DECREE ON FRCN OUT

Radio Organisation In Nigeria Restructured

The decree formally establishing the Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria has been promulgated. It is contained in a Federal Government Gazette which was published in Lagos in March, this year.

Beside announcing the creation of the FRCN, the decree which has retrospective effect from the 1st of April 1978, also states the formal dissolution of the Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation, NBC, and the Broadcasting Company of Northern Nigeria, BCNN.

Among other matters, it describes the structure of the FRCN and spells out its responsibilities and functions as well as those of its various bodies and departments.

According to the decree, "It shall be the duty of the Corporation to provide as a public service in the interest of Nigeria, independent and impartial radio broadcasting services for general

reception within Nigeria and to provide External Services for general reception in countries outside Nigeria." It adds that the Corporation's Services must reflect the unity of Nigeria as a Federation, and at the same time give

adequate expression, to the culture, characteristics and affairs and opinions of every part of the country.

Boards

To handle the operation of the FRCN, the decree makes provision for the positions of a Chairman and a Director-General at the central level. The D-G, who will be the Chief executive officer of the Corporation, will be responsible for the execution of its policy and day-to-day business.

The membership of the Corporation will also include the Chairman of each of the Zonal Boards of the Corporation and one representative each of the Federal Ministry of Information and the Ministry of External Affairs. There will also be one person to represent women's interests in the country as well as six persons with requisite experience in six relevant areas. These are the Mass Media, Education, Management, Financial Matters, Engineering and Arts and Culture.

Tenure of office as members of the Corporation is three years with a provision for re-appointment for another three years term. This, however applies to only those Members who are not public officers.

Also, there will be a Secretary to the Corporation who will, among other duties, keep the Corporation's records and handle its correspondence.

Zonal Boards

The Decree provides, among other things, for four linguistic zones of the Corporation as follows:-

FRCN— Kaduna— broadcast in English, Hausa, Kanuri, Fulfulde and Nups.

FRCN— Ibadan covering English, Yoruba, Edo, Igala and Urhobo.

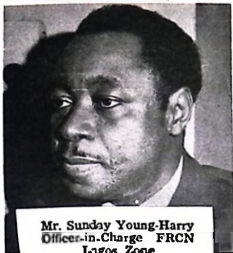
FRCN— Enugu, with English, Igbo, Izon, Efik and Tiv as the languages of the zone.

FRCN — Lagos in

- (a) English and three Nigerian Languages.
- (b) National Programmes.
- (c) Educational Services Programmes.
- (d) F.R.C. — 2.



The affairs of each zone of the Corporation will be supervised by a Zonal Board which would also have a Chairman. Other members of such a Board would include a Zonal Director as chief executive in matters within the competence of the Board and responsible for executing the decisions of the Zonal Board. Completing the membership of the Zonal Boards will be some persons with wide knowledge and experience in several different



fields, including Mass Communication, the cultural, economic and religious affairs of the Zone, the creative arts, education, finance as well as a representative of business and industry. The decree stipulates that the strength of the members of each Zonal Board should be between six and ten.

External Services

The decree also formally establishes a department of the Corporation which will be responsible for external services. This department will be charged with broadcasting programmes to such countries and in those languages that the Head of the Federal Government may prescribe from time-to-time. It will be headed by a Director of External Services as the chief executor of the policy of the FRCN as far as the department is concerned and its day-to-day running.

Staff Disposition

The decree stipulates that members of staff of the former NBC in the States (as deployed) are deemed to be members of staffs of the new Corporation — Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria. The State Organisations are however required to offer employment

In writing to such staff within three months of the promulgation of the Decree, on terms and conditions which are not less favourable with what they were enjoying. The decree adds that any staff affected has the option of accepting or turning down such offer. If he accepts, he is then regarded as having been transferred to the service of the state organisation. If after one month of the offer, a reply has not been received, the obligation the state organisation determines a such deployed member of staff will be returned to FRCN.

Exclusive Right

The decree spells out the exclusive right of the FRCN to broadcast shortwave or powerful medium-wave for effective and simultaneous reception in more than one state at a time.

- (1) National Network News and Current Affairs.
- (2) National Training and Manpower Development.
- (3) National Research and Development.
- (4) Home and International Relations.

Ibadan Zone Gets Set For The Quarter

Programme Galore For Listeners' Enjoyments

THE introduction of Igala, Urhobo, and Edo languages to supplement the existing Yoruba and English languages on the FRN Ibadan Programme Schedule has been received with much excitement by the listeners in that tonal area.

To the average listener, the rationale behind it all might not be too clear. But the simple explanation is that it was all brought about by the creation of Zonal areas under the re-organisation of the Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation which metamorphosed into the Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria.

Ibadan Zone now beams out to listeners 20 minutes of up-to-date news to each of the Edo, Igala, Urhobo and Yoruba communities daily except on Sundays and 10 minutes of English News Bulletin compiled in our Newsroom come up at 6.00 a.m., 1.00 p.m., 3.00 p.m. and 8.00 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays with the addition of News Parade, our half-hour news magazine, from 7.00 p.m. - 7.30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

Other news features are Political Round-Up on Saturdays at 8.15 p.m. and Focus, a discussion programme on Current Affairs broadcast also on Saturdays at 9.30 p.m. Perhaps the Party Political Broadcasts could well be grouped along with News programmes. They are on the air at the scheduled times in English at 8.30 p.m. with repeats at 6.30 the following morning on same weeks, alternating with translations of the English version into Edo, Igala, Urhobo and Yoruba following immediately after the News in these languages.

News apart, spread through the week are a spectrum of programmes Magazines, Features, Talks Variety and Light Entertainment, Public Enlightenment.

Our Edo listeners have the privilege of listening to and enjoying their magazine, Itie Edohia, every Thursday at 9.30 p.m. and every Monday 11.30 a.m. And for thought provoking and enlightening philosophy, Ekharo is on the air at 8.20 a.m. on Mondays and 8.15 a.m. on Tuesdays Fridays and Saturdays.

For our Igala listeners every Sunday at 11.00 a.m. just when you are back from the service, Ukola Wewe, a mixed grill magazine, comes on the air for your enjoyment. This is repeated on Tuesdays at 10.30 p.m. And what is more, our Igala listeners are welcome to send in record requests for their friends and loved ones which we would only be too pleased to play for them in Ugwaalu broadcast every Monday at 4.15 p.m. and every Wednesday at 5.15 p.m.

Eharawodiote is our magazine programme for all Urhobos. It takes the air on Wednesdays at 6.15 p.m. and comprises varied items like talks, music, tit-bits, ideas for a healthy and happy home and what-have-you! The Urhobos too can join us in a storytelling session on Tuesdays at 9.45 p.m. The title of this programme is Osi. There are 2 Request programmes in the week for our Urhobo listeners: Eweewu is on Tuesday at 4.25 p.m. and Eharuyere takes its turn on Thursdays at 6.15 p.m.

Yoruba-speaking listeners are probably already familiar with 'E nle nfun O'. For those not already in the know, let me re-state that Yoruba magazine is broadcast every Sunday at 3.30 p.m. and is repeated on Thursdays at 5.30 p.m.

'Agbe Onije Amodun' is another magazine in the line of OFN. This is a 'Must' for all farmers who are keen to maximize the yield on their farms. 'Agbe . . .' is broadcast every Friday at 6.15 p.m. with a repeat the following day at 8.30 p.m.

Still on OFF: our comedy series on farming, OBA L'OKELE, at 2.30 p.m. on Sundays and 7.30 p.m. on Tuesday is as informative as it is amusing.

Feyikogbon is a Drama production which is broadcast every Sunday at 11.30 a.m. And Ogbon Ologbon, in which elderly citizens recount memories of yester-years, is on the air every Wednesday at 9.30 p.m. and is repeated on Saturday at 10.30 p.m.

Atewolabala focuses on Yoruba customs which seem to be dying out, at 10.15 p.m. on Wednesdays whilst Ewe Oye features ceremonies connected with the award of Yoruba chieftaincy titles on Tuesdays at 9.45 and Wednesdays at 6.45 p.m.

Our Women and Children are never left behind in our programme planning as evidenced by Iyaniwura and Jengboran which are specially designed for housewives and their children. 'Iyaniwura' is a treasure trove of ideas for all Yoruba housewives and is broadcast on Wednesdays at 7.30 p.m. The repeat, of course, is at 12.30 the following day. Jengboran, the children's programme, takes the air at 8.45 on Monday morning, with repeat at 8.45 on Saturday morning when all children are at home.

Now to our English language Programmes. Two of our programmes designed to stimulate political awareness are Document of Hope at 8.30

p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays while People and Politics is at 8.30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. But of course in 'Dear Sir,' experts supply answers to questions on any topic posed by listeners. 'Dear Sir' takes the air at 8.30 p.m. on Fridays and at 8.30 a.m. on Saturdays. Other special broadcasts in English include Government at Grassroots on Sunday at 5.00 p.m. This programme highlights activities of Local governments in our zone, whilst progress Report focuses on specific areas of our development. That's at 9.00 a.m. on Sundays. Feminine Fair, our weekly women's magazine, is on Monday at 7.30 p.m. and Saturday at 11.15 a.m.

And in a much lighter vein, random thoughts which are usually quite revealing take the air at 8.15 a.m. on Sunday and 3.50 p.m. on Fridays. The 'Way I see it' and "Candid Theatre" our social drama series comes up at 8.45 p.m. on Wednesdays and at 10.30 p.m. on Thursdays. We also have regular sports for religious programmes in English and Yoruba for Muslims and in English, Yoruba, Edo and Urhobo for Christians.

And if you'd like to enjoy a kaleidoscope of indigenous music of the people of this zone, then FRCN Ibadan on 575 KHZ and 657 KHZ are the right spots on your radio dial.

How about this line-up for quality and variety! Cards Carnival at 12 noon on Sundays, Request Time at 6.15 p.m. on Tuesdays and How go dey go at 2 p.m. on Saturdays. These are all record request programmes. On Mondays the FRCN Choir takes the air at 9.45 p.m. and on Saturdays at 7.30 p.m. it's the turn of The Nigeria Police Band presenting "Sounds like The Police." And as for indigenous music in Edo, Igala, Urhobo and Yoruba, this is well catered for.

What is more, all these various and varied programmes offer every listener an opportunity to participate in our programmes.

ISLAM AND THE BROTHERHOOD OF MAN

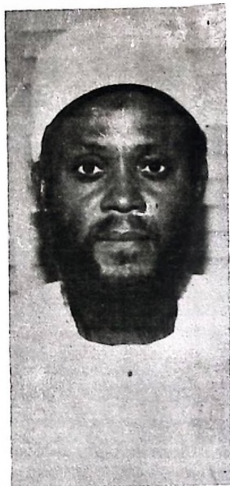
DO you know that the muslim daily congregational prayer provides a tremendous stimulus to the idea of brotherhood of man. For the muslim everyday is a prayer day; no day is especially set apart for worship without business and some days of business without prayer— this is contrary to a muslim's way of life.

Hence he responds so readily to the call to prayer on Friday afternoon without much ado. Islam as a way of life stresses the overall importance of salat as an essential part of everyday life of a man. Prayer is the first daily work of a muslim and it is also his last work of the day.

A muslim rises early from his bed for the dawn prayer. There is another prayer just after midday, a third in the afternoon, *asr*, a fourth at sunset, *magrib*, and a fifth before going to bed. The purpose is that the spirit of a muslim should, in all the varying conditions through which he has to pass, be in touch with the divine spirit.

Even when busiest he should still be able to disengage himself from all the worldly occupation for a short while so that he could bow down to his Lord in prayer. A man should feel the divine presence under all conditions whether he is on the farm, in the factory, shop, or in the office. God should be uppermost in his heart. By so doing prayer becomes an interminable service of enery to a muslim.

We learn from Islamic history that the followers of prophet Muhammed were so regular in prayer that they missed no prayer even in the battle field. Congregational prayer established a unique discipline in their domestic affairs in society and in the government. Such was the result of the discipline taught by the daily prayer.

Perhaps the most striking characteristic of muslim congregational prayer is equality. When the faithful assemble for prayer there is no difference of rich or poor, white or black. All stand shoulder-to-shoulder in rows led by an imam.

This inspires a lasting spirit of brotherhood among the muslims. Indeed it was that sense of equality that led the followers of the prophet in his days to a unity which created a universal sense of brotherhood and immortal love for each other.

They were ready to meet and fight a hundred enemies together. They lived only to follow the WILL of God

and to fight for His cause. They cared not for wealth or for status.

Prophet Muhammad set us a good example when he appointed Bilal the Mosque's first official for giving the call to salat. He was an Ethiopian. Steadfast in faith, he suffered considerable tortures in the hands of the unbelievers of Mecca.

It was neither colour nor appearance that was looked for, but it was faith of a very high order, unshakable by storm or cyclone that was the criterion. That was why colour or race prejudice never raised its ugly head in the world of Islam.

If we consider the simplicity of the teachings of Islam we cannot feel that it has the power of conquering the soul by its intrinsic appeal to human reason.

Just consider the inescapable truth of unity, the common symbol of focus when the muslims are at prayer, represented by the Qibla at Mecca. Everyday muslims of every locality meet as brothers in the local mosques; again on Friday the faithful from various adjacent localities come together for the *Jumat Service*. At *Eid-el-Fitr* muslims from many districts, assemble for congregational prayer.

Every year Islam ordains the gathering of believers of all nations and languages from all parts of the world to pray in the sacred Ka'ba towards which their faces are set in every hour of private worship in their distant homes. This annual convention makes a lasting impression on the minds of the faithful; it enables them to feel a sense of their common life and of brotherhood in the bonds of faith. It presents a living manifestation of the unity of all men and their fraternity under one God.

Health Problems Of World's Children

FROM the last discussion it is already clear that the differences in infant and childhood mortality between developing and developed countries are not just in the levels of mortality but also in the leading causes of death.

The overwhelming importance of diarrhoeal disease and respiratory infections as a cause of death throughout childhood in the developing countries, is obvious, closely followed by communicable — and preventable — diseases such as whooping cough and measles.

After the age of five years, accidents of all kinds, including household and traffic accidents, also become important. In the developed countries, deaths from infections are quite rare, especially after the first few years of life, while accidents become the leading cause of death from the age of one year.

The remaining causes listed as important represent conditions which are not easy to prevent or to cure such as congenital anomalies, neoplasms and heart disease. Naturally, these conditions also affect children in developing countries, but their relative importance is overshadowed by the infections.

In the most developed countries, the infant and perinatal mortality rate has continued to decline during the past decades, due to improved obstetric and perinatal technologies and, especially, to a more widespread availability of these technologies. There are, however, still considerable differentials in infant and perinatal mortality according to socio-economic status in many developed countries.

Deaths of infants and of their mothers may be the most dramatic consequence of ill health, but there are other serious consequences which affect the child and, indeed, may follow it throughout adult life.

The damage done by infections and associated malnutrition to a young child in its formative years is manifested in retarded physical growth and mental development,

which it may never be able to catch up on, thus impairing the potential for a full and active adult life.

Poverty, ignorance and ill health thus create a vicious cycle spanning from one generation to the next, and from which the individual has little chance of escape.

A striking expression of this generation link is the frequency of "low birth weight" (LBW) babies, i.e. babies weighing less than 2500 grams at birth. It is now known that this frequency is closely determined by the same adverse maternal and environmental factors which determine the level of perinatal mortality, in particular the nutritional status of the mother.

About 21 million LBW (small for date) babies are born each year, the greatest majority of them in developing countries. The observed incidence rate ranges from about 4% in the most developed countries to over 30% in some poor rural populations.

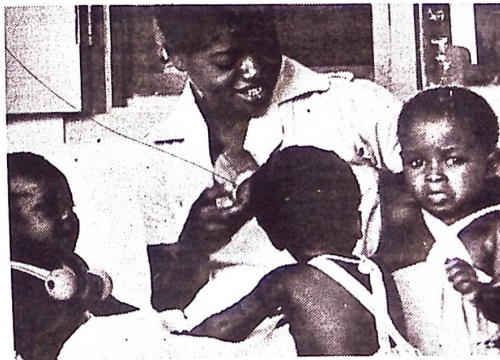
It is also known that LBW is the single most important factor determining the survival chances of the child. The infant mortality rate is about 20 times greater for all LBW

babies than for other babies, but the lower the birth weight the lower is the survival chance.

For these reasons, it is increasingly realized that the simple measures of birth weight and — during childhood — of height and weight provide very sensitive and reliable indicators of the health status of the child population. Not only are the data easier to collect than data on infant mortality, but the very process of collecting them, i.e. the regular weighing of all children, provides warning signals, leading to timely preventive action for the individual child and for the community.

From the above statements about the health problems of the world's children it is evident that no specific health programme and no single set of actions can remedy these problems. The real "iceberg" of which excessive infant mortality is but one visible tip consists of poverty, hunger, ignorance and other socio-economic ills and can be successfully tackled only through a broad development programme directed at the roots of these ills.

THE U.P.E. SCHEME

—Community Can Help

IN addition to engaging in enlightenment campaigns to educate members of the public on the importance of the Universal Primary Education (UPE) Scheme, the task force which comprises traditional rulers and local government councillors will also organise the people to build classrooms, and teachers' accommodation through communal efforts.

The decision to involve the community in the construction of classrooms blocks is understandable. All over the country, many children cannot be admitted into primary institutions because of a shortage of classroom accommodation. In fact, in some places, teachers conduct classes in emergency shelters. There is also the problem of accommodation for teachers giving rise to a situation where many of them live far from their schools.

This situation has arisen because some contractors handling UPE buildings have fallen short of expectation by failing to complete them on time. There is also the story on the part of contractors who complained of not being paid. So, by planning to involve members of the public in the construction of classrooms and staff accommodation, the Kaduna State Government is trying to remove one of the serious problems which can retard educational progress.

With regard to the enlightenment aspect of the job of the task force, this is very necessary because although the UPE is expected to become compulsory soon, many parents or guardians are still to understand the importance of formal education. Consequently, they have not taken advantage of the UPE scheme to send their children or wards to school since the scheme was made nation-wide by the Federal Government in 1976.

This is because they believe that it is better for them to use their children and wards to assist them on their

farms and in their business. Such parents also feel that their attitude is right because many of the rich people in the county are without formal education.

The importance of formal education for the youth and the nation cannot be over-emphasised. If children in the country complete primary school course at least, this will help towards

the eradication of illiteracy. It will create a society where people understand their rights and the importance of patriotism. If a majority of the people are educated as time goes on, there will be a reduction in the dependence on foreign manpower. This will, in turn, lead to some financial advantage since a lot of money spent in acquiring foreign labour will be conserved.

The necessity for education becomes glaring in many situations including one where people go to the polls. The citizens need some knowledge of politics to enable them vote for the right candidates.

The use of traditional rulers and councillors in the task force will ensure that all the people, especially those who did not register for the UPE Scheme, are inspired to action. The Emirs and local government councillors are in a better position to explain the aims of the government in the UPE Scheme to the people. This is because they understand their people and are closer to them.

The setting up of the task force by Kaduna State Government to mobilise support and publicity for the UPE Scheme is an example of the type of steps that government at the grass-roots level can take to promote progress on issues of national importance in Nigeria.

WAR ON ARMED ROBBERY

-New Offensive To Curb Lawless Elements

THE wave of armed robbery in Lagos area, has reached such an alarming stage that hardly a day passes without one report of the crime in any of the newspapers. In realisation of the seriousness of the situation and in response to public outcry, the Lagos State Police Command has mapped out new strategy to bring the situation under control.

Apart from the establishment's equipment night patrols are to be intensified. Added to these is the establishment of police check-points on all roads entering the state, and at strategic locations within the State.

This new move is reminiscent of the civil war days and the period of national emergency when people leaving or entering Lagos were being screened for security reasons. Throughout the country people have come to reorganise their social activities in such a way as to avoid being caught out late at night when the robbers are usually most active. In particular, Lagos, because of its unique position and development has become the centre for increased armed robbery activities. The highways which connect the city to other parts of the country have formed the main theatres of operation for bandits because the routes offer easy means of escaping either to the rural areas or across the border into neighbouring states.

In fact, most Nigerians are so worried by the activities of these

notorious men of the underworld that any step taken to eliminate armed robbery is warmly welcome. And this is why the announcement of a new strategy against armed robbery by the Police has come as a relief.

The basic objective of the planned road check operation is to enable police authorities to monitor the movement of armed robbers. For this purpose, a special squad has been set up to act as a Task Force for locating, identifying, studying and smashing rings of armed robbers. This is complementary to the Robbery Squad of the State CID.

Since prevention is better than cure each Divisional Police Officer is to ensure that all possible measures are

adopted to prevent the commission of the crime.

There is no doubt that the present Police exercise will create a number of problems such as traffic hold-up, but such sacrifice is worthwhile in the interest of our security. At the same time, a sufficient number of officers should be deployed to carry out the checking which should be thorough and efficient. The assistance from the military and other members of the Armed Forces in carrying out this exercise should be considered.

On the actual process of checking, the Police should examine the vehicle plate number and compare it with the numbers which owners usually print on their windscreens and other parts of the car. Arrangement should also be made with the Licensing Authorities not to reserve numbers for vehicles before they are purchased. Such concessions are known to have been abused by unscrupulous people who use the numbers on stolen vehicles to escape the Police. It should, now be insisted upon that before any number is issued for a vehicle, it must be physically brought to the Licensing Office for verification.

There would be the need to step-up highway patrols which will support the operations of the officers at check-points and at the same time prevent the armed robbers from carrying out their atrocities away from the check-points. High-way patrols will also take care of the feeder roads which lead to the expressways since these serve as striking bases and escape routes for armed robbers.

Vital information about suspected robbers, their hide-outs and indeed, any suspicious movement should be given to the Police by members of the public.

Certainly, if people can organise themselves to assist law enforcement agents the fight against armed robbery in our society would be won in a short time.

MOVE TO IMPROVE P&T SERVICES

THE concept of integrated national development dictates that substantial efforts must be made to improve such infrastructure as water, electricity, transport facilities as well as post and telecommunications, all at the same time. The reason for this is that poor performance of one of these, directly or indirectly affects the efficiency and effectiveness of the others. Consequently, there is a slowing down of the process of overall national economic growth.

This explains why successive national development plans have been drawn up to ensure that sufficient attention is paid to simultaneous development of essential services.

While a fair amount of progress has been recorded in the provision of many of such services, it has been observed that the Post and Telecommunications Department (P & T) has lagged behind in modernising and expanding its facilities. It has not been able to cope with the rapidly growing industrial, commercial and administrative sectors of our economy.

To better appreciate the dimension of the problem on the average, there should be at least one telephone to every one hundred people. In Nigeria, there is a telephone to nearly seven hundred people. Even with this inadequate number of telephones, the question always is how many of the

lines we have can work at any given point in time? Again, the Universal Postal Union considers that for every six thousand people in developing countries, there must be one postal establishment. In this regard, as many as forty thousand Nigerians share the services of one postal establishment.

On many occasions, efforts have been made by the Government and private institutions to get to the root of the problems facing the P & T. One thing that has been found out is that in any given plan period, the amount spent on post and telecommunications projects is usually much less than what is originally allocated. During the first plan period, 1962 - 68, only forty five percent of the amount set aside was spent. Also, by the end of the

second plan period, the amount spent on post and telecommunications projects was less than half of what was proposed.

The result, therefore, is that the P and T has not been acquiring enough facilities that would expand the number of telephone and telex line in a way to make the lines work and create efficient postal services for the country.

Other problems identified in the operations of the P and T include shortage of local high and middle level manpower, leading to considerable dependence of foreign hands.

Even during the current plan period it is feared that the department may not meet many of its targets judging by the slow pace of progress being recorded by its contractors. Hence, the decision by the Federal Government to take a number of steps to revitalise the operations of the P and T.

Already, the government is determined to remove the department's financial constraints by immediately making the sum of two hundred million naira available to it. In addition, a task force headed by a permanent secretary has been set up to closely watch the execution of the post and telecommunications projects in order to achieve concrete results within a short time.

For one thing, it has been argued that if it is possible for people to call their relatives, friends and business partners on the phone at will, then many city and long distance trips would be unnecessary in a way, this could help ease the chaotic traffic situation in our urban centres. Furthermore, a dependable telecommunications system is an important weapon in crime detection and prevention, since those in distress can dial the police number and receive instant help.

This is why the people of this country interested in the operations of the P and T and what the government plans to do to improve the services of the department.

Decree for Peaceful Electioneering

—TIMELY AND IDEAL

Some acts of disorder have been reported at party political campaigns in the country since the ban on politics was lifted last September. And as the political campaigns are being stepped up, the new law to ensure peaceful electioneering campaigns has come at the right time.

No one would want a repetition of political violence, arson and killing which preceded and followed the elections of the 1960's.

In order to avoid a recurrence of such events, the decree issued in February provides that any person who wants to convene a meeting in any public place will first apply for a licence from the Military Administrator not less than forty-eight hours before the scheduled time. Besides, forwarding an application for licence does not imply its automatic approval because the administrator needs time to satisfy himself that the gathering is not likely to give rise to a breach of the peace. The penalty of contravening this law is two thousand naira or imprisonment for 12 months or both, for any first offender.

The fact that a second or subsequent conviction carries the penalty of 12 months imprisonment without the option of a fine reflects Government's determination to check effectively all acts of lawlessness by political party enthusiasts.

Another aspect of the law deals with persons who aid and abet such disorderly behaviour. For example, it holds any person who takes part in the control and training of party thugs guilty of an offence.

Only last December, in order to forestall politics of bitterness, the leaders of the five political parties in the country reached an accord with the Chief of Staff, Supreme Headquarters, for peaceful electioneering campaigns. The outcome of this accord was the Dodan Barracks Declaration in which the Party Chiefs pledge to give responsible leadership to their followers.

They promised to work for the highest standard of behaviour among their supporters and, by example, to curb the excesses of their party members.

Given the hardship that many suffered as a result of our crisis and the Civil War, one would understand why every effort should be made to eliminate violence and thuggery from the political scene in this country.

The need for peace and stability cannot be overstressed. No good government would fold its arms and wait

for danger alarm before taking necessary steps to pre-empt the actions of party supporters in order to save the nation, especially the common man, from the agonies of an upheaval that crude and uncontrolled, politicking might result in.

Already, Electoral Commissioners have been doing a good job in trying to educate the people about the coming elections. A public enlightenment unit has in fact been created by FEDECO.

The effort of the FEDECO in this direction is desirable because it will not only make people aware of their civic and political responsibilities but will also remove distrust and suspicion resulting from the gap in information processing.

It is the hope that with the effort to discourage thuggery and malpractices by the authorities, political party supporters will appreciate the need to be well behaved. Those who refuse to be orderly will only be inviting trouble for themselves.

Local Raw Materials in Brewing

-How Feasible Are They?

It has long been felt that some raw materials are available in this country which could be utilized by the brewing industry. There are, for example, sorghum, rice, maize, millet, yam and cassava.

The anxiety over this matter has been heightened by the fact that, in the past few months some Nigerian universities and research institutions have announced discoveries related to brewing beer with sorghum and cassava. That the breweries have not responded to those findings with surprise by many who cannot understand why the breweries have continued to depend solely on imported barley for producing beer.

In fact, at a seminar in Lagos it was unanimously agreed that the local raw materials were adapted and should be utilized subject, of course, to certain conditions. One of those is the availability locally, in commercial quantity of these products.

At this point, it may be appropriate to look at the prospects of using local sorghum, rice, maize, millet as well as yam and cassava in beer brewing in Nigeria.

First, sorghum, is widely grown in the country. Average national yield is about one metric ton per hectare and it is known that about one million hectares of land is cultivated with sorghum. Research to boost the production of sorghum has been in progress at the Ahmadu Bello University. It's Institute for Agricultural Research has developed some varieties which give up to three and a half metric tons of sorghum per hectare as against the current national yield of one metric ton.

Millet is another possible commodity considered suitable for brewing beer but it is disqualified on the technical ground that it has high oil content and this makes it even inferior to sorghum.

There are other reasons, and very crucial ones, too, why these local cereals cannot be easily utilized in the country's beer brewing industry. First and foremost, the prices are somewhat high as compared with cost of imported barley. Sorghum and millet, for instance, cost about N290 per tonne; maize N350 per tonne and rice, N600 per tonne. Yam and cassava tubers are equally suitable materials for brewing beer but they are also expensive.

Another reality of the situation is that rice, maize, millet, sorghum, yam and cassava are in short supply. In 1977, for instance, local production of rice was about 600,000 metric tons while some 400,000 metric tons was imported to meet total national consumption. The supply of maize lags so

much behind demand that some live-stock manufacturing industries in the country have been forced to shut down. Part of the effort to boost local production of maize and rice has led to the recent grant of ten million Naira to the Mokwa Project near Bida, in Niger State, by the Nigerian Agricultural Brewing Industry, and Co-operative Bank.

Furthermore, maize, rice millet, yam and cassava are all staple foods in this country. This means that if the brewing industry has to base production on these raw materials the supply position is bound to worsen. There will be neither enough to feed the people nor enough to guarantee continuity of supply for the breweries.

In the circumstance, it is advisable that the breweries, in the country working under the auspices of the Brewers' Association of Nigeria, should collaborate with the Nigerian Science and Technology Development Agency, which is the national body for the promotion of scientific research in the country. The collective research effort will either ensure that ideal conditions are developed for local growing of barley or that the production of local cereals and tubers can be stepped up to feed the people and at the same time, cater for the brewing industry. The benefits would be enormous.

Our foreign exchange expenditure on importation of barley which is estimated at four million Naira annually, would be saved. In addition, local availability of raw materials would be given a boost as an agro-based industry.

VIGILANCE!

-The Need For National Awareness

THERE are reasons why some elements abroad appear to be ill at ease about Nigeria's continued progress and stability. The country's foreign policy, especially her firm stand on all African issues and her internal, political and other programmes are apparently contrary to the wishes of certain foreign interests. Some developments can be seen as clear pointers to their attitude.

Recently, a total of eleven ships were detected to have entered the country ahead of schedule. Two of them had no entry permit. A number of foreign commercial vessels had earlier done the same thing.

Because of these developments it is only logical to conclude that external saboteurs, possibly in collusion with agents within, are up to their relentless game of finding ways and means of undermining the nation's economy. How else can one explain their latest antics.

As far back as 1975, the Federal Government had promulgated a decree controlling the arrival of ships in Nigerian Ports. Under it, any vessel bringing goods to this country must get clearance and obtain entry permit before leaving for our shores. Such a measure had to be introduced to bring sanity to our ports.

During the congestion of the ports which reached alarming proportions in 1975, ship-owners made thousands of Naira through demurrage paid by Nigeria for their staying in our shores while awaiting their turn to berth. It was a lucrative business for them they received easy money for doing nothing.

Since the law against arbitrary entry into our ports was passed, ship-owners had behaved well until late. The question of being ignorant of the law does not therefore arise. Why then have they decided to violate the decree controlling the movement of their ships?

It is interesting that those who tried to spread the false story of rampant acts of piracy on Nigeria's territorial waters, are now, so soon after that propaganda, illegally trying to flood this country with their ships. That puts the lie to their piracy story which in itself came after the Federal Government discovered underground foreign exchange transactions.

The Government promptly took stern measures to combat the foreign exchange drain which posed a serious threat to the country's financial position. Since the loopholes in this area have been blocked, it is only natural that foreign saboteurs would look for other avenues to undermine our economy in the continued demonstration of their displeasure at the

indigenisation programme in particular.

The foreign ships now coming into Nigeria in disregard of the law do so in order to blackmail the Federal Government and paint a bad image for the country. It is hard to believe that a good number of such foreign ships can arrive independently in Nigeria within a space of two weeks, without conspiracy.

A possibility is that the plan was to have many ships in Nigeria which would later refuse to go until they discharged their cargo, in spite of the entry clause which prohibits them from our territorial waters without previous permission. When such a situation arises, then an international campaign by ship-owners to get Nigeria to pay demurrage may be embarked upon and failing that a call for the boycott of our ports may be mounted.

Some people outside this country must have reckoned that with the progressive policies of the present administration, Nigeria will not tolerate a reactionary civilian successor regime. The only way to ensure that there is room for foreign interference is to sabotage our economy and create political instability.

The imperialists and their collaborators have never been free from anxiety since 1975 when the present administration came into power. The patriotic efforts to make us control the commanding heights of our economy and a foreign policy which undermines their interests have been greatly unsettling to the racists, the neo-colonialists and their agents, the multi-National Corporations.

The military authorities have in so many ways demonstrated that they will honour their pledge to leave the political scene next year. Enemies within and without must therefore not be allowed to sabotage this country's efforts towards true economic emancipation and political stability. Consequently, it devolves on every Nigerian to be alert, and ready to expose the machinations of detractors. As they say: the price of liberty is eternal vigilance.

The Union Bank of Nigeria

IT is now almost one year since the Federal Government ordered the withdrawal of all public funds from the Barclays Bank. The step was a follow-up to a statement published by the Barclays Bank International in London in connection with its operations in apartheid South Africa.

In it, the bank stressed that it would continue its commercial activities in South Africa in spite of mounting world criticisms. That statement betrayed the attitude of the bank to racism. And the Federal Government's prompt action was widely acclaimed. One year is not much time. A trend is already clear and that is the Barclays Bank International has begun to disintegrate at least in Nigeria.

The name Barclays Bank is no longer to exist in this country. When Government instructed the withdrawal of public funds, from the bank, not only did all government offices comply with the instruction, but there was a general support for the order from the people.

The spontaneous public reaction was a clear indication that the government's order was very popular. The main target of the action was the Barclays Bank in London whose profit would fall considerably. This was reflected in the London stock Market report when there was mass withdrawal of money from the Barclays Bank in Nigeria.

One school of thought felt Barclays Bank in Nigeria should be nationalised. But then one cannot compromise nationalisation with our declared policy made in 1975 that the Government had no plan to nationalise any industry. It is in keeping with this policy that the Government refused to nationalise the Bank.

Nationalisation will only take place when the activities of any industry jeopardises the security of the nation, while the bank is grappling with the problem created by mass withdrawal, its Board members came up with ideas designed to safeguard the operations of the bank in this country.

One of such ideas resulted in the sponsorship of the film titled 'Roots' which has raised some doubts as to the real motive behind the bank's action. The reaction of the people as expressed in the Mass Media has been generally one of indigenisation at the decision of the bank to sponsor this film at this time. The bank perhaps has read the hand-writing on the wall and is modifying its stand.

First, the Barclays Bank Nigeria Limited condemned racism and refused any sympathy with Barclays Inter-

national in London in connection with dealings with apartheid South Africa. And only recently the Bank made a major announcement to break its links with the Barclays International of London.

As a result of a merger with ICON Limited, who are Merchant Bankers, Barclays Bank Nigeria now exists in a new form - the Union Bank of Nigeria Limited. Already the Federal Government owns 52% of the shares in the Bank. Participation by the public is to rise to 28% bringing Nigerian interest up to eighty percent. This is a welcome development.

One thing should be ensured in this transformation process. There should be a drastic cut-down in the expatriate strength of the bank. Nigerians should be given greater responsibility in its top management activities. The Government should ensure that the Bank does not make its Nigerian top executives sacrificial lamb during the implementation of the new arrangement. Besides, the Nigerian members of the Board of the bank should be patriotic men of proven dedication to national cause.

The disappearance of Barclays Bank in the commercial arena of this country should go down as a major achievement by the Military regime in the crusade against racism. It is world opinion that apartheid is evil. If not, how then could one explain a system of government based on race inequality, segregation, injustice, exploitation, hatred, torture and systematic extermination of the blackman. Since Barclays International has become synonymous with apartheid, its exit from Nigeria is good riddance.

The Union Bank of Nigeria is Nigerian and it must identify itself with the aspirations of Nigerians.

MOTERING WITHOUT TEARS

—Means Of Ensuring Passengers' Safety

SINCE the beginning of this year, every day has had its record of road accidents, some resulting in deaths or serious injuries to travellers. Three of such accidents are still fresh in our minds. One was at Yaba, in which 18 people were burnt to death in a bus. Another was at Oyo town, which claimed the lives of eight school children. And there was the third in Bendel State, in which 11 people were killed and 34 others injured.

Before now, road accidents had been blamed partly on the bad state of roads. But the situation has since changed with the construction of new networks of roads that compare favourably with those in other parts in the world.

It then means that there are other factors which are responsible for the increasing rate of road accidents in the country. Two of such factors are poor structural design of most passenger vehicles and the attitude of the driver to his work while at the

wheels.

It is frustrating to observe that a number of our locally constructed buses and mini-buses, are not provided with fire-fighting equipment. Some of these vehicles do not even provide emergency exit for their passengers. In some cases, seat provided in the buses are so uncomfortable that passengers would prefer to remain standing. There are obvious instances of over-loading of buses

with passengers. Added to this is the lack of proper regular mechanical maintenance of the vehicles and the use of worn-out tyres.

In that case, one would expect our traffic wardens and police to focus more attention on seeing that passenger vehicle owners satisfy the requirements of the law before their buses are allowed on our roads.

The provision of emergency exit at the rear of a bus should be emphasised to all owners. Since the exit and entry doors are normally on the right side of the passenger vehicle, emergency exit doors could also be fixed on the left side to make escape easier for passengers in cases of unexpected mishaps.

Our traffic men should continue to ensure that passengers are not squeezed into a bus. This will facilitate movement for escape in the event of any accident.

The role of the driver to ensure an accident-free operation is another very vital issue to the safety of passengers. Over-speeding, dangerous over-taking and flagrant disregard for traffic signs as well as driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs are part of what have been repeatedly identified as other causes of road accidents.

Apart from the efforts being made at annual road safety weeks to educate motorists on the proper use of the highways in order to prevent accidents, there is the need for the Driver's Union and Transport Owners Association to organise similar programmes to achieve the same objective.

If drivers of both private and public commercial vehicles keep strictly to the rules of road safety, the work of the Highway Patrol team would become easier.

The watchword of any driver should be the safety of life and property on the highways.
