# **Chapter** one

#### ILU-OKE DAY

lu-Oke, a small rustic village, 15Kilometres from Ayowole, the local government headquarters of Adun, every November, attracts huge number of guests from far and near, to the Ilu-Oke Day Celebration. The exhilarating rich culture of the people of Ilu-Oke displayed at the event,

largely accounts for the influx of people in to the village during this period. Also, the avenue the Ilu- Oke Day celebration provides for old long-lost friends to reconnect again, contributes to the reason why people throng to the village, in spite the bad roads that leads to Ilu- Oke.

The annual event which attracts top dignitaries like; Government officials, Traditional Leaders, Politicians, Clerics and Business Men ensures that the guests depart Ilu-Oke fully thrilled. The event is a spectacle to behold, little wonder the guests long for it every year and also prepare for the event in advance.

The first point of attraction at the Ilu-Oke Day Celebration is the ostensible; colourful, and beautiful artistic designs, which expresses the rich culture of Ilu-Oke that adorns the venue.

It is followed by thrilling activities like cultural dance, Panegyrics rendition and Beauty pageant. While the Traditional Wrestling, Ayo game and the Agriculture fair completes the full list of the entertainment menu for the event. The alluring serene atmosphere at Ilu-Oke, combined with the canopies, which provides air of receptive festivity, also complements the celebration.

However, of all the activities on parade that day, the Agriculture fair stands out amongst the others. The atmosphere created by the Agriculture fair is always a tumultuous one. The audience shove themselves to catch a better glimpse of the massive farm produces like Yam; Cassava, Cocoa Yam, Cocoa, and Kola nuts on display. Some of them capture these humongous crops on their cameras.

The size of the crops presented at the event like tubers of Yam ranges from 20-21m in length and 18 to 19cm high; Oranges as large as a size 5 football, Cocoa twice the size of the oranges. Equally, massive kola nuts made of white and red colours presented at the event, are broken in to pieces with the aid of a cutlass due to their sizes, before they are shared amongst the guests at the event.

The highpoint of the Agriculture fair is the presentation of the award of the best farmer of the year. The award attracts a cash price, new farm tools and a certificate from the organisers. It also comes with a garland placed on the neck of the recipient. In addition, the winner is carried shoulder high by the farmers, amid praises sang in his honour.

One man, Atanda Adeoye, a very industrious farmer, though believed by his colleagues to have been sanctified by the deity of Agriculture, (Orisha Oko) has literally turned the grand prize to his birth right. Since the inception of the Agriculture fair, Atanda has always emerged the best farmer, as well as consistently break old records and set new ones. His knack for producing incredible crops remains legendary. The sizes of his crops are usually twice bigger than what other farmers' presents at the show.

These feats did not go unnoticed, as it suddenly turned Atanda in to a village hero, loved and respected by both the old and the youths. Atanda was also loved in other villages that borders Ilu-Oke because of his other sterling qualities like humility, honesty, magnanimity, patriotism etc.

Likewise, Atanda's exploits, also created troubles for him. Especially from the one that rarely pulls his bottom off the chair in his compound. In fact, the chair must have be wondering where the boss has gone to".

Atanda's joke did not amuse Olapade as the earlier encounter with Afuye still left him seething with anger, and it clearly reflected in his countenance. A closer observation revealed to Atanda that Olapade looked unhappy . He probed to find out what the matter was by asking, "Olapade, I observed you are not happy over something. I cracked a joke about how inseparable you and your favourite chair have become, yet you did not laugh. What is it? Why not share it with me, maybe I could be of help to you".

In recognition of Atanda's feat in farming, and also the fame he had brought to Ilu-Oke, the Atona of Ilu-Oke honoured Atanda with the title, Oba Awon Agbe Agbaye (King of Farmers World-Wide). On the night of the third day of the fasting, which coincidentally, was the night Afuye and his evil group chose to strike, Atanda had a dream. In the dream, strange things occurred at Ilu-Oke. Atanda heard eerie sounds made in the night by unknown creatures, and also sudden deaths of domestic animals in virtually all households in the village. He also saw the turning of day in to night, and unexplainable sudden drought of streams. Atanda woke up terrified, picked his Bible and read some verses of Psalms. He also prayed fervently for three hours concerning the strange dreams before going to bed.

While Atanda was praying in the night, a figurine was sent to attack him by Akogun, the man picked by Afuye's evil group to carry out the assignment on behalf of them after chanting incantations as instructed by Alawo Ika. But unfortunately for Akogun and his members, it boomeranged as Akogun suddenly shouted, slumped and died before help could come his way.

His wife and children rushed to his room when they heard his voice but met his lifeless body on the ground. By dawn, the news of his demise has gone round the village.

The next day, as early as 7 a.m., mourners had gathered in his house to condole with his family. Afuye, though in shock and utter disbelief, managed to visit the family of Akogun, his late friend and partner in evil acts to express his condolences to them.

Immediately the news of Akogun's death got to Atanda while working in his farm, he left what he was doing and quickly proceeded to his house to prepare to join the other villagers already gathered at the late Akogun's house. But, just as he was about to depart his house, Seun Ojo - Atanda's pastor entered his house.

He stated, "Brother Atanda, the lord has given you victory over one of your enemies. Last night while I was praying, I saw you in a battle with a scary creature and I joined in the battle with you. Am happy the lord gave you victory over the wicked one. You need to watch and pray always".

Atanda corroborated the assertion of the Pastor and told him about the battle he was facing and the steps they have taken as a family spiritually to fight their battles. The Pastor noted that Atanda should have brought it to his notice and that of the Prayer Warrior group in the church. He warned Atanda not to visit the family of the deceased that day as his enemies could still be lurking around to attack him. Instead, he advised Atanda to visit there the second day.

It was awkward for him; the village hero to agree with the Pastor's idea to visit the second day after everybody would have finished commiserating with the family of the late Akogun . But after thinking about it for few hours, he decided to listen to the voice of reasoning, as he argued in his mind that the Pastor may be right after all.

He thanked the Pastor for his advice and also for helping him secure victory over last night's attack. He also appreciated the Pastor for visiting him and his family.

After Atanda finished thanking Pastor Seun for his visit, the Cleric in a very low voice, dropped a bombshell! "Brother Atanda, this is the beginning of your battle to achieve your dreams. More attacks will come but none shall overcome you. With your own eyes you shall see the end of your enemies. But Brother Atanda, for you to fulfil your destiny, you must leave the land of Ilu-Oke for some years".

He added by asking Atanda to choose an appropriate time to break the news to his family, warning that if he fails to handle it well, it could affect them psychologically.

Before the Pastor left, he prayed for Atanda and encouraged him to always pray and fast together with his family. He implored

Atanda not to ignore his words or dismissed them as mere talks. Atanda promised to obey the instructions of the man of God.

As soon as he returned back to his house after seeing off his guest-pastor Seun, he became concerned how he will survive with his family in a strange land after living at Ilu-Oke for 30 years. Other thoughts that also captured his mind, was whether he would ever realize his long time ambition of bringing basic social amenities to Ilu-Oke again, if he leaves the community. While he was ruminating over these things, Afuye too, was busy planning to execute his plan B, which is to assassinate him since the plan to attack him spiritually failed. Afuye, still determined to eliminate Atanda, in spite their earlier failed plan that consumed his evil partner Akogun, travelled to the village of Odofufun to hire Assassins to kill Atanda.

He handed a picture of Atanda, which he had in his possession during his time as the ex-Treasurer of Egbe Agbe Omo Ilu-Oke to them, and also gave a vivid description of his house to the assassins. The assassins demanded cash and wraps of Indian hemps to execute the job, which Afuye easily provided them.

The Assassins stormed Atanda's house in the night armed with two pistols, cutlasses and charms in their bag in case he resists gun shots and machete cuts. But unfortunately for them, the barking of the dogs in the area woke Atanda up. He quickly peeped through the window and saw some strange guys trying to break in to his house.

Atanda picked his machete, reached for the rear door and escaped to the next street where he alerted the Vigilance group on patrol. The Men mobilised other members from different streets and they went after the assassins. On sighting the vigilance group advancing towards Atanda's house, they opened fire at them which the men responded with their Dane guns.

Sensing apparent danger, they decided to flee the scene. But unfortunately for them, two of the assassins were killed by the vigilance group that lay ambush for them in the exit route of the village. Also, the leader of the group and his deputy were caught and taken to the Atona's Palace the next morning after tying them down for three hours.

At the palace, the villagers gathered very early in the morning to catch a glimpse of the unwanted guests - assassins in their village. The Atona noticed from their scarification that they are not from Ilu-Oke, so he asked, "where are you from and why did you choose to rob my village? The gods of our land are not asleep. If not, you would have successfully executed your evil plans. Speak up or I ask the gods to shut them up permanently for you". The assassins, unruffled by the threat of the Atona, refused to cooperate with interrogation by keeping mute. This angered the Atona as he thundered again, "speak up or you die this moment!". The leader of the assassins, a very huge guy, lifted his eyes towards the Atona, looked at him contemptuously and hissed as if to say, who the hell are you to bark orders at us.

The Atona felt insulted by his action, demanded that 'Omi Iku' (The water of death) be served him, but the Otun (The Right-hand man to the Atona), cooed in to the ears of the Atona, to jettison that idea, but rather have him confessed through a charm necklace placed on his neck. The Otun's idea worked like a magic as the leader of the Assassins started to shout, after the charm necklace was placed on his neck. He cried out, "please, allow me to confess. We are from Omifufun village. We are not armed robbers we are assassins.

We were contracted by one of your sons to carry out this attack on Ogbeni Atanda. The man's name is called Afuye. He paid us good money and provided the information on how to kill our target". The villagers cursed, "ha! Afuye "Olori buruku" (the unfortunate one). It shall not be well with you. Wicked man. Dogs will feast on your corpse when you die".

The Atona immediately ordered that four able young men should go and bring Afuye to the palace. When they got there, Afuye had already escaped to the next village called Abata . The men returned to the palace and reported to the Atona concerning the sudden disappearance of Afuye from his house.

Peeved by that report, the monarch sent a larger team consisting of 24 young men to comb the whole village with an order to capture him alive, but their effort still did not yield any positive result.

The arrested Assassins were later taken to Adaba police station, the nearest police station to Ilu-Oke, because Ilu-Oke lacked one. And the case

was transferred to Criminal Investigation Department (CID) at Ayowole for further investigation. The next day, the assassins were charged to court while the police went after Afuye. The judge ordered that the assassins be kept in prison and the police ensure that Afuye is brought to court the next sitting.

The Police intensified search for Afuye, and after two weeks of combing Ilu-Oke and its environs, finally, Afuye was arrested in his hideout at Abata village. He confessed to his sins and was later sentenced alongside the assassins to 25 years in imprisonment with hard labour. When news reached Atanda that Afuye and the assassins had been imprisoned, he and his family thanked God for saving them from Afuye's evil plans.

Atanda finally broke the news of their imminent exit from Ilu-Oke after breakfast with his family. The response that greeted Atanda's disclosure, was a very emotional one. Aduke, while trying to speak, could not withhold back tears already gathered in her eyes, broke down crying uncontrollably like a baby, while her children also joined her to weep.

After the meal, the two men went and sat under a tree in Olapade's compound where they continued with their discussion.

During the discussion, Atanda reiterated his desire to develop the land of Ilu-Oke by providing them with basic social amenities, like good roads, pipe-borne water, electricity, hospital etc. He promised to defy the odds to realize his ambition no matter how long it will take him to achieve that.

Olopade, moved by Atanda's patriotism, hugged his friend for few minutes, after which he prayed that God should grant him his heart desires. Atanda thanked him and urged Olopade to work closely with other good men in the village to keep it safe, as well as work for its development. In his dream, the Holy Spirit instructed him to move to Ajede, the state capital of Orire. His revelation was confirmed by his wife Aduke, who had a similar dream, three days after Atanda had his



s early as 5 a.m, Ajose, a popular driver at Ilu-Oke famed for his ability to drive any kind of vehicle, and also blessed with the dexterity to manoeuvre through the worst roads, had parked his 504 GL car outside Atanda's house, waiting for him and his family members to finish their preparation, so that they can commence their journey to Ajede.

While waiting, Ajose decided to enjoy music a little by playing the song of his favourite traditional music artiste, Irawo (Star). He excitedly slotted Irawo's cassette, his latest work, inside his car stereo and pressed play. But after two minutes he had done that, it failed to function. Ajose, infuriated, ejected the cassette, rolled it round his finger for few seconds, then hit it vigorously on his left palm, before slotting it back into the car stereo. Like a magic, the cassette started playing to the delight of Ajose who beamed a satisfying smile. He nodded his head fast in ecstasy to the song of Irawo blazing out from his car stereo amid chewing a stick.

Fifteen minutes later, Atanda and his family members were ready for the journey to Ajede. Ajose arranged their luggage and packed them properly to the amazement of Atanda, who initially had doubts that Ajose's 504 car may not accommodate their luggage. Atanda said, "Ajose, indeed you are very good at your job. How did you manage to pack the luggage so well that we did not have to leave some behind? Am really impressed. You have indeed shown that Oga na master. Bravo!".

Ajose replied with a smile while stating in pidgin English, "Oga Atanda, no be today I don dey do dis work. E don tey. I have been doing this job for the past 10 years. I started early after my

Primary School at Ilu- Oke. Though I wanted to proceed to Secondary School at the village, but could not due to the inability of my mum to pay for my school fees after the demise of my dad. Experience has helped me to tackle many things concerning the driving job. Don't worry I will try my best to make the journey an enjoyable one".

With those comforting words from Ajose, the journey to Ajede finally started at exactly by 5.30 a.m. The journey drew a mixed feeling from Atanda. While the prospect of succeeding in the town of Ajede and returning as a rich man to Ilu-Oke appealed to him, also, the fear of being forgotten in a hurry despite all he had achieved as a great farmer in Ilu-Oke loomed large in his mind.

Atanda, immersed in his stream of thoughts, was unaware of their arrival at Adaba, until Ajose stopped at a filling station to refill his car with petrol. Atanda said to Ajose, "I did not realise that we are in Adaba already. I was lost in thought. The accent of the traders who besieged our car hawking their wares made me realize that we have left Ilu- Oke. Wow! Adaba, the land popular for its love for Beans cake (Akara) and pap.

Ajose's strong phobia for motorcycle is well known amongst his friends. He will not even board it for free. But after 30 minutes of waiting for a taxi without any in sight, he was compelled to board one.

Atanda was scared stiff when he mounted on the back of a motorcycle rode by an 18 years old boy, who incidentally, was the only one willing to ply that route that day because of the bad road that leads to the Mechanic Village, worsened by the heavy down pour earlier in the day.

the road and almost collided with Ajose's car, but luckily he managed to dodge it.

Same day, two women from the church, came to assist Aduke. They accompanied her to the market to purchase few things she would require for their new house like mattress, cooking utensil, food stuffs etc. Atanda, impressed by that show of love, promised to reciprocate the kind gesture that has been melted to him by Pastor Segun and the church members, when he finally settles down.

Later that evening, Aduke cooked a delicious meal of Amala and Ewedu soup for dinner which they all gulped delightfully to celebrate their first night in Ajede. After the meal, they prayed, and the children went to bed, while Atanda and Aduke stayed up late till the midnight discussing on how to start a new business in Ajede.

Atanda replied him, "thank you very much for underrating me. It is okay. But that will not make me walk away from your Car Mart. I must confess, your perception about people is very poor. Regardless, am determined to buy the bus any ways. Change your behaviour about how you treat your customer. You do not know who the big customer could be. May be you should note this saying too, since you spoke to me in proverbs; "that wearing big clothes does not signify that one is rich". At that point, many thoughts started running riots in the mind of the dealer. He said to himself, "could he be rich after all and just decided to dress simple? Can he really afford this bus or he just want to rescue himself by merely ranting? Who could he be? Ajose too, joined in the confusion as he asked himself rhetorical question inwardly, "Is he serious or just bluffing about buying the bus? Today, we shall find out.".

Atanda noticed Ajose's worried countenance which obviously was written all over his face. So, he said inwardly too , "Ajose, I can see

your worried face because you think I cannot afford the bus. But, my friend, I will prove you wrong today".

Atanda offered the car dealer a cheque to the astonishment of both the dealer and Ajose. He perused it carefully before offering to drive Atanda and Ajose to a nearby Commercial Bank where he cashed it. He thanked Atanda for the patronage and apologised profusely for his behavior towards him. He assured him that he would never treat a customer badly again as he has learnt a huge lesson from his encounter with him.

The dealer drove them back to his Car Mart a very happy man. He respectfully demanded for Atanda's full details to enable him issue him a receipt. Instead, Atanda asked Ajose to provide his details to the car dealer. Ajose and the Car dealer were confused at his order. He walked up to Atanda and said to him, "Sir, the name on the receipt indicates the owner of the bus. If you allow Ajose's name on the receipt, the bus could become his own". Atanda answered him, "thank you for the information. Am very much aware of that. The bus belongs to Ajose, do as instructed please".

Ajose wanted to be very sure he heard what Atanda said clearly, he asked him if he actually understood the question the car dealer asked, Atanda replied him that there was no ambiguity in his order. Greatly stunned by his action, Ajose rolled on the floor in excitement not minding the white T- shirt he was spotting on.

He thanked Atanda profusely while prostrating. Atanda asked him to stand up, but he begged him to allow him stay him in that position because he deserved to be honoured so. Atanda laughed and asked Ajose to stand up which he later did. Atanda said to him, "Ajose, you are simply reaping the fruits of your good deed. That fateful night, you ensured that we got a good place to sleep before you left us. You did not abandon us when we were

stranded. That is love and loyalty".

Ajose told Atanda he would forever remain grateful to him and also his acts of generosity would remain indelible in his mind. He added, "I cannot contain my joy. I thank God and thank you too for this great gift. If one should ride a horse in my stomach, the horse would will not stumble at all. So, God can still remember me like this? Thank you Lord".

Ajose sang God's praises all through their way back to Ilu-Oke, while Atanda was full of joy for touching a life in the manner he did to Ajose. When they got to Ilu-Oke, Atanda advised Ajose to be magnanimous to people too, when he starts generating money from the bus. Ajose promised to touch lives in any little way that he can. He thanked Atanda once again for what he did for him before both men drove to their houses.

The next day, which was the eve to Atanda's return date to Ajede, news had spread the whole village of Ilu-Oke concerning Atanda's magnanimity towards Ajose. Even the King has heard of it. Atanda was shocked to hear from the King's mouth his act of generosity towards Ajose when he visited the Palace to inform him of his departure to Ajede.

The Atona said, "Atanda the whole village is proud of you for your kind heart. You have not only lifted Ajose and his family out of poverty, but others who may depend on Ajose too for support. Indeed you are a great son of Ilu- Oke. Continue to do well, the Lord will crown your effort in a mighty way". Atanda answered amen before informing the Atona of his plan to return to Ajede the next day.

Before he left the Palace, Atanda suggested to the Atona that the community should create a Committee for the sake of Ilu-Oke's development. The King was very delighted with Atanda's suggestion. Just like Atanda, the development of Ilu-Oke was also very dear to the Atona.

The King quickly summoned an emergency meeting in order to discuss the formation of the Committee with his chiefs.

After hours of deliberation with his chiefs, they agreed on the formation, composition and mode of working of the Committee. They also unanimously agreed that Atanda will head the Committee. Atanda was later informed by the King that he has been selected to head the Ilu-Oke Development Committee. He thanked the King and the Chiefs for selecting him as the head of the Committee, while also pledging his commitment and unwavering loyalty to the Ilu-Oke people.

Very early in the morning the next day, Ajose and his family members stormed Atanda's house to show their gratitude for what he did for Ajose. They all prostrated to thank Atanda. He quickly ordered them to stand up and stop embarrassing him. He told Ajose to stop thanking him, that he has done enough of that already.

Ajose replied him that, failure to show gratitude will portray him as an ingrate. Atanda agreed with him, but insisted regardless, that he should stop thanking him because he has done that enough. He later informed Ajose that in few hours he would be returning to Ajede. Ajose offered to drive him to Ajede, but Atanda assured him he could drive himself without hassles. Ajose wished him well in his journey back to Ajede, before leaving Atanda's house with his family.

Immediately Ajose and his family members left Atanda's house, Atanda quickly took his bath and arranged his luggage in his car. 30 minutes later Atanda was on his way to Ajede. All he experienced at Ilu-Oke in the last one week enveloped his mind as he drove to Ajede. He thought about how his gesture to Ajose was received by the Atona and the other villagers. Spurred by the reception that greeted his gesture to Ajose, he vowed to even do more to affect lives positively at Ilu-Oke.

After six hours of driving, Atanda finally arrived his house to a warm welcome from his family members who have been longing to see him.

Aduke offered him water to drink before she served his dinner. Atanda, after taking his bath, took his dinner. He later he narrated his experience at Ilu-Oke to Aduke, while she in return briefed him concerning the family and their business in Ajede. Impressed by the way Aduke handled family matters and also the business in his absence, Atanda thanked her which she acknowledged with a satisfying smile. Atanda and his wife gist into the night, before going to bed.

Just one week that Atanda spent at Ilu-Oke, he realizedhow much his presence and support to the community is needed more than ever before. Since a decade that he left the village, much has not changed there in terms of development. This did not gladden his heart in any way. Angered by the backwardness of Ilu-Oke compared to other neighbouring communities, Atanda reached a conclusion to return to Ilu-Oke permanently, rather than shuttling between Ajede and Ilu-Oke.

He vowed never to depart the village again, until he has achieved his goal to develop his community. He called Aduke and informed her of his decision without minding what her reaction would be. Aduke was surprised by his decision, but decided not to kick against it, because she knew how much Atanda love Ilu- Oke and his desire for his community to develop.

"My husband, I will not object to your decision to move to Ilu-Oke permanently until you have achieved your long time ambition. It is a big sacrifice to make. Sacrificing your family for the cause of your community. God will help you to realize your ambition for Ilu-Oke. He will help me too, to take care of the responsibilities that have been entrusted upon my shoulder".

Aduke's word touched Atanda, he kept a long silence, before

replying Aduke. "I must confess that after listening to your talk, I felt like cancelling my decision because of the family. But again, I concluded that it is better to serve my community now, that I have the capacity. You and the children will be fine by the grace of God. The community really needs me now. It is better to make this sacrifice for our children and the unborn children. I am irrevocably committed to this cause. Am sorry Aduke, I will go to Ilu- Oke, my fathers land".

Aduke, after listening to Atanda, conceded totally and wholeheartedly supported Atanda's quest to engineer the development of Ilu-Oke. She also prayed for Atanda's protection and guidance from the Lord. Atanda smiled and hugged his wife for genuinely supporting his decision to chase his long time ambition-which is to develop his community.

He later drove to Pastor Segun's house where he told him the same thing he said to Aduke. Pastor Segun gave his blessings to his decision, and also assured him that the Lord will grant him his wishes. Atanda thanked him, before returning home to meet a sumptuous meal already prepared for dinner by Aduke. After dinner, Atanda gathered his family and explained his decision to them. The children cried, but Atanda and his wife placated them. Atanda assured Aduke and the children that he will always get in touch with them by sending messages across to them through Ajose.

The next day, Atanda had the morning devotion with his family earlier than the usual time because of his journey to Ilu-Oke. He has to start the journey very early, otherwise he will arrive Ilu-Oke late in the night. The prayer was brief and precise. While the chunk of the prayer points dwell on ensuring Atanda's safe trip to Ilu-Oke.

After the prayers, he counselled the children to always exhibit good characters everywhere they found themselves and

also ensure that they remain good Christians that they are. He added that they take their studies very seriously too. The children in return, pledged to obey his instructions at all time. Thirty minutes later, Aduke and the children saw him off to the car, before he drove off.

The thoughts of his family which captured his mind, left him downcast. But he found solace in the song of his favourite gospel artiste, that says "I will always be with you". The song sparked him back to life, as he suddenly started singing and occasionally nodding his head to the song. Atanda enjoyed good tunes from the cassette of his car stereo till he got to Ilu-Oke in the evening.

When he arrived his house, he removed his luggage from the booth of the car gently to avoid breaking some fragile things in the luggage like plates, cup, and lantern. He also washed off the mud that stained his car. Done with the removal of the luggage and washing of the car, Atanda took his bath, ate his dinner before retiring to bed very early.

He woke up early as usual, prayed and ate his breakfast before heading to the Palace. This time around, the guards gave him easy passage to the Palace, unlike his first experience. He demanded to see the King concerning urgent issues that affects the development of the community. In a short moment, the King joined him . Atanda immediately prostrated and hailed him Kabiyesi.

The Atona acknowledged by raising his staff. He asked Atanda to kindly have his seat. A happy looking Atona smiled and said to Atanda, "what a pleasant surprise! Am glad to see you. I thought you said you will be visiting Ilu-Oke fortnightly only. Sincerely, I was not expecting to see you at all. I just hope all is well". Atanda replied the King, "I realized that there is a whole lot of work to be done concerning the development of our community. We cannot achieve our goals if we do not have someone present

in the community to drive our plans from the front. I need to be on ground to ginger others to follow suit, hence my reason to abandon my family, business and friends for the development of Ilu-Oke". The Atona was very glad with Atanda's resolve to lead from the front. He prayed for Atanda and his Committee members to excel in their new responsibilities.

Atanda outlined areas he considered as priorities for the development of the community like; establishing a Secondary School, refurbishing of the dilapidated Local Education Area (LEA) primary school at Ilu-Oke, (which incidentally is the only school in the community), Health Centre, Skill Acquisition Centre, a new community market, a befitting Palace for the King, a Sports Centre etc.

These things look a tall order to the Atona, but reluctantly, he agreed with Atanda on his plans. Atanda noticed his countenance which clearly expresses his pessimism, and he said to him, "Kabeyesi, do not worry. I can see clearly that you are worried over the list of things I mentioned. They are achievable with God's support and the total cooperation of the members of the community. Besides, it is one after the other".

The Atona smiled and gave Atanda the express order to report anything he considered as obstacle to the set-out objectives of his Committee on the development of Ilu- Oke. Atanda also informed the King of his intentions to establish a Foundation for the support of indigent women and children in the community. The King welcomed the idea and also pledged his support to the Foundation. Atanda thanked him greatly for his support. Few days later, Atanda launched his foundation at the village hall. The attendance was fairly huge. Women and children dominated the launch. He stated his plans for them and they welcomed it with open arms. Atanda combined the work of his foundation with that of his Committee.

In a very short time, Atanda had series of meetings with his members. Weeks later, the members gathered at the Palace to officially present their development plans to the Atona and his chiefs. Atanda made every member of the Committee important by giving them sense of responsibility. This made them happy as they felt as real partners of the Ilu-Oke development project.

Members of the Committee were levied certain amount of money, while every man in the village too were billed. The contributions were not forth coming as envisaged by the committee members, especially from the non-members of the Committee. This discouraged members of Atanda's Committee, but Atanda was not dissuaded.

He instead, encouraged them to be united and also focus on their goals. Atanda explained their challenges to the King, and he promised to appeal to the members of the community to support them. The Atona gave them land and some financial support too. Despite the Atona's appeal to the members of the community, the contributions did not "flow" as expected. Atanda informed the King that with or without the contributions from the members of the village, he and his members were determined to commence work. The King prayed for him and asked him to go ahead. Atanda reiterated his position to his members and some welcomed it while some doubted it based on the contribution they had gathered.

Atanda realized that time was not on their side any longer, decided to lead from the front by immediately mobilizing workers to site with his money. He asked his members to support the workers at the site of the project in a bid to hasten the building of the Secondary School which was the first on their list of plans. Atanda pumped his resources into the project, and in one month, the school was ready for use.

The Atona could not contain his happiness when Atanda told him that the school was ready for use, signalling the end of halting the progress of their children from advancing to secondary school after primary education. The establishment of the school will also stop the sufferings of the few, who in a bid to further in their education, walk several kilometres on foot to the nearby village to attend Secondary Schools there.

During the unveiling of the newly constructed School, the Local Education Officials who came for the event, praised the community for their effort to establish the Secondary School, describing it as great and exemplary. The Atona while speaking too, praised Atanda and his team for their patriotism and commitment to the development of Ilu-Oke.

The encomiums showered by the Atona to Atanda and his members made them very proud as they pledged to even do more to develop Ilu-Oke. Their resolve to do more for the development of the community, excited Atanda.

Atanda, a man with two caps, had his mind on his Foundation too. Days after the unveiling of the school building, Atanda supported some indigent women and youths with various amount of money to acquire tools for their businesses and also to start petty trading. The recipients of Atanda's kind gesture, danced and sang his praise. They also prayed for his success in all his endeavours. The smile on their faces made Atanda a happy and fulfilled man.

Every day Atanda spends in the village, he realizes that there is much to be done concerning the development of Ilu-Oke. And this worries him because, the quantum of work to be done is not one meant for only for one person or few individuals, but the collective effort of the people of Ilu-Oke. Atanda is a man in a hurry to develop his community, but many of his people do not share his passion and optimism. Though worried about the attitude of some of the community members towards contributing money for the growth of the village, he vowed not to be discouraged by

that. Instead, he vowed to sacrifice all he has to develop his community to the level his financial muscle can carry him.

Seven weeks later, Atanda wrote a letter to Aduke and his children, chronicling all that has happened since he arrived Ilu-Oke. He attached a picture he snapped with the Local Government officials and the Atona at the unveiling of the new Secondary School at Ilu-Oke. He stated also how he has missed them, but reminded them that he has given up himself for the service of his community. After writing the letter, he sent it to Ajose who took it to his wife in Ajede the next day.

A month later, Atanda and his members went back to the King to ask for land to build Skill Acquisition Centre for the community. The King immediately obliged their request and also offered his support. They thanked him and promised to always partner with him for the growth of the community.

Just one week after the land was allocated to the committee headed by Atanda, work commenced at the site of the Project. Two months later, the project was completed, thanks to Atanda, who contributed more than ninety percent of the resources used for the Project. They honoured the Atona by naming the Project after him. The Atona was very delighted by the honour bestowed on him. He in return, conferred Atanda with the title of Asiwaju of Ilu-Oke.

In a very short time, news of the gradual transformation taking place at Ilu-Oke has spread beyond Ilu-Oke to its neighbouring villages. The wonderful work of Atanda and his team got the attention of Mr. Alade Ibukun, a politician and business man from Oke - Ayo community in the same Adun Local Government Area with Ilu-Oke.

Mr. Alade, intrigued by what he heard about Atanda, decided to visit Ilu- Oke. When he got to Ilu-Oke he headed straight to the

Palace where he met the Atona and his Chiefs. Atanda was in attendance too. He congratulated the King on behalf of the village for the feat they have achieved, before telling them that the story of the gradual transformation taking place in Ilu-Oke informed his choice of visit to the village.

He also added that though, he did not plan to discuss politics with them, but he felt it that it was right, since it can provide opportunities to develop their community even further, if the people of Ilu-Oke can join his political party - The Peoples Advancement Party (PAP).

Immediately he mentioned that the community can benefit from politics, Atanda looked at the Atona and the Chiefs with a curious eye. He does not trust politicians, especially not after his experience with the Chairman of Adun LGA who failed in his promises to develop Ilu-Oke.

After listening to Mr. Alade, the Atona thanked him on behalf of the people of Ilu-Oke for his visit to their village. He said, "we are pleased with your visit to our community, as well as the suggestion you made to us too.

But unfortunately, many of us here do not trust politicians like you. In fact, we would have out rightly rejected your proposal to have the people of Ilu- Oke join your political party, but for the possible gain of developing our community which you mentioned, we will not do so.

Mr. Alade replied the Atona, "Kabiyesi, am not for fit to say a proverb in your presence. But I honourably recalled the words of our elders that says, that 'one cannot close his eyes because he does not want to see the wicked ones pass, doing so, one may miss out too, when the good ones are equally passing".

After his speech, the Atona replied Mr. Alade, "we would like to give you a chance but not after making our demands. Our demand is very simple: since you said it can provide the chance to advance the development of our community, we demand that you zone the position of the Local Government Chairman to our community, then we will mobilise our people to vote for your party. We possess the second largest population behind Ayowole in Adun LGA and also plenty wards here at Ilu-Oke too".

Mr. Alade responded by saying, "consider your proposal to have the position of the Chairman of Adun LGA zoned to your community granted, so far the people will join us and vote for us in the coming elections. I know that it is hard to trust people nowadays especially politicians because of their failed promises. But having said that, we must remember also that, our people use to say that, "one cannot stay at home and determine if the river is full or not. So, I urge you to join us and we will prove to you that we are different from others. We are fidelity. Am happy you are ready to give us a chance, we will not only concede that position to you, we will bring greater development from the state level to your community if you vote for us".

They were all stunned by Mr. Alade's reply, as they had expected him to lie or stutter when speaking, which would have indicated to them that it was going to be a futile exercise. But alas, he was very confident and appeared from his countenance to be telling them the truth. Still harbouring some level of doubts in their mind, because the deal look too good to be real, the King told him that they have heard all he said, but will wait till his party fulfil their promise before mobilising their people for PAP.

To prove his seriousness, he promised to visit them the following week with the Executive of the Party to negotiate the deal with them so that they can start keeping their own side of the bargain, which is to mobilise their people for their Party. At that point, Atanda conceded that Mr. Alade appeared real.

His desperation to corner the votes of Ilu-Oke for his party and the

confidence with which he spoke, convinced Atanda that Mr. Alade appeared different from the others. But he decided to wait and see what the verdict of the Atona will be before expressing his thoughts. The King agreed that the meeting be postponed till next week when the Party Executives will be present, before final deals will be sealed.

The day came, and Mr. Alade arrived Ilu-Oke with a very large team that consists of the Executive and some loyal members of the party. They were treated to a cultural dance at the Atona's palace. After their introduction, they discovered that Mr. Alade was the Chairman of the party yet he never mentioned it or brag about it when he visited Ilu-Oke earlier.

That singular act endeared Atanda to Mr. Alade than ever before. After two hours of meeting, the deal was sealed and Atanda was unanimously selected as the Party's flag bearer for the LG elections.

It was a mixed feeling for Atanda. Before his emergence as the PAP flag bearer, he detested politics because he considers it a grubby game, but here is an opportunity to fulfil his long time ambition of developing his community even further as the Chairman if he wins.

The choice of Atanda was greeted with joy from the Ilu-Oke representatives at the meeting and also from the Party Executives. Mr. Alade described Atanda as an honest, patriotic and intelligent man. He considers Atanda a huge transformer that will leave great legacy in the history of politics in that state. One after the other, glowing tributes were rendered by the Atona and his Chiefs to Atanda.

Overwhelmed by the outpouring encomiums showered on him, and also the need to serve his people, Atanda obliged to be the Party's flag bearer at the elections, but with a warning that any attempt to compromise his integrity, will force him to resign.

The King ordered the town criers to summon all the men and women to the village Hall the following day. Immediately the town criers did as instructed by the Atona. The next day, all the men and women gathered at the village Hall. The Hall was filled to the brim thirty minutes before the commencement of the meeting. The Atona addressed them and told them the need for the meeting. They were all happy as they promised to follow his instructions.

One month to the election, other political parties (the usual suspects) stormed Ilu-Oke and tried to bribe them with little gifts to vote for them. This time around, the people were very united to support a party that will help develop their community. Sensing that bribing the people with petty gifts was not going to work this time around, they approached the Atona with gifts to appeal to his subjects to vote for their Parties. But when he asked them to give him assurance that they will receive slots for political positions, they failed to assure him.

Campaigns commenced in earnest as the elections drew nearer. Surprisingly to the Party and even Atanda, everywhere they visited to campaign, the people welcomed them with open hands courtesy of Atanda's popularity. Atanda's popularity transcended even beyond the Local Government. Some knew him because of his farming exploits, and others, his kind heart. He became the poster boy of the Party that had initially struggled to win elections. Every Aspirant attached Atanda's photo to his. After months of vigorous campaigns, the election was held, and Atanda's Party, Peoples Advancement Party (PAP) won massively. There was massive jubilation in his party and also at Ilu-Oke. One month after, The LGA Chairmen were inaugurated into office.

Atanda settled in quickly, and in four years, he had constructed roads that link the communities together in the LGA;

built modern primary and secondary schools across the communities in the LGA, cited many Skills acquisition centres in all the communities in the LGA, and also built maternities and health centres across all the communities in Adun LGA. He also provided electricity to link all the communities in Adun LGA; establish Food Processing Centre at Ilu-Oke , and also built new Sports Centres in the LGA.

The list of Atanda's achievement also includes; offering Scholarships to intelligent and indigent students of Adun LGA and also paid for the fees of all the final year Secondary School students of Adun LGA. He equally built ICT hub, increased the salaries of the LGA staff and also sent them on training regularly.

Atanda boosted the traditions and culture of the LGA, by organising Adun LGA Carnival, resuscitated the moribund Ilu-Oke Day celebration, and established good relations with the monarchs in the LGA through regular meetings. He also supported many small businesses in the LGA as well as organised a Sports fiesta tagged the Chairman Sports Competition to harness talents in the LGA.

Atanda emerged the Best LGA Chairman in the state for four consecutive years that he served his first term. He turned Ilu-Oke from a rural village to a beautiful town while exposing it to economic prosperity. The biggest farm market with modern facilities was citied at Ilu-Oke because of its prowess in farming.

It was accolades after accolades for Atanda throughout his first term. The people of the Local Government were blown away with the kind of transformation that has taken place there. They were surprised that it was possible to do so much like Atanda did. Previous administrations had little or nothing to show for their time in office. Atanda's success was largely hinged on his background in Finance and Accounting as well as his honesty.

Atanda did not enrich himself while in office; he served the people diligently and sincerely too. No scandal was recorded throughout his term.

When it was time for another term, Atanda's party offered him a chance to serve as a State Legislator. He consulted with his people and his friends - like Pastor Seun and Pastor Segun. They encouraged him to accept the chance to serve his people. He accepted, and contested for the position of a State Legislator under his Party- PAP. Again, he won the elections. This time around, it was a walk in the park for him. His intimidating list of achievement, soared his popularity to a higher level.

Atanda proved that he was a performer anywhere he found himself. He sponsored a bill in the State Assembly to establish a state University of Agriculture at Ilu-Oke. His reason was based on the fact that Ilu-Oke as the food basket of the state, will provide the opportunity for Agriculture Research and also generate employment. Atanda's unrelenting effort saw that the bill was passed and signed into law by the governor. He shed tears of joy and considered it his biggest achievement in politics.

The Governor honoured Atanda for his service to humanity by naming the University after him. His community honoured him too by naming different monuments, and a street after him. They also erected a giant statue of Atanda at the entrance of the community. He made significant contributions to bills that improved Education, Health, Businesses, protection of Women and Children Rights in the state. He sponsored more than 50 indigent students in Adun Local government to different universities across the region.

Atanda finished his term as a State legislator on a very high note. He won many awards and received many traditional title offers for his great performance as a legislator. He accepted few, and politely turned down some. He resisted the chance to return to the House of Assembly the second term despite the pressure from his party, and honourably retired to Ilu-Oke to a rousing welcome from hispeople.

He was really a fulfilled man after achieving his ambition of transforming his former rural community, Ilu-Oke to a developed and prosperous town. In his honour, drums were rolled out and musicians sang his praises as a hero of the community.

After retirement, he continued with his charity work through his Foundation as the Chairman. His son, Ademola, who graduated from the City University like him, later assumed the position of the Chief Executive Officer of the Foundation running its affairs daily. Even in retirement, Atanda continued to promote good governance through his engagements and writings that inspired leaders and the youths in the State and other places.

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
