

AMENDED DECLARATION MADE UNDER SECTION 9A OF THE CHIEFS LAW, CAP. 19, SETTING OUT THE CUSTOMARY LAW REGULATING THE SELECTION TO THE ALAKE OF ABEOKUTA CHIEFTAINCY TITLE

(i) There are two Ruling Houses and the identity of each such Ruling House is:

1. Jibodu—comprising: (a) Ademola Family

(c) Sokalu Family

(b) Oyekan Family

(d) Luwaji Family

2. Larun

(ii) The order of rotation in which the respective ruling houses are entitled to provide candidates to fill successive vacancies in the chieftaincy shall be:

1. Jibodu (out-going Ruling House)

2. Larun (next Ruling House)

(iii) The persons who may be proposed as candidates by a Ruling House entitled to fill a vacancy shall be:

A son of a previous holder of the title, provided that if there is no eligible son any direct male descendant of a previous holder of the title shall be considered suitable. If there is no direct male descendant then a direct female descendant shall also be considered suitable.

(For the avoidance of doubt, direct descendant means a son or daughter, grandson or grand-daughter, great grandson or great grand-daughter and so on).

The Ruling House whose turn it is to provide a candidate shall nominate a candidate or candidates at a meeting of that House to be summoned by the Head of the House. The Head of the House shall present the candidates so nominated to the kingmakers. In the event of there being more than one candidate the kingmakers shall take into account the relative ability, character and popular support of each candidate and shall declare such candidate as obtains a majority vote of those kingmakers present and voting to be appointed.

(vi) After all other formalities connected with the appointment, including approval by the Governor-in-Council, have been completed but before installation, the kingmakers shall present the new Alake of Abeokuta to the people of Egba Alake Section.

(v) The consent of the Alake of Abeokuta shall be required to an appointment made by the kingmakers but such consent may not be unreasonably withheld.

(vi) After all other formalities connected with the appointment, including approval by the Governor in Council, have been completed but before installation the Agura shall present the new Osi Egba to the people of the township from which the candidate was appointed.

(vii) After all other formilities connected with the appointment, including approval by the Governor in Council have been completed but before installation the Alake shall present the new Oniro of Iro to the people of Iro section from which the candidate was appointed.
