of 150 per cent and it is pleasing to note that the shipments of cocoa evacuated through this port from the Ondo Province were not only greater but of outstanding quality.

Reports received indicate that the trade of the coming year will stand an excellent chance not only of maintaining but of exceeding the 1932 figure.

The cocoa trade of the Ondo Province which must be capable of far greater development in future years finds a natural outlet through Koko and Warri and the figures in respect of this valuable item of export may be expected to show a useful increase during 1933.

The development of river transport by Messrs. John Holt and Company for conveyance of cargo on the rivers Benin and Niger has continued during the year and Warri is their headquarters for this traffic.

It is interesting, if not disturbing from a revenue point of view, to note that tobacco grown in the Owo, Ikare and Ishan districts is increasing in popularity and its use is fostered by the fact that it retails

at a mere 10d the lb. The result has been a decrease in the turn-over of the imported article.

The consensus of local trading opinion is that any reasonable and well maintained increase in produce prices cannot but ensure a very definite improvement upon the trade of 1932. As in most other areas the African has shown that he can adapt himself to changed conditions and produce more to off-set low prices. His greatest difficulty has been to understand prices which, in obedience to the law of supply and demand and owing to fluctuations in the exchanges of foreign capitals, fluctuate markedly from week to week if not from day to day.

Burutu (including Forcados)—Burutu has practically no local trade of its own and exists purely as a depot for the greater proportion of the trade of the River Niger. The port depends entirely on the activities of the United Africa Company which, in addition to a large river transport service owns modern wharves and sheds at Burutu capable of dealing with all the traffic of the port.

The volume of trade showed a marked increase during the year under review but whereas the value of imports increased by no less than £140,333 or 46.07 per cent the increased value of exports was almost negligible being a mere £493 or .06 per cent.

Gin showed the usual decrease common to most ports during the year but this was more than offset by very large and striking increases in the three important items tobacco, salt and cotton piece goods which soared over 1931 by 133,324 lb., 100,774 cwt. and 2,000,258 square yards respectively.

With regard to the principal exports, whereas palm kernels, groundnuts, benniseed and cotton lint all showed striking increases on the previous year, especially cotton lint with a rise of 108.01 per cent, palm oil, cocoa and shea nuts declined heavily in the proportions of 20.94 per cent, 93.14 per cent and 89.81 per cent respectively.

It is expected that during 1933 still further use will be made of the river transport service operating from this port for the transport of cargoes to the Northern areas. This applies specially to salt.

A further increase in the value and volume of imports is expected for 1933 and it is not improbable that cargoes destined for Koko, Sapele and Warri will be dealt with at Burutu.

The transit trade, for which Burutu is the main entrepot in Nigeria, showed increases on both the import and export sides. The former rose by £2,318 or 23.94 per cent and the latter more than doubled itself by an increase of £11,695 or 100.39 per cent.

Forcados—Is a mere sub-port to Burutu and its trade continues to decline. The value of imports during 1932 was £24,514 and of exports £9,256.

Messrs. Elder Dempster Lines, Limited, run a transport service based on Forcados for handling the inward and outward cargoes of certain firms operating at Onitsha and some growth of this traffic is expected during 1933.

Akassa.—Situated at the mouth of the Nun branch of the River Niger this port was in former days, the outlet for the bulk of the trade of the River Niger itself and the centre of a very considerable local trade. The shifting of the bases of operations for the Niger traffic to Burutu and Warri and the recent deflection of part of its imports to Degema has caused a great decline in its importance and its trade calls for no special comment. A certain amount of oleaginous produce is still shipped in

spite of the dangerous bar at the entrance to the river and imports in small quantities of the usual manufactured articles continue to arrive at irregular intervals.

As the port of Brass no longer exists it is unlikely that it will be practicable to close down Akassa but the fact that it is only necessary to keep two African officers there illustrates its decline in importance. In common with other ports it is pleasant to record a slight increase in the tonnage exported during 1932 and Akassa and the area it serves will benefit from any revival in trade during 1933.

Degema—This port closed the year showing an increase in the total value of trade of £43,204 as compared with 1931. This increase was divided almost equally between imports and exports but as a certain amount of cargo destined for the Brass and Akassa districts was entered at Degema the true increase is really on the export side of the account.

The increased export values are due to heavier shipments of palm produce especially kernels and it appears that, as in the Port Harcourt area, the African is slowly but surely learning that to maintain the standard of living to which he grew accustomed in the boom days he must now work harder and produce more to offset the low prices at present ruling.

An interesting feature of the export trade of this port at which a Bulk plant is installed, is the very large exportation of palm oil to Italy. Of a total of 15,222 tons exported during 1932 that country took no less than 14,088 tons.

The decrease in importations of kerosene which has been generally noted at other ports is in evidence at Degema but in spite of this and generally unfavourable conditions the total duties of Customs showed an appreciable increase of £11,355 during the year under review. Timber exports have shown a small but welcome increase in value of £1,224.

Illicit distilling has continued throughout the year with its usual effect on the imports of gin.

Careful consideration has been given to all factors which might possibly have tended to inflate the duties collected and, after due allowance for these, it still remains clear that trade was generally more prosperous than during 1931. Produce prices though low no longer show the wild fluctuations which characterised late 1931 and early 1932 and producers appear to be almost reconciled to lower prices and their attendant conditions.

After surveying the position and taking the opinions of those most closely in touch with the trade of the area served by this port the outlook appears to be in the direction of some increase, even though it may be a small increase, in the trade of the port during 1933.

Port Harcourt (including Bonny)—There was a slight increase in revenue from duties, slight that is for a port of the importance of Port Harcourt, of £32,000 in round figures over the revenue of the previous year. The import increase of £18,383 calls for no special comment but the increase in export duty, an amount of over £13,000, arising out of a heavier tonnage shipped despite continually discouraging conditions is decidedly stimulating and a tribute to the resiliency of Nigerian trade.

Revenue from imports has been somewhat disappointing owing to the weakness in sterling having had an adverse effect upon the sales of certain high duty commodities such as tobacco and petroleum which must be purchased in American markets in a depreciated currency. Any early and sustained improvement in the exchange situation cannot fail to have a beneficial effect upon revenue prospects.

As in other areas, despite the active efforts of the Administration to suppress the illicit distillation of spirits, the demand for gin throughout the year has been far from strong. Importations of sugar, as in other ports, have increased.

Importations of absurdly cheap foreign apparel, woven goods, hats, caps and shoes have greatly increased during the year under review and these goods are imported at anything from 25 per cent to 35 per cent below the first cost quoted by their British competitors.

There are not wanting features which encourage hope of some improvement in the near future provided there is no serious break, or better still given a slight increase, in produce prices. It is a fact that during the past year more merchandise has gone into consumption than has been imported and the year closed with stocks standing at a very low figure. This state of affairs cannot continue indefinitely and it appears more than probable that imports will be on a larger scale in 1933 than was the case in 1932. Another favourable point when summing up the prospects for next year is the increased tonnage of palm produce shipped last year despite the indifferent prices offering—a sure sign that the producer of the Owerri Province is beginning to realise that he must work much harder to attain to the standard of life to which he grew accustomed under more favourable conditions.

Bonny—This port has completely fallen from its high estate of 20 years ago and now exists merely as a boarding station to provide officers for ships on their way to Port Harcourt. Its trade is practically non-existent and calls for no comment.

Opobo—In common with most other ports, Opobo shows a drop in her exports of palm oil with a corresponding rise in the tonnage of kernels shipped. In regard to imports reduced sales of gin and kerosene are the outstanding features and between them account in the main for a fall in Revenue of over £5,000 on the years working.

Thanks to the illicit still gin has become practically unsaleable and the majority of the European merchants are of the opinion that the stage has been reached at which not even a big reduction in the rate of duty would restore this trade to its importance, from a revenue point of view, of former days.

Kerosene has declined in sales purely owing to its present high price—only an appreciation in sterling values can alter this state of affairs. Meanwhile the poorer natives in this district are using palm oil for lighting.

The outstanding quality of Opobo oil resulted during the past year in the transfer of 310 tons to Burutu for purposes of blending with the inferior hard oil usually passed through the Bulk plant at that port. It is expected that if such blending proves successful further transfers will be made.

The total decline in revenue for the year can be accounted for by the decreased importations of the one item gin and it is therefore neither an unjustified nor unduly optimistic inference that the coming year will show an improvement. There now remain no heavy surplus stocks to be thrown on the market and the trading community, while frankly admitting the difficulty of prophecy which even borders upon accuracy under present chaotic conditions, admit to a feeling of optimism for 1933.

Calabar—A gradual increase over 1931 in value, quantity and resulting Revenue is reported for 1932, but the prevailing trade depression has been seriously felt in the large area which Calabar represents.

The outstanding items on the imports are the enormous increases in tobacco and cigarettes which can be seen at a glance in the tables attached to this report. These increases are in the main due to the activities of the Eastern Preventive Service and indicate the check which that service has imposed in the last two years on the activities of the smugglers who were in the habit of making the Calabar area the dumping ground for their purchases of contraband from Duala.

On the other hand the local spread of illicit stills has taken a notoriously heavy toll on the lawfully imported gin trade. In 1932 Calabar took 28,150 gallons of this spirit. Last year the imports dwindled to a mere 2,924 gallons—a decrease which unfortunately appears to indicate successful boot-legging rather than increased sobriety. It was at Ikang, in the Calabar Province, that the distillation of spirits is believed to have started in 1931 and it is the port of Calabar which has suffered worst as a result of the activities of the distillers.

The importation of cheap foreign lines has shown a notable increase during the past year and from this port causes the report of the importation of 35,181 gallons of kerosene and 19,390 gallons of petrol from Russia.

A growing trade in livestock and foodstuffs in exchange for artificial silk, hosiery, clothing and similar articles is reported between Calabar and the Spanish possession of Fernando Po. This trade is fostered by the prevailing low prices in Santa Isabel as compared with those ruling in Nigerian trade centres.

It has been alleged that the Africans in the hinterland served by Calabar have pursued a policy of holding on to their stocks of palm oil during the past year in the hope of a rise in prices. This is difficult of confirmation and it seems equally likely that any shortage has been caused not so much by a policy of holding up stocks as by the increased domestic use for the purposes of lighting coupled with the producers' disinclination to bring in oil at what they consider to be unremunerative prices.

Victoria—An increase of value of the total trade of this port of £13,742 is recorded in respect of the year under review as compared with 1931. As a result of this Revenue benefited by an increase in duties collected of £4,989. Of this increase almost 75 per cent resulted from the very much larger imports of tobacco and cigarettes during the year for it is this trade which first of all receives a stimulus from the successful activities of the Eastern Preventive Service. The spirit trade in Dutch gin has benefited hardly at all but this commodity has never been imported for native consumption in any great quantities in the Southern part of the mandated territory of the Cameroons and in view of the high rate of duty this traffic may, for all practical purposes, be regarded as moribund.

The export trade of the port calls for little comment save in the very striking decline in the exports of rubber. In 1926 no less than 1,328,233 lbs. of rubber were exported from Victoria. Last year the figure was 164,733 lb. At present prices this product does not pay for the cost of tapping and the expenses incidental to landing the rubber in European ports. Save in this and in cocoa, which also shows a marked decrease owing, according to the planters, to an increase in black pod disease, a slight but welcome increase is noted in all other produce.

The shipping of the port is almost entirely in German hands, but Messrs. Dempster Lines have returned to the practice of allowing their mail boats to make a monthly call at Victoria to take passengers.

Tiko was opened as a port in late 1928 when it was found to be impossible to continue to handle from Victoria the cargoes imported at that place without causing great inconvenience to trade in nothing of incomplete Customs control over dutiable cargo. From the total trade reached a value in 1932 of £112,547. The figure shows a decrease in value of nearly £20,000 as compared with 1931 but the fall is more than accounted for by the persistent increase in prices during last year.

The decrease in duties as compared with the 1931 collection is negligible. The actual figure is under £100.

The main interest of Tiko is that it is now the established headquarters of the large and growing banana trade with Europe. Over a million bunches of fresh bananas weighing more than ten pounds represent the increase over 1931 shipments. The trade shows every sign of increasing and an ever growing acreage is being put under banana crops. The West African Fruit Company keep two fast traders constantly employed on the run between Tiko and Hamburg and the Woermann Linie will be adding a third ship of this type in 1933. In addition to this accommodation the Woermann Linie steamers *Wadai* and *Wache* have limited cold storage accommodation for bananas. All other exports save rubber show a small increase. The same causes which have practically killed the rubber trade at Victoria have had a similar effect on the Tiko exports of this commodity.

The majority of the Tiko imports came from Germany and owing to the unfavourable exchange firms have kept their stocks as low as possible during the past year.

8. PREVENTIVE SERVICE.

On the Eastern Frontier bordering the Cameroons under French Mandate a Preventive service is established under the control of a Collector of Customs, assisted on land by two Assistant Commissioners of Police and rank and file and, at sea, by a Marine Officer in charge of a preventive launch. There are twelve stations, all of which are revenue stations. During 1932, the following visible results were obtained —

There is ample evidence that this service has functioned with considerable success during 1932, and its invisible results are reflected in the increased imports of tobacco and cigarettes shown in the trade tables for nearby ports, particularly Calabar. The commercial communities of these places pay tribute to the work of the service and are satisfied that any curtailment of its activities cannot but be detrimental to their business.

The Western Frontier also has a Preventive service under the control of an Assistant Commissioner of Police, who acts as Collector of Customs. Smuggling has never assumed large proportions on this frontier, and there has been but little evidence of activity during the year.

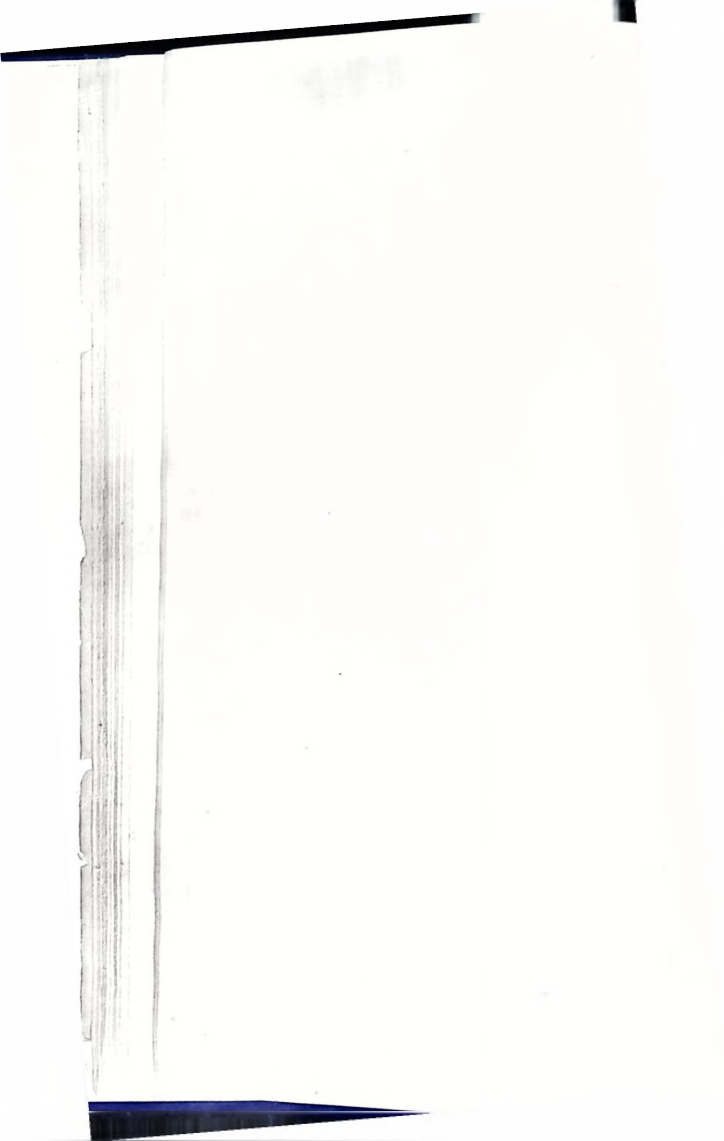

Explanation of Basis of Trade Statistics of Nigeria

The calendar year is shown in every case.

2 *The imports in the annual Trade Report are the total imports, including goods entered for warehouse. The exports include re-exports, but native products are set out in detail and are distinguished from re-exports.*

3 *Government stores are recorded separately, under the ordinary headings, in such a manner that the total imports and exports of each article are shown.*

4 *Passengers' baggage, including wearing apparel and personal effects passed as such by the Collector in which may be included spirits or scent not exceeding one bottle of each, cigars or cigarettes not exceeding one hundred of each, or any tobacco not exceeding one pound in weight, is exempt from duty. Where passengers' baggage contained dutiable articles the value of such articles is included in the ordinary headings; in other cases the value is not recorded.*

5 *There is no separate record of ships stores. Those imported for the use of local craft are included under the ordinary headings.*

6 *The Post Office furnishes an account of exports by parcel post, and undertakes the collection of duties on parcels as assessed by the Customs. Classification of imports by parcels post is not carried out at present, and the total value of importations is shown under Class IV.—Miscellaneous.*

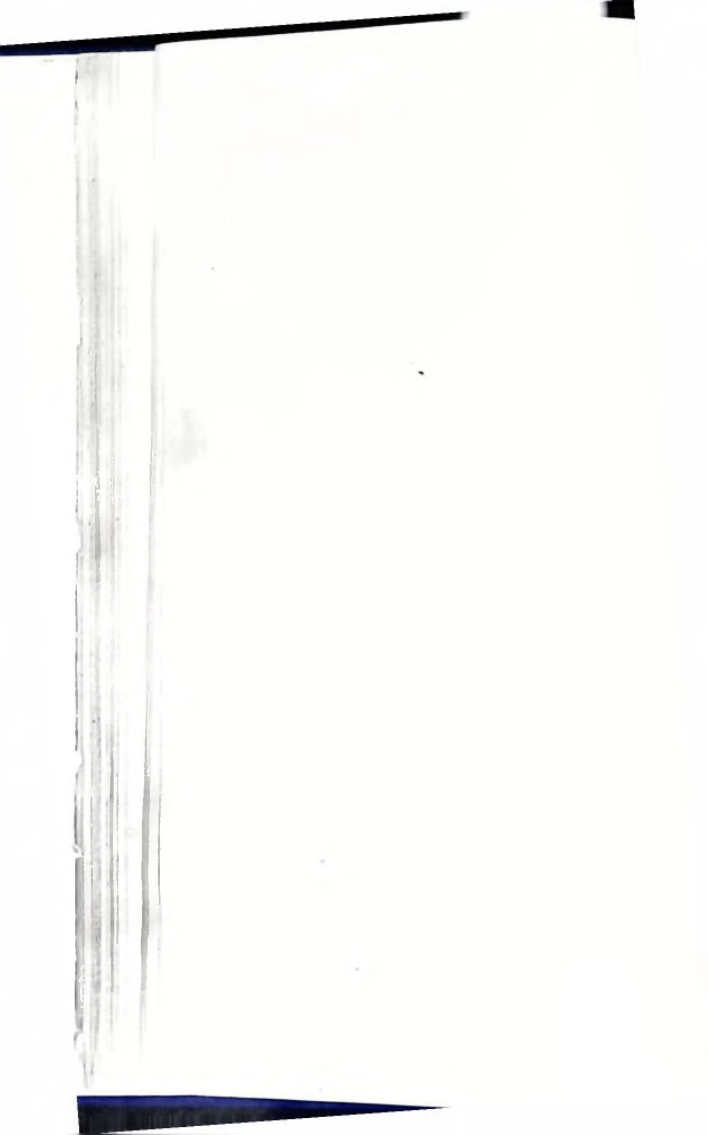
7 *Bullion and specie are shown separately, as well as currency notes which are circulated to supplement the silver, nickel and alloy currency.*

8 *Containers and packing material are included in the value of the goods.*

9 *The classification of imports and re-exports follows that in use in the United Kingdom and the exports of native products are fully enumerated.*

10 *Imports are credited to the country of consignment, exports to the country of shipment, which is in most cases the country of final destination, but this cannot be definitely ascertained in Nigeria.*

11 *The descriptions and quantities of imports, exports and re-exports are ascertained from documents, which in the case of invoices are declared to by the owners and checked by Customs examination. The nett weights are specified in the returns. The units of quantity and value used do not deviate from the Imperial Standard and are clearly shown for each heading. Imports are valued C.I.F. exclusive of landing charges, exports F.O.B. including duty, but not ocean freight. Re-exports are also valued F.O.B.*

1932.

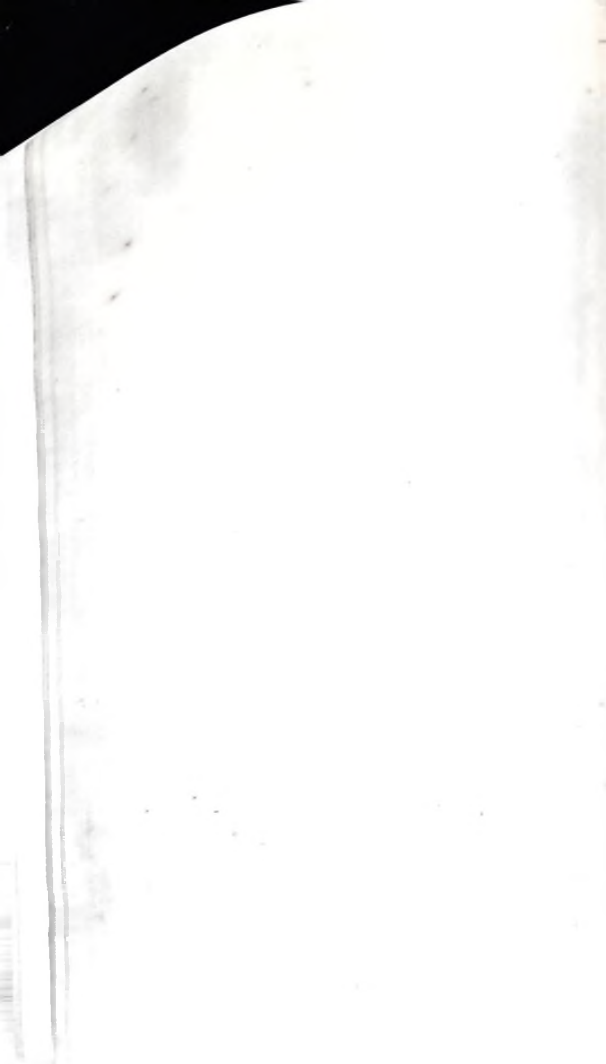

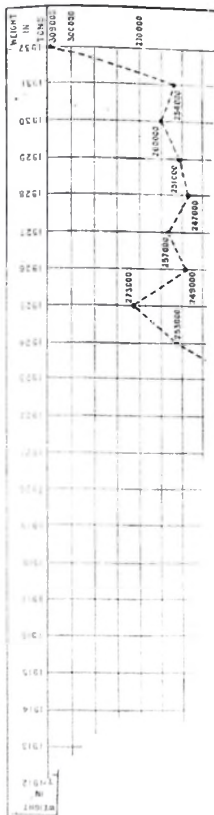
