3,479 petitions filed in 4 election cycles

A total of 3,479 petitions have been filed in the four election cycles in Nigeria, between 2007

and 2019, findings by *Daily Trust* have shown.

The number raises concern that despite electoral reforms of the post-2007 general elections, different

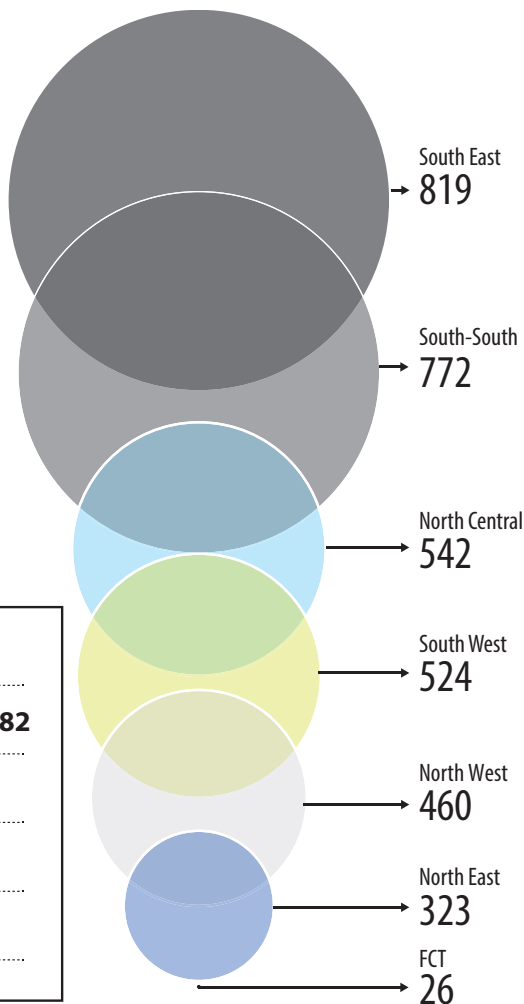
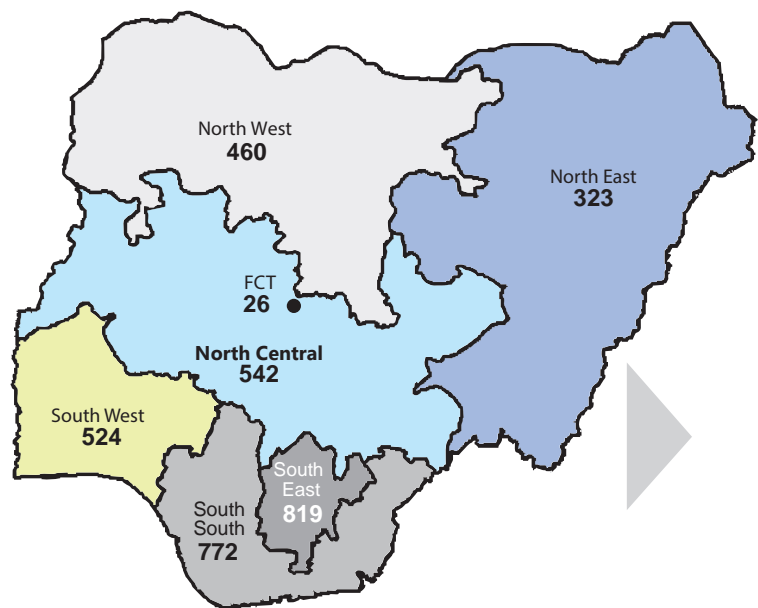
infractions have continued to dent elections in the country.

Some experts and lawyers who spoke to *Daily Trust* see the high rate of election petitions as a sign of loss of

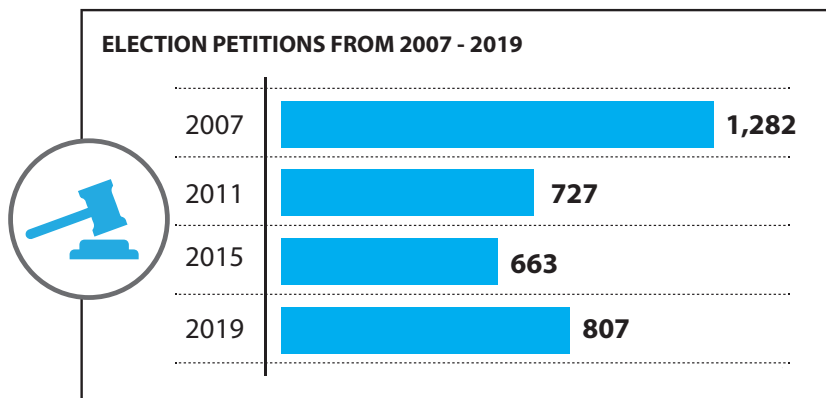
confidence in the country's electoral process, while others believe the petitions are used by politicians as

Tension in Ilorin over demolition of Saraki's house

There was palpable tension in Ilorin, Kwara State Capital, yesterday over the demolition of the house of the Second Republic Senate Leader, Late Abubakar Olusola Saraki.

Officials of the state government had in the wee hours of yesterday demolished the house, popularly known as Ile Arugbo (old people's home), located along the Ilofa Road, GRA, Ilorin.

Residents of Ilorin, in groups, were sighted discussing the issue.

There had been series of protests by aged women and other Saraki's supporters who usually met on Thursdays and Fridays for prayers at the house.

Supporters and loyalists of Bukola Saraki, who is also who is the immediate past Senate president and son of the late Kwara politician, were yesterday milling round the demolished building, chanting solidarity songs and praising him.

The state government

had said the land on which the house was built was illegally acquired, but the former Senate president had countered the claim, saying his father legally acquired the land.

The State Commissioner for Communications, Murtala Olanrewaju, in a statement yesterday, explained that the demolition exercise, which was a physical reclamation of the plot of land bordering the civil service clinic in Ilorin, began in the early hours to avoid any needless confrontation.

The commissioner denied that the state government was served court papers on the matter.

He urged the people of the state to remain calm, peaceful and be guided only by facts of the matter and "not be drawn into emotional outburst that is targeted at distracting the public from the issues at stake.

"While the administration is focused on restoring sanity to the state after years of barefaced impunity, we will do so within the limit of the law."

It was gathered that some residents of Ilorin had earlier planned to stage a protest against the exercise.

The chairman of the People's Democratic Party, in the state, Engr Kola Shittu and members of the party's executive were at the demolished building.

Shittu condemned the state government's action, saying the government should have tarried a while since the matter had become a subject of litigation.

He described the demolition as "a dishonour to the memory of Baba Saraki. This is a man who dedicated his political career to serving the good people of Kwara."

He, however, appealed to Saraki's supporters to remain calm and refrain from any act of reprisals or violence, assuring them that the law would take its course.

Some women announced their resolve to march to the palace of the Emir of Ilorin in protest against the demolition exercise.

The daughter of the late Kwara politician and Minister of State for Transportation,

Gbemisola Saraki, in her veiled condemnation of the demolition of her father's house, said she was proud of the history of her family.

In a statement by her Special Assistant on Media, Titilope Anifowose, she said had renamed her movement to "GRS-OLOYE" in perceived solidarity with her family on the issue.

"So, many things have happened this year, in fact, right up to the very dying hours of the year, but we will continue to take brave and faithful steps.

"We will continue to walk even though we have no idea what will happen next, though we are comforted, encouraged and reassured with this. But they plan and Allah plans and Allah is the best of planners. So, GRS Family, we are going to be known now as GRS-OLOYE Movement.

"We have history, and we are proud of that history. May Allah forgive the sins of all our departed and may He make us worthy representatives of all that they stood for."

Reacting through a

statement yesterday the chairman of the Saraki Legacy Forum, the family, Bibire Ajape, the family condemned the demolition of the building and urged Governor Abdulrahman Abdulrazaq to "stop escalating tension in the state."

Ajape noted that following the announcement by the governor that he had revoked the title on the land which had been rightfully possessed by late Saraki for more than 20 years, the family filed a case at the High Court, Ilorin, on December 31, 2019, challenging the action.

He alleged that the government demolished the property to undermine and frustrate the judicial process.

He called on Saraki family's supporters, particularly women and youths "who were brutalized during the attempts to carry out the illegal demolition exercise" to maintain peace and not take laws into their hands.

"We assure them that this illegality will not stand as the family will pursue all legal means to claim the rights of their late patriarch."

Oyetola pays salary without federal allocation

Osun State Governor Adegboyega Oyetola paid December 2019 workers' salaries without the federal allocation.

Malabu oil scandal: Court extends Adoke's detention by another 14 days

An FCT High Court in Maitama has granted the application of the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission to keep the former Attorney-General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Mohammed Bello Adoke, in its custody for additional 14 days.

Justice Othman Musa, a vacation judge of the court, who on December 20, 2019, granted the EFCC the initial 14 days remand order, on Thursday extended the order for another 14 days in preparatory for the arraignment of the former AGE.

In granting the application, the judge stated that "the extension of the remand of the respondent for another 14 days for the purpose of his arraignment in court is necessary and granted as prayed."

Adoke, who had since 2016 been charged with \$1.1bn Malabu Oil scam, returned to the country, ending his over four years self-exile on December 19. He was subsequently arrested on arrival at the Nnamdi Azikiwe Airport in Abuja by operatives of the International Police Organisation and handed over to the EFCC.

During sitting of the court on Tuesday, hearing of a bail application for Adoke suffered a setback when his lawyer, Benson Igbanoi, prayed for an adjournment of the hearing of the application to enable the applicant's legal team to respond to the counter-affidavit filed by the EFCC in opposition to it.

His lawyer had urged the court to adjourn the hearing to January 2. However, EFCC's lawyer, Bala Sanga, noted that it was better to have the application sent back to the judge handling the pending criminal charges since the vacation of the court's judges would end soon.

Twins abducted in Katsina village, as police rescue 6

A set of twin teenagers has reportedly been abducted at Gizawa village of Dutsinma LGA of Katsina State.

It was gathered that gunmen attacked the town in the early hours of yesterday when most of the villagers were asleep.

Sources said the kidnapped

twin, Hassana and Hussaina Idris, were forcefully taken from their rooms.

Also, gunmen reportedly attacked the residence of one Magaji Abu in Badole village and went away with his cattle.

The police have not responded to enquiries on the incidence as at the time of filing this report.

Meanwhile, six kidnap

victims were reportedly rescued on New Year's Day by police after a gun duel with their abductors.

The spokesman of the state police command, SP Gambo Isah, said "On 01/01/2020 at about 12:30hrs, a distress call was received that unrepentant bandits in their numbers armed with AK47 rifles have kidnapped some women working at a farm

at Mata-Mulki village of Batsari LGA of Katsina State.

"Operation Puff Adder led by DPO Batsari swiftly moved to the area. The team gave the hoodlums a hot chase into the forest and engaged them in a gun duel," he said.

The spokesman added that the bandits consequently abandoned the victims and ran into the forest.

Girls, 18, man remanded over cultism

An Ile-Ife Magistrate Court in Osun has remanded two teenage girls, Yemisi Moses, 18, Blessing Damilola, 18, and a man, Adebayo Adegboyega, 25, over alleged membership of a secret society.

The prosecutor, Insp Sunday Osanyintuyi, told the court that the defendants committed the offence on December 29 around 2p.m. at Orilonise Area, Ile-Ife.

Osanyintuyi said the defendants unlawfully belonged to a secret society, called Eiyee Confraternity, while also disturbing the peaceful atmosphere of Ile-Ife.

He added that the defendants also had in their possession substance suspected to be Indian hemp weighing 20kg, which they were allegedly selling. According to him, the defendants conducted themselves in a manner that may cause breach of public peace.

The prosecutor stated further that the offence contravened sections 3, 4, 62(A), 63(B) and 249(D) of the Criminal Code, Laws of Osun, 2002.

The defendants, however, pleaded not guilty to the three-count charge of possession of Indian hemp, membership of secret society and breach of public peace.

The defence counsel, Mr Ben Adidieje, applied for bail of his clients in most liberal terms, giving assurance that they would not jump bail, but would provide substantial sureties.

The magistrate, Mr Joseph Owolawi, however, refused them bail, but ordered for their remand in Ilesa Correctional Centre, pending the rule on bail.

Owolawi adjourned the case until January 7, 2020 for hearing. (NAN)

Police arrest 'mastermind' of Abuja foiled bank robbery

The FCT Police Command on Thursday said it has arrested one Ernest Ewim, the alleged mastermind of the foiled bank robbery that occurred in Mpape area of Abuja on December 28, 2019.

Spokesman of the command, DSP Anjuguri Manzah, confirmed the development in a statement in which he said the 29-year-old suspect, "who played a major role in the foiled robbery attempt" at a branch of First Bank Nigeria Plc, was arrested at his hideout in Katampe 1 on Wednesday by operatives of the Command's Special Anti-Robbery Squad (SARS).

"With this arrest, the total number of suspects arrested in connection with the foiled robbery attempt is now five - Ernest Ewim, 29, Larry Ehizo, 30, Princewill Obinna,

24, Timothy Joe, 21 and Elijah David, 19," the statement read in part.

Daily Trust recalls that during the parade of the four suspects initially arrested at the command's headquarters on Tuesday, Ehizo, a staff of the bank, said one Ernest, a customer of the bank and barman at a beer parlour in Mpape, was the brain behind the foiled robbery.

"Ernest said I should show them where the CCTV cameras were and where the officer on duty that day would be. He even came along that day in a different car and stayed across the bank," Ehizo had said.

Another suspect, Obinna, who reportedly led the gang that attacked the bank, also told journalists that the same Ernest called him on December 24 and linked him with Ehizo.

Court remands man for allegedly raping 21-year-old woman

An Ikeja Magistrate Court on Thursday ordered that a 30-year-old man, Emeka Ugwu, who allegedly raped a 21-year-old woman be remanded in Kirikiri Custodial Centre, pending legal advice.

The magistrate, Mrs B.O. Osunsanmi, who did not take the plea of the defendant ordered that the case file be returned to the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) for legal advice.

Osunsanmi adjourned the case until January 24 for mention. The defendant, whose

address was not provided, is charged with rape. Earlier, the prosecutor, ASP Ezekiel Ayorinde, told the court that Ugwu committed the offence on December 13, 2019 at Ogba, Lagos. Ayorinde alleged that Ugwu dragged the victim into a room in a hotel and raped her.

The prosecutor said the defendant was arrested and handed over to the police.

The offence, he said, contravened Section 260 of the Criminal Law of Lagos State, 2015, which prescribed life imprisonment for rape. (NAN)

Teenager allegedly leads 5 others to gang-rape girl

A 19-year-old man, Babatunde Sulaimon, has been remanded in Kirikiri Custodial Centre for allegedly masterminding the gang defilement of a 16-year-old girl. Sulaimon appeared before an Ikorodu Chief Magistrate Court on two-count charge of conspiracy and defilement.

The defendant, whose plea was not taken by the court, lives on Ogunde Street, Agric Ikorodu, Lagos.

The chief magistrate, Mrs F. A. Azeez, ordered that the defendant be remanded in the

custodial centre, while awaiting advice from the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP).

The prosecutor, Insp. John Iberedim, had earlier told the court that the defendant, had on November 30 at Ajose Area of Owutu, Ikorodu, conspired with five others, now at large to gang defile the 16-year-old girl.

He said the girl, who was a sales girl, was returning home from work at 11 p.m. when she was accosted by the defendant and the five others.

"They carried her into an

uncompleted building and gang defiled her.

"The girl was able to recognise and identify the ring leader as the man who had been disturbing her for a chance to talk to her.

"The defendant and his accomplices fled the area after news of their atrocities became public, but the defendant was later apprehended, while the police are still on the lookout for the others. The chief magistrate adjourned the case until March 5, 2020 for the DPP's advice. (NAN)

bargaining chip or to keep their supporters together after an election.

In December, Senate

President Ahmed Lawan said the National Assembly will from this month begin debate on the Electoral Reforms Amendment Bill, Amendment of the 1999 Constitution and

the Petroleum Industry Bill (PIB).

He said the Electoral Reforms Amendment Bill remains a priority because of the urgent need to improve

the electoral processes and secure the democratic gains made in the fourth republic.

“We want to pass the bill well ahead of the next electoral cycle in 2023 and avoid the

political heat and pitfalls that imperiled the efforts of the 8th National Assembly to pass the same bill close to the last general elections,” he said.

List of petitions from 2007 to 2019

The 2007 elections were the most litigated elections with about 1,282 petitions received, according to records from the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC). There were eight presidential election petitions, a development that necessitated the electoral reforms commissioned by late President Umaru Yar'Adua.

A legal practitioner, Dr Daniel Bwala, said the loss of confidence in that election, which was admitted by the then president, Yar'Adua, who happened to be the biggest beneficiary, showed that the electoral process was flawed.

Bwala, who observed that pre-election disputes rose due to the level of injustice compared to the post-election process, explained that the reforms that followed that election reduced the number of electoral petitions in the subsequent election cycles.

He said the reforms that are being introduced in the electoral laws in the National Assembly will lead to better elections in the future and will also reduce petitions.

However, Ibrahim Sani Musa, a political scientist has a different view. “It is obvious why we had more petitions after the 2007 election. Former President Olusegun Obasanjo who was rounding up his second term wanted his preferred candidate (Yar'Adua) and by extension all candidates of PDP to win; so many things did not go well,” he said.

The 2011 general elections had 727 petitions in all - 53 in form of governorship election petitions from 24 states; 90 petitions on the senatorial seats; 206 petitions on the House of Representatives seats, and 377 petitions were filed for state assembly elections.

“Fundamentally, I think some of the reforms that happened between 2007 and 2011 helped a lot in reducing the number of petitions,” Sani Musa said.

In the aftermath of the 2015 general elections, a total of 663 petitions were filed in the courts. Of this, 41 petitions were filed against the governorship elections from 24 states, 81 petitions were filed for senatorial seats, 175 petitions were filed for House of Representatives seats, and 366 seats were filed for the House of Assembly seats.

“I think the card reader played a great role in 2015; it helped a lot this time around,” Sani Musa said, adding “when INEC said it will use the card reader, many politicians with ulterior motives were scared.

In 2019, a total of 807 election petitions were filed in the aftermath of the elections, according to INEC. Of this, 66 were from governorship elections in 26 states, 107 petitions for senatorial seats, 207 for House of Representatives seats, and 417 petitions were filed against House of Assembly elections.

Sani Musa said the reduction in the number of petitions showed that despite imperfections, Nigeria's democracy is maturing. “But above all, politicians must change their mantra... Electoral reform is one thing and attitude is completely another,” he said.

A zone by zone breakdown of the petitions showed that the South East, with five states of Abia, Anambra, Ebonyi, Enugu and Imo, has the highest number of election petitions in the four cycles with 819 petitions. The South South, with six states of Akwa Ibom, Bayelsa, Cross River, Delta, Edo and Rivers, followed closely with 772 petitions filed within the period.

The North Central, comprising Benue, Kogi, Kwara, Nasarawa, Niger and Plateau, came third with 542 petitions filed during the 2007, 2011, 2015 and 2019 general elections. The zone is followed closely by the South West,

which has six states - Ekiti, Lagos, Ogun, Ondo, Osun, Oyo - with a total of 524 petitions filed in the four election cycles.

The North West, with seven states of Jigawa, Kaduna, Kano, Katsina, Kebbi, Sokoto and Zamfara, has the second lowest petitions filed in the four election cycles with 460 petitions. But the North East, which is made up of six states of Adamawa, Bauchi, Borno, Gombe, Taraba and Yobe, has the least number of election petitions with 323.

The Federal Capital Territory registered a total of 26 petitions. The territory had 17 election petitions in 2007, three petitions in 2011, 2015 and 2019 general elections respectively.

A further breakdown of the lists by states showed that Anambra had the highest number of petitions in the four cycles with a total of 286 petitions, followed by Delta with 197 petitions, while Rivers is third with 186.

The tribunals and INEC received 154 election petitions from Anambra State in 2007, 68 in 2011, 28 in 2015 and 42 in 2019. They received 52 election petitions from Delta in 2007, 50 in 2011, 43 in 2015 and 52 in 2019. They also received from Rivers State, 67 election petitions in 2007, 40 petitions in 2011, 55 in 2015, and 24 in 2019.

These are exclusive of pre-election suits resulting from party primaries in all the election cycles. They are also without the petitions from the outcome of the governorship and senatorial re-run elections in Bayelsa and Kogi states. There was no presidential election petition in 2015 as Goodluck Jonathan of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) opted not to challenge the emergence of Muhammadu Buhari of the All Progressives Congress (APC). But there were eight presidential election petitions in 2007, one in 2011, and four in 2019.

Electoral reforms after 2007 general elections

Yar'Adua, who vowed to end electoral irregularities in Nigeria after the 2007 general elections, set up the Justice Muhammadu Uwais committee to look into means of enhancing elections in the country. The panel submitted its report on December 11, 2008.

The Uwais panel made some recommendations including: establishment of commissions to deal with Electoral Offences, Constituency Delimitation and Political Parties Registration and Regulation, which powers would be divested from the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC).

The panel recommended proportional representation in elections to the federal and state legislatures and to the local government councils. It also recommended that the judiciary should appoint the head of INEC.

Not all the recommendations were accepted by the National Assembly when the full report was submitted by the then President Goodluck Jonathan administration prior to the 2011 general elections. Part of the grouse of the lawmakers was that allowing the judiciary, which is empowered by the constitution to hear election petitions, to also nominate the head of the electoral umpire, would breach the principle of separation of powers.

But the reforms kick-started by that process, such as the Electoral Acts Amendment Laws of 2010 and 2015, helped to restore some

form of credibility to the country's electoral process. Among these were: automation of voters' data with the Permanent Voters Cards and Smart Card Readers, limit for election campaign spending, and capacity building for electoral officials and judges sitting on election cases.

The reforms also included a reduction of time for determination of election petitions by tribunals because of their special nature. Thus, 180 days was provided in Section 134 (2) and (3) of the Electoral Act, 2010. And similar provisions are contained in Section 285(6) and (7) of the 1999 Constitution (as amended).

The reforms were not too different from the recommendations of the Senator Ken Nnamani Committee set up by President Muhammadu Buhari which submitted its report in May 2017.

After the judgement of the Supreme Court on Wednesday October 30 dismissing the appeal to the petition by the PDP and its presidential candidate, Atiku Abubakar, a lot of experts noted that there are many flaws in Nigeria's electoral and judicial process. Deputy Senate President, Ovie Omo-Agege in October co-sponsored an Electoral Act Amendment Bill 2019 with Senator Abubakar Kyari (APC- Borno) which seeks to recognize electronic transmission of votes in Nigeria's elections. The bill scaled second reading at the Senate.

Experts, lawyers differ on post-election litigations

A Senior Fellow of the Centre for Democracy and Development (CDD), Prof. Jibrin Ibrahim, said lack of transparent primaries, violence, fraud and vote buying are major issue responsible for the many election petitions in Nigeria.

“So, I don't think it is a question of INEC. It is that there are series of issues that persist in our elections, and precisely because of that, the litigations continue to increase,” he said.

He said reform is not the main issue but for all stakeholders to commit themselves to following laws and regulations to increase the integrity of the electoral process without resort to the judicial process.

An Abuja-based lawyer, E.M.D. Umukoro Esq. said, “With the way more people have gone to challenge this (2019) elections despite the state of the economy, it tells you that people are not satisfied with the outcomes.”

He also said the statistics should speak to INEC and the government, adding: “You can't have these figures staring the electoral process in the face and conclude that all is well with the system or claim there is progress in the electoral process in Nigeria.”

But a law lecturer, Abdul Mohammed, identified confidence in the judicial system, dissatisfaction with the elections and political expediency as three factors that may be responsible for

most election petitions in Nigeria.

“Of course, there are many challenges pertaining to this very election (2019), but it doesn't mean that elections are the end of the matter. Another thing is that some politicians go to court to keep their supporters together,” he said.

“Look at what happened at the 2019 presidential election petitions, the issues presented by the PDP. First, they said the president was not qualified

by virtue of his certificate; second, they contended that the election was marred in 1,600 polling units. But they only called five witnesses to testify. So, you would see that they were not really serious to show any malpractice had occurred.”

For his part, Hamid Ajibola Jimoh Esq said “The rise in the 2019 election petitions above the past years is a proof that Nigerian electorate are becoming more democratic in electing their political leaders.”

Fire kills nursing mother, 4 children in Kaduna

A fire outbreak has killed a nursing mother along with her infant, and three other children at their residence located along Layin Yan Tanki in Rigasa Community of Igabi Local Government Area of Kaduna State.

Husband of the deceased, Sani Yahaya Jumare, was rescued through a toilet window pulled down by neighbours and rushed to the hospital.

Daily Trust gathered that the victims of the inferno were asleep, around

2:00am on Wednesday, when the fire whose source was uncertain broke out and consumed the two bedroom apartment.

Neighbours who witnessed the incident attributed the fire to electric fault, which however has not been ascertained, but our reporter who visited the scene encountered the husband who was discharged from hospital being consoled by sympathisers who thronged the house.

"I never knew I will be alive today because I gave up when I saw the

flames inside the room. I was rescued by neighbours through the toilet window but my wife and children could not make it," he said.

He gave the names of the dead as his late wife Rukayya, Rilwan (infant), Rabiati 2 years, Khadija 6 years, and Hajara 7 years.

He said Hajara, was his late sister's daughter who visited the family to spend the holidays.

Late Rukayya's father, Sani Ladan, described the incident as tragic but the will of Allah who knows best.

NSCDC recovered N38m in 2019

Niger State command of the Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) yesterday announced that it recovered N38,789,570 in 2019.

The state commandant of the corps, George U. Edem, made the disclosure in Minna during a press conference on the activities of the corps in the year in

review.

He said the command made series of arrests ranging from illegal miners; suspected vandals of NNPC products and pipelines; suspected vandals of AEDC installations' suspected kidnappers and robbers among others.

Edem said the command participated in all the joint security task forces operations in Zamfara,

Kaduna, Niger states and the FCT, and recorded success in its core mandate.

"The command, in the year under review, received a total of 2,753 complainants across the state, and through its intelligence and investigation department, as well as peace and conflicts management unit, recovered the sum of N38,789,570, three vehicles, eight motorcycles, three

tricycles, one AK 47 rifle with 26 live ammunition, and one pump action rifle with three cartridges," he said.

He further disclosed that the Agro Rangers unit of the command has ensured peaceful coexistence between farmers and herders, while several large-scale farm owners have applied for men and officers of the corps to secure their farms.

No attack on Abuja-Kaduna train – NRC

The Nigerian Railway Corporation (NRC) has dismissed reports of attack on the Abuja-Kaduna train, saying it was "complete fake news."

NRC Deputy Director, Public Relations, Mr. Mahmood Yakub in a chat with *Daily Trust* said the reported attack was a machination of mischief makers bent on scaring passengers.

"This is complete fake news. Nobody attacked the train of the Nigerian Railway Corporation (NRC) between Abuja and Kaduna.

"It is a calculated attempt by mischief makers to scare away our esteemed passengers. We see this as a grand plot to sabotage the feats and achievements of the NRC," he said.

Yakub stressed that there was no sign of attack on the train, as no passenger has given any report of an attack whether from Abuja or the Rigasa axis in Kaduna.

He assured passengers not to entertain any fear about their safety and security, saying the NRC is up to the task in providing safe train services across the country.

Ailing twin appreciates *Daily Trust* for successful surgery

A week after a *Daily Trust* report on ailing Kehinde Yusuf, a 6-year-old boy hospitalised for fluid accumulation/skull enlargement (hydrocephalus) at the University College Hospital (UCH), Ibadan, his father, Mr Isiaka Yusuf on Thursday appreciated the newspaper after a successful surgery following its report on his son's plight.

It could be recalled that *Daily Trust* published the story of the ailing twin who needed the sum of N377,000 for surgery at the UCH.

According to the parent, Kehinde was six month's old when he had high temperature and was taken to the hospital on March 2010 when the doctor passed a drip via his head in a bid to treat him which resulted in the condition (hydrocephalus).

Mr Yusuf had earlier told *Daily Trust* that resultant effects of the treatment was that his son's head started growing bigger than his entire body, hence, he could neither sit nor walk.

But on Thursday, Mr Yusuf said he was happy for the support received for the ailing boy following the report.

"I really appreciate the support you gave us through your publication which attracted donation for the surgery. The surgery was successful and we were told he will be discharged in five days," he said.

Fulani group sues Oyo gov't over grazing law

A Fulani group in Oyo State, Gan Allah Fulani Development Association of Nigeria has filed a suit against the state government and the State House of Assembly over a grazing law recently passed by the state legislature.

The group described the bill as a gross violation of their fundamental rights.

It joined the office of

the Attorney General and Commissioner for Justice of the state in the suit.

The law which had been debated, passed and signed into law by the executive arm was aimed at checking persistent farmers-herders clashes in the state.

In the suit number M/744/2019, the herders want the Oyo State High Court to declare the law illegal, unconstitutional, null and void.

The herders also want the court to grant an order of perpetual injunction restraining all the respondents, whether by themselves, their servants, agents, officers or otherwise from carrying out any acts or omission which is likely to aid the enactment or even enact or pass the purported anti-grazing bill into law as this would amount to a denial of their fundamental rights guaranteed under the

constitution of Nigeria.

Part of their prayers is that the court should declare the law as a coordinated attempt or strategy at curtailing the livelihood of the applicants and further frustrating their lives in breach of constitutional provisions particularly Section 33(1) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended).

The herders further stated that "as a matter of cultural

heritage, open rearing or grazing of livestock having been passed generations to generations is the life and economy on which the Fulani survive."

The idea to pass the bill was mooted in October 2019 and was debated and passed into law prohibiting open rearing and grazing of livestock and establishment of ranches for purposes connected to rearing of livestock in the state.

Malami justifies Dasuki, Sowore's detention

The Attorney-General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Abubakar Malami, yesterday said the Federal Government did nothing wrong in detaining a former National Security Adviser, Col. Sambo Dasuki and the convener of #RevolutionNow, Omoyele Sowore, despite court orders.

Malami disclosed this when he appeared on 'Good Morning Nigeria', a programme of the Nigerian Television Authority.

The AGF said the orders of the court were subject to applications for variation and appeals at the Court of Appeal, explaining that the enforcement of the orders could be delayed in such circumstances.

He said this applied to the cases of Dasuki and Sowore.

"There were applications for setting aside orders; there were appeals for stay of execution all through. So, until those matters reach the Supreme Court and it takes the final decision, relating there, you are still operating within the ambit and context of rule of law."

He further stressed the need for Nigerians to understand the judicial process and that not all court orders are to be obeyed immediately.

"Perhaps I need to clear the air on how the rule of law operates within the context of the Nigerian constitution. We have multiple and a plethora of judicial decisions that establishes a fact that when you are challenging a court order through a judicial process, the idea of disobedience to that court order does not arise.

"The misapprehension that set into the system and deliberately put in the public space is the fact that once there is a court order, you must unconditionally comply. You can only be adjudged being in disobedience of a court order when you don't take advantage of the constitutional powers, rights accorded to you by appealing against the order and perhaps seeking for stay of execution of the order or perhaps you don't take any steps seeking variation of the court order."

Sudanese judges, others killed in plane crash

A plane carrying Sudanese judges and injured people crashed on Thursday in the Darfur region of Sudan, with all those on board killed, according to the Sudanese Red Crescent.

The Antonov plane was travelling from the city of El Geneina - located in the west of Sudan, near the border with Chad - to the Sudanese capital, Khartoum.

It was not immediately clear what caused the crash.

The aircraft was transporting people injured in a tribal conflict in Darfur to Khartoum for treatment.

The plane's crew comprised three Sudanese army officers.

It was not immediately clear how many people the plane had been transporting. (dpa/NAN)

4 killed in crash on Lagos-Ibadan Road

The Ogun Command of Federal Road Safety Corps says four persons died and four others were injured in an accident involving a vehicle around Romana Oil and Gas on the Lagos-Ibadan Expressway.

Clement Oladele, the Ogun Sector Commander of FRSC, told the News Agency of Nigeria that the lone accident happened at about 5.32 am.

Oladele said a Man Diesel Truck, with registration number TKP 653 XA transporting yams, lost control

due to wrongful overtaking and rammed into the road divider.

He said that 14 people, comprising 13 males and a female, were in the truck whose lone accident resulted in the death of four persons, while four others sustained various degrees of injuries.

"The corpses of the four male victims have been deposited at the FOS morgue, Isara, Ogun, while the survivors were taken to Idera Hospital, Sagamu, for intensive treatment." (NAN)

Military repels attack on Michika

The Nigerian military have yesterday repelled an attack on Michika town in Adamawa State by Boko Haram insurgents. Residents told *Daily Trust*

that militants on a Toyota Hilux and several motorcycles who stormed Michika town through Kappa village at around 6 pm had fierce encounter with Nigerian soldiers which lasted for two hours.

A resident, Maryam Malama said when the insurgents failed to break the military line of defense at the first check point, they tried to withdraw but soldiers pursued them into the bush. "There was gunshot

everywhere. Some people have already run to the mountains for safety but news went round that soldiers have defeated the attackers", she stated. A vigilante's member said some of the Boko Haram

fighters were killed by soldiers outside the town but could not give details of the casualty. Attempt to contact the military authorities in Adamawa was not successful as at the time of filing this report.

Ajaokuta-Itobe bridge intact-FERMA

The Federal Road Maintenance Agency (FERMA) says the Ajaokuta-Itobe bridge in Kogi State is intact and can remain stable for the next 100 years.

The Agency's position is coming against the backdrop of video clip suggesting that the bridge which linked the North with the South East and South South part of the country was on the verge of collapse.

The video clip which went viral on Thursday showed disturbing image which has been causing panic among motorists and passengers who ply the ever-busy highway.

When *Daily Trust* visited the area Thursday evening,

FERMA officials led by the agency's Highway Engineer Sunday Adenusi were already on-the-spot assessment visit to the bridge.

Engineer Adenusi said the attention of the Agency was drawn to the video clip which going by "its content suggested that the bridge has already cut-off leaving road users stranded".

He disclosed that the bridge has nine of such expression joints on both sides of the highway, which purpose was to prevent the opposing rods from colliding.

Our correspondent observed that because of the missing expression joint cover, the underneath was visible revealing the moving water down below.

Oldest retired soldier dies at 101

Adama Aduku, the oldest surviving retired officer of the Nigerian army, has died at the age of 101. The army authorities announced his death on Twitter on Wednesday.

Aduku, a World War II veteran, was said to have died on Tuesday morning. His death was announced by one of his relatives on the Whatsapp platform of the Director of Defence Information.

The deceased soldier was reportedly born in 1918 to a farmer at Abejukolo-Ife, Omaha local government area of Kogi state and joined the army in 1945.

He was said to have fought for the British colonial army in Burma and Egypt during the Second World War II.

In 2019, Vice-President Yemi Osinbajo presented an award of excellence to Aduku at the Nigerian army day celebrations in Lagos.

Speaking with journalists at the event, Aduku said he was also deployed in India during

world war.

"I joined the Royal West African Frontier Force in 1942 in Makurdi, Benue State. Trained in Laguna and deployed to India during the World War II. I fought at Calcutta," Aduku said.

"I returned to Lagos in 1946 and was of the 4 Brigade Guard Group until I was discharged in that same year.

"I rejoined the Nigerian Army in 1950 in Zaria and was finally discharged in 1957 as a private soldier.

"I'm currently a farmer in Abejukolo in Omala Local Government Area in Kogi State." (NAN)

My parents were pure illiterates, says Obasanjo

Nigeria's former president, Chief Olusegun Obasanjo, has again narrated his grass to grace story, saying he was born to "pure illiterate parents", in a small Ibogun-Olaogun village, and against all odds rose to rule Nigeria as military head of state and later as democratically elected president for eight years. He spoke on Thursday at the annual thanksgiving service organised in his honour by the State Chapter of the

Christian Association of Nigeria (CAN).

"Those of you who know where I was born, how many of you know Ibogun-Olaogun? The village where I was born is so small that no matter how large you make the map of Nigeria, Ibogun-Olaogun will never appear.

"And yet, somebody born in that village of pure illiterate parents, will have the opportunity that I have now; to reach the stage that I have reached to be used to achieve whatever I have been used to achieve, I cannot thank

God enough.

"I always say this; whatever I have achieved, whatever I have done, I thank God because it is not me alone, there are those who have worked with me, some of them are dead, some of them are still alive and without them, I will not have been able to achieve much. On occasions like this, let us just thank God and keep thanking God," Obasanjo said.

The Bishop of Egba Anglican Diocese, Rt. Revd. Emmanuel Adekunle, in his

sermon, urged Nigerians to brace up to face whatever the New Year throws at them, saying "things are hard all over the world, it is not only in Nigeria that things are not working well."

Governor Dapo Abiodun described Obasanjo as a God-fearing leader whose life is worthy of emulation, saying "We all know and appreciate that God doesn't make and didn't make many like Baba and I'm sure that God is not probably going to make anyone like him."

National Policy on Education and meeting 2020 demands

Every citizen of a modern nation is a subject of the state. And once a state is formed, the citizens formulate ethical principles or virtues to be pursued, vices to be avoided and values to be cherished for the good conduct of the citizens. These values are in most cases not put in a codified form but transmitted from one generation to the next via a well formulated/structured process called education.

Without a shadow of the doubt, this thought may have informed the decision of past administrations like their counterparts in other countries, to formulate the National Policy on Education anchored on five main objectives that include the building of: a free and democratic society; a just and egalitarian society; a united strong and self-reliant nation; a great and dynamic economy; and a land of bright and full opportunities for all citizens.

Indeed, education typifies the bedrock of development of any nation. 'With sound educational institutions, a country is as good as made -as the institutions will turn out all rounded manpower to continue with the development of the society driven by well thought out ideas, policies, programmes, and projects'.

However, like every invention which comes with opportunities and challenges, education in Nigeria, despite the virtues and attributes, have suffered sets of challenges which include but not limited to; payment of lip service to, and in some cases, total abandonment of the National Policy on Education by successive governments through perennial underfunding of the sector. And in more damaging cases, the money government voted for running the schools does not get to the schools and the little that gets there is normally wasted by those whose responsibility it is to manage the schools.

Essentially, this recurrent mismanagement manifests itself in acts opposed to demands of modern educational sector. And its work impedes lecturers from carrying out scholarly researches, leads to fallen standard of

education, brings about policy inconsistency and sommersaults, truncates academic calendar with strike actions, lace Nigerian schools (primary, colleges and universities) with dilapidated and overstretched learning facilities- with the universities producing graduates devoid of linkage with the manpower demand by the nation's industrial sector.

Majorly, the consequences of this malady can be spotted in two major areas; the high unemployment rate in the country, which going by the National Bureau Statistics (NBS), 2019, was at 23.1 per cent, with under-employment rate 16.6 per cent and expected to reach an all-time high of 33.5 percent in this year, 2020. The second is high rate of illiteracy level found everywhere in our country.

For one thing, I believed and still believe in the power of education. But this high rate of illiteracy which has its root in thoughtless demand for fees of varying amounts/proposed by the school authorities to cater for the gap created by the perennial underfunding is but, financially squeezing life out of the innocent students and sent many out of school.

Regardless of what others may say, this failure/failing partly accounts for the low level of development in Nigeria because the growth and development of any nation depends largely on the quantity and quality of all segments of its population. And given the huge population of out-of-school children which currently stand at over 13million, it is understandable that the overall literacy level will be low in the country.

No wonder, Akinola Aguda in his book; Nigeria's march towards perdition, among other comments noted that our economy is ill, very ill from a time dating back to only a few years after its birth; doses of poisonous matters continue to be introduced almost on continuous basis by successive administrations.

Although, President Muhammadu Buhari, recently, during the New Year broadcast on the January 1, 2020 told whoever that cares to listen that this democratic government will guarantee peace and security to realise the full

potential of our ingenious, entrepreneurial and hard-working people; that his policies are designed to promote genuine, balanced growth that delivers jobs and rewards industry. But in my opinion, looking at the deplorable state of the nation educational sector that will drive such vision/policies, achieving the promised feat will be difficult if not impossible.

The reason(s) for these voiced opinion stems from other inherent challenges discussed in the following paragraphs.

And one of the most alarming is the challenge of responsibility and control. For instance, stakeholders are worried that the control of the primary sector is neither fully in the hands of the Federal Government nor in that of the state or the local government. This is a great barrier to effective educational development at the basic level. This challenge is closely followed by the faulty methods of recruiting teachers. Because most of the teachers were not qualified but hired via favouritism, they could not be trusted to impact the right knowledge and values in the pupils and students.

So what this all means to us is that in this 2020, we may forgive other government's inactions. But we must not fail to ask government at all levels to rejig the education sector. we have a responsibility to return our education sector to the part where it can build a free and democratic society, promote a just and egalitarian society, encourage a united strong and self-reliant nation and a land of bright and full opportunities for all citizens.

To reverse this trend, we must first recognize that problem associated with the nation's education stems from the fact that as a nation, we have not applied what we learned from the national education policy. We obviously and urgently need a new vision for education in the country- 'vision that will go beyond ideology to experiment and be equal with the latest reforms at the global level'. It is not only our patriotic duties to provide this care, it's our moral duty at the most fundamental level -and we must rise to that challenge.

The tasks before NIPOST

The recent appointment of Dr Ismail Adebayo Adewusi as the Post Master General CEO of NIPOST by President Muhammadu Buhari has no doubt, put the Nigerian Postal Service on the limelight once again. Many Nigerians are beginning to ask the reason why NIPOST is constantly getting the attention of the President. According to them, since we are now in a digital era, the agency is supposed to be moribund. In their estimation, since Internet & Communication Technology (ICT) has rendered the Post inconsequential; it is a waste of time for government to pay much attention to the agency. So, in piloting the affairs of NIPOST, Dr Adewusi needs to present counter narrative to erase the unenthusiastic view of many Nigerians about the importance of NIPOST, and properly situate it through action, going forward.

Only a couple of months ago, the parent ministry to NIPOST rebranded to Ministry of Communication and Digital Economy. At the rebranding ceremony, President Muhammadu Buhari, personally superintended the occasion; thereby driving home the value placed in digitalizing the economy by the current administration. It is therefore safe, to conclude that government sees digitalization and NIPOST walking in the same direction, rather than the Post giving way for digitalization. In other words, the Post is more relevant today than before.

Although, digital economy is misconstrued in some quarters to mean "Internet Driven Economy"; this viewpoint is erroneous if not misleading. Internet and Communications Technology (ICT) is just real time communication module that must be complemented by real time Transportation and critical infrastructure that enhances commerce and distribution in the country. The combination of these components gives meaning to Digital Economy. According to report, 2/3 of the wealth of Jeff Bezos, the words richest man, is attributed to amazon's interaction with US Postal Service. Many people place order on amazon via internet, but the goods they ordered for, are transported to them. Again, the world's most famous online supermarket, Alibaba, makes use of Postal Services around the globe to distribute goods to costumers. Similarly, most online supermarkets in Nigeria make use of NIPOST infrastructure to reach their costumers in the country.

If this writer may ask, has any Nigerian bothered to ask those companies involved in pyramid marketing, why they don't have offices in the nooks and crannies of Nigeria? The obvious answer is, they don't have the huge capital required to setup offices throughout Nigeria. Nigerians can see clearly here that for digital economy to have meaning, NIPOST must drive it. There is no way digital economy can drive itself.

Leading economies in the world, without exception, have functional Postal Services. This, perhaps, made the immediate former PMG of NIPOST, Barrister Bisi Adegbuyi to say thus: "there is nexus between advance economy and Postal Service". For instance, USA, Britain, France, Italy, China, Japan, Germany and Netherlands just to mention but few, have functional and effective Postal Service. Their respective economies are also digitally operated.

This writer had previously urged the federal government to leverage on NIPOST spread to drive its Social Intervention Programmes (SIPs), in my article. Although, the extent to which government adhered to my suggestion cannot be determined here but suffice to say that the progress made by NIPOST in the area of collaboration

with other agencies of government in deepening economic activities, has been encouraging. It is expected that Dr Adewusi will take this to even higher level. Now that NIRSAL Microfinance Bank is operational in NIPOST offices across Nigeria, driving the social investment programmes of the government should be very easy.

All that is needed now is for Dr Adewusi-led NIPOST and Sadiya Umar Farouq-led Ministry for Humanitarian Affairs, Disaster Management and Social Development to work out modalities on how the SIP programmes can be dispensed to achieve even further spread in the country; taking advantage of NIPOST offices throughout the seven hundred and seventy four (774) local government areas in Nigeria. Deploying NIPOST to drive the government SIPs, is one sure way of effectively activating and lubricating digital economy which government places high premium on. It is a well known fact that the real driver of a given economy is micro-economic activity. Fortunately, Dr Adewusi, is an accomplished economist who has been tested and trusted; he knows the importance of sustaining economic activities at the rural areas. There is no doubt that NIPOST under his leadership will live up to expectation if government buys the idea of leveraging on the agency to drive its SIPs.

To this writer, the best befitting farewell President Muhammadu Buhari can get is to win the Nobel Prize on peace before 2023. How government manages its SIPs will go a very long way in paving the way for the President to win the coveted prize. The noble prize committee had established long ago that there is nexus between lifting people out of poverty and peace; when it awarded the 2006 peace prize to Bangladesh Muhammad Yunus and Grameen bank. It will be recalled that Muhammad Yunus the Grameen Bank were jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize "for their efforts through microcredit to create economic and social development from below". The reason given by Norwegian Nobel Committee for the award was that; "lasting peace cannot be achieved unless large population groups find ways in which to break out of poverty" and that "across cultures and civilizations, Yunus and Grameen Bank have shown that even the poorest of the poor can work to bring about their own development".

Since NIRSAL Microfinance bank, operational in NIPOST offices across Nigeria which is equivalent to Grameen bank in Bangladesh, is already in place, what government should do is to summon the will to reposition NIPOST across Nigeria to be able to effectively drive the SIPs so that no part of the country is left untouched, in terms of benefitting from the programmes. By this, the digital economy drive of federal government would have become a living reality; as a result of expected booming of micro economic activities at the rural areas of the country.

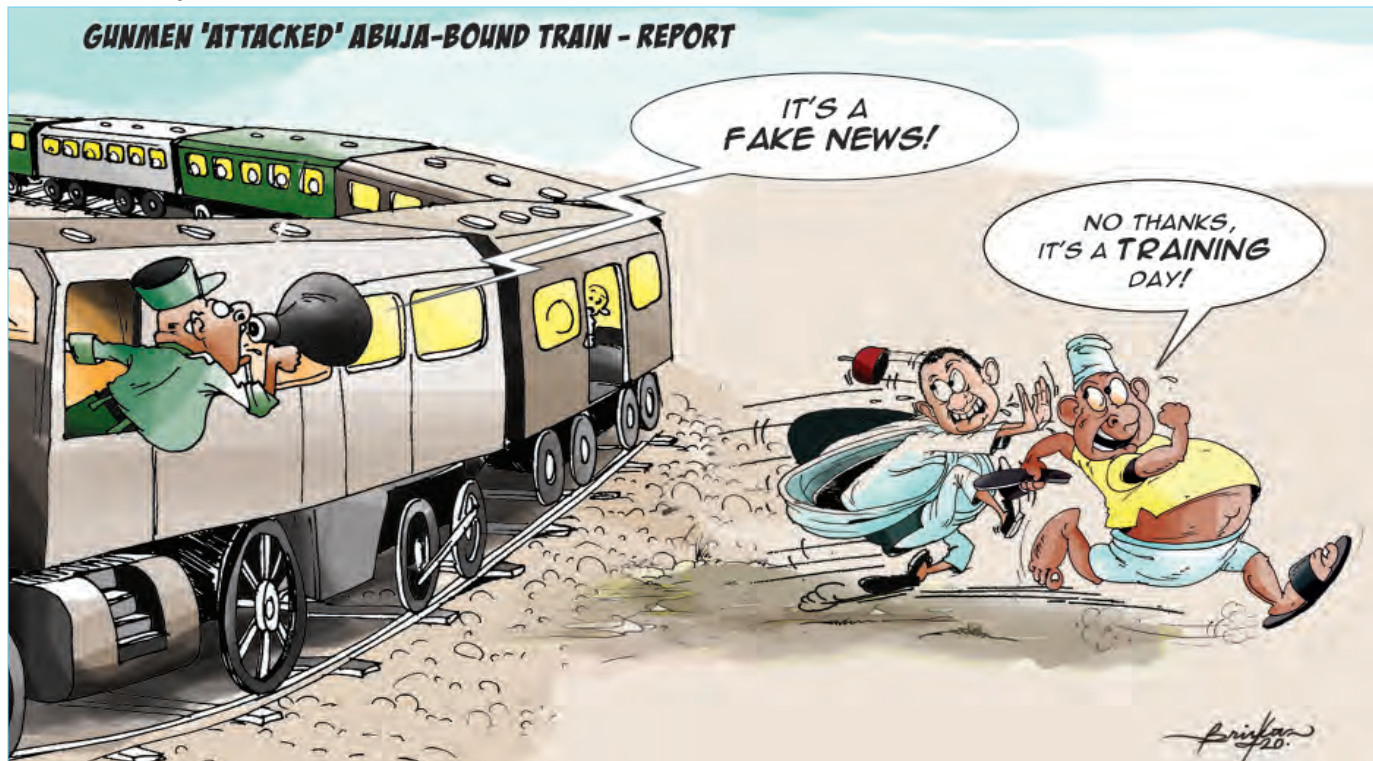

Repositioning the Air Force for greater efficiency

In its 55 years as a professional fighting force, the Nigerian Air Force (NAF) has had its fair share of neglect and setbacks, just like any other national sectors. However, in July 2015, President Muhammadu Buhari appointed Air Marshal Sadique Baba Abubakar, as the 20th Chief of the Air Staff (CAS).

In the last four years, plus, of being at the helms of affairs, the Abubakar-led administration has recruited 7,693 airmen/airwomen while 669 officers have been commissioned. Currently, about 206 Direct Short Service Commission (DSSC) officer cadets are undergoing training at the Military Training Centre (MTC), Kaduna. Before now, the number of recruits into the NAF was just 500 per training cycle. However, with the expansion of the training facilities at the MTC, the number of recruits has now increased to 2,500.

Aside increasing the manpower due to the new force structure to maintain the integrity of the air space, emphasis is also geared towards enhanced professionalism of personnel. In the last four and half years, the NAF has trained

officers, airmen and airwomen in different categories of air and ground functions. The Service has winged 92 pilots while several other pilots are undergoing various flying training courses. On the whole, about 1,500 re-currency and advanced flying training courses have been conducted for NAF pilots, both locally and abroad, in the last 4 years.

The recent historic winging of NAF's first female fighter pilot, Flying Officer Kafayat Sanni, and first female combat helicopter pilot, Flying Officer Tolulope Arotile - decorated alongside 11 other young officers after successful completion of their flying training courses speaks to the depth and sweep of the bold, inclusive vision of the Chief of the Air Staff, Air Marshal Sadique Abubakar in repositioning the force.

The training has not been limited to pilots, engineers and technicians but equally extended to other operational and administrative personnel. More than 15,114 different training courses have been conducted within the same period. The story is the same across all trades and specialties in the NAF for

both commissioned and non-commissioned officers. The NAF now has a much more competent professional force to undertake missions for effective and efficient service delivery.

The Regiment Specialty, tasked with the responsibility of protecting NAF bases and assets as well as national assets like Airports, was relatively ill-equipped with inadequate manpower due to years of neglect.

Today, the Regiment Specialty, under the leadership of Air Marshal Sadique Abubakar, has not only been reorganized, but adequately equipped and its personnel retrained both at home and abroad to effectively defend NAF Bases and other critical national assets against attacks as well as emerging security threats in the country.

In 2015, the current NAF administration took a bold step to initiate two separate training programmes for the development of the capacity of personnel of the Regiment Specialty. The first, in collaboration with the Israeli Four Troops Team, was for the development of Special Forces (SF) capabilities for

the NAF while the second, in collaboration with the British Military Advisory Training Team (BMATT), was for training in Force Protection in Complex Air Ground Environment (FPCAGE). Aside from the local training, some of the elements of the NAF SF have also been trained in Belarus and Pakistan.

The SF was established to deal with the dynamism of contemporary security challenges whilst ensuring base defence and protection of NAF air assets and critical installations.

For an air force previously beset by significant deficits in funding, equipment, logistics, updated combat doctrine, the Chief of Air Staff, Air Marshal Abubakar has moved unrelentingly to change the narrative and reposition the force to better confront and defeat the foe, on multiple fronts. Significantly, in the heat of conflict, Air Marshal Abubakar has also ensured that the NAF continues to remain apolitical, professional and commendably responsive in the discharge of its constitutional roles.

Meanwhile, parties are to maintain the status quo ante pending the hearing and determination of the motion on notice."

Subsequently, the court adjourned the matter to 22nd January, 2020.

Now, the author of the malicious write-up in Daily Trust no doubt expects the Hon. Minister, FCT, to fling the court order into the gutter and proceed to execute the author's illegal bidding in a democratic dispensation of rule of law!

LG Chairmen: S/Court rationalises governors' powers

The Supreme Court of Nigeria in a five man panel headed by Justice Olubolade Joe in a unanimous judgement delivered on December 11, 2019 strips state governors of the power to sack elected local government (LG) chairmen and councillors. The appointment of caretaker chairmen by state governors has also been banned by the same court ruling. The Supreme Court ruled that henceforth 'the act giving legislative powers to state Assembly members to undertake the process of sacking elected local government chairmen is null and void'. The panel of judges unanimously declared that only the legislative arm of a LG Council is empowered with the residual constitutional backing to sack council chairmen that maybe found blameworthy of any gross misconduct or violations of rules guiding public servants.

This judgement is sequel to an appeal filed by 16 Ekiti state LG chairmen who were elected during Ayodele Fayose's tenure as Ekiti state Governor and were sacked by the incumbent Governor Kayode Fayemi of Ekiti state. This Supreme Court judgement has finally put an end to the abuse of power by state assemblies and governors who sack elected LG chairmen at will. Justice Olubolade Joe-led panel also directed that a copy of the judgement should be served to all 36 State Houses of Assembly and the Minister of FCT on or before the December 30, 2019.

This is a landmark judgement that will guarantee the survival of democracy in the country. The judgement has not only defined where exclusive powers should begin and possible end but will forestall flagrant abuse of executive powers by state governors. Over the years, local governments in Nigeria have become the weeping child of many state governors. Their mandate and even constitutional roles have been reduced to being mere 'errand aides' whose survival in office is at the mercy of state governors. At the slightest opportunity, governors dissolve local government councils who came into office through an electoral process; most times at the detriment of the affected electorate.

As elected representatives of their people, LG chairmen and councilors are expected to be accountable to the people whose votes brought them into office, and not state governors. If governors elected into office cannot be removed by the President except by state legislators through legislative procedures in the state assembly, why then should other than the legislative arm of the LG decide when an elected LG chairman should leave office? States where governors that have in the past sacked elected LG councils include Abia in 2006, Imo in 2011, Rivers in 2012, Ondo in 2008, Edo in 2012, Bayelsa in 2013 and Plateau in 2015.

LG is the third tier of government in a federal system. It is the closest tier of government to the people and was created to stimulate development in rural communities. Local government provides opportunities for people to express themselves with regards to everything that concern their well-being. It enables people to choose their representatives that will, on their behalf, take care of their local affairs.

While this Supreme Court ruling seeks, in effect, to strengthen democratic principles at a level that has become vulnerable in Nigeria, it should not be seen by elected LG chairmen or councilors as an autonomy to abandon the ethics of good governance in order to become reckless and lawless in the discharge of their statutory mandate. LG chairmen should avoid replicating the embarrassing scenario that characterize power-politics at the second tier of government where governors decides the wind that blows across state legislature.

On the other hand, members of the legislative arm of the LG structure are urged to guard against reducing themselves to mercenaries used by a LG chairman (as the head of the executive arm) to hire and fire a speaker (as head of the legislative arm). We recommend that the ongoing amendment to the country's 1999 Constitution by the 9th session of the national assembly should capture this Supreme Court judgement. Unless this is done, the Supreme Court may not have had its last sitting on this matter.

On US government's Nigeria classification

There is need to look more closely at the recent US government classification on a Special Watch List (SWL) of countries "that have engaged in or tolerated severe violations of religious freedom" and its varied reaction from different quarters particularly by the Sultan of Sokoto. The fall-out and implications of the US official categorization needs to be properly contextualized and its background well analyzed beyond screaming headlines. My intervention is to present the facts available for the simple reason that the current Yuletide period not be marred by religious shadow boxing.

Anybody that has carefully understudied the Sultan's reaction to the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom's recent classification of Nigeria will notice that His Eminence was more pissed off with CAN's position than with the Americans, authors of the report in the first place. The retired armored corps general is not only a distinguished alumnus of NIPSS but had served as Nigeria's Defence Attache to Saudi Arabia and Pakistan. Both of those countries are major strategic partners to the US.

Meanwhile the presenter of the report Secretary of State, Michael Pompeo is also a retired military officer that was to top of his class at West Point and the immediate past Director of the CIA that is why the report is so comprehensive that it included an entire section detailing how Nigeria is a huge recipient of financial assistance for Conflict Resolution, Violence Prevention, Anti-Corruption and electoral management support including various forms of humanitarian assistance. The Americans were also concerned in the report about a total of \$435 million they had given to Nigeria in 2018 to cover the foregoing initiatives. Little wonder the varied official responses of the Nigerian government was not only so peripheral but lacked cohesion.

First, the Minister for Information Lai Mohammed stated that the US had based its report on the narratives of "failed politicians and disgruntled elements" Second, Garba Shehu speaking on behalf of the Presidency stated the American report "had no immediate implication for Nigeria" Third, Femi Adesina still on behalf of Aso Rock Villa affirmed "nobody has appointed the US as a global policeman" None of these responses addressed any of the fundamental issues raised by the American report which was prefaced with Key Finding and concluded with US Policy. The moral here is simply: If any nation doesn't want the US not to interfere with its "internal affairs" don't collect their money under any guise!

The same could be said of the British which on July 8, 2019 their Foreign Secretary Jeremy Hunt stated on a similar note stated on religious persecution allegations put together by an independent body "the report highlights different views of the causes of conflict between largely Muslim herders and Christian farmers in the central belt of Nigeria".

Then came the preliminary

report of the United Nations Special Rapporteur on Extra-Judicial Killings, Summary or Arbitrary Executions, Agnes Callamand who visited Nigeria for a 12-day working visit in which she openly accused the Federal Government of "presiding an injustice pressure cooker that could burst at any moment" She noted Nigeria was characterized by "high levels of resentment and grievances within and between communities, related to toxic ethno-religious narratives and extremist ideologies characterized by dehumanizing of others and denial of the legitimacy of the claims of others"

If CAN is guilty as charged for being bombastic, what complicates the matter is the doublespeak of Bala Muhammad, the widely read Saturday Columnist of Daily Trust who stated in own response "Luckily for Nigerian Muslims, we have an Answerer-in-Chief - Prof Ishaq Akintola who is permanently provoked and agitated until injustice against Muslims is ended" Malam Muhammad had earlier in his column that features in the flagship of Northern print journalism put it that "Speaking as enlightened Muslims, we always say it loud and clear that most of our Nigerian Christian fellow citizens and compatriots are quite nice people, gentle folk, unassuming humans, hospitable persons, and generally easy to deal with. We understand each other well - at work, in the neighborhood, on travel because we suffer the same insecurities, the same economic deprivations, the same social iniquities, and the same political shenanigans by political adventurers of both faiths, and of no faith at all" Where Muhammad nailed it was when he put it that "That the leaders of CAN are deliberately always trying to put intractable wedges between adherents of these two faiths who, left alone would always find ways to weather their storms in the turbulent waters of a vexatious nation such as we have" I completely stand with the columnist on that point.

However, Prof Akintola's response to the Americans and CAN ironically asserted "Muslims of Southern Nigeria have been complaining of persecution for decades but America turned its deaf ears" The amir of MURIC went on "America pretends as if nothing is happening to Nigerian Muslims even when the Muslim girl-child is locked out over an ordinary headscarf which is even allowed in US schools" The Muric chieftain unwittingly validated the US report though it was not his intention. He has also reminded us that the issue between his good self and CAN is a North-South divide. The implication being when the present CAN leader and Akintola meet in a conclave of the sons of Oduduwa the rest of us will not be invited. The fact that the most contentious CAN leaders are always from the South is what Northerners across the religious divide should never over look in the Nigerian political space.

One cannot conclude any topic under inter-religious matters in Nigeria without mentioning the Catholic Bishop of Sokoto who curiously has not added his

opinion to the Babel of discordant voices - yet. Perhaps for good reason he concurrently addressed what can best be regarded as the root cause of the current spate of inter-religious distrust and mutual suspicion in Nigeria by in the open accusing President Buhari of "nepotism". Matthew Hassan Kukah further explained that the present attitudes of the president were causing tension and anxiety in the country. The cleric clarified "I am not speaking as a Christian but because I am a Nigerian" His Lordship concluded "even Northern elites are not happy" Is the Bishop being brazenly partisan or unfair to President Buhari? I have my doubts because as far back as October 1, 2015 the Bishop affirmed "I have listened to Nigerians sing praises of General Buhari as a morally ramrod Muslim, God fearing, a disciplined officer, a patriot and an incorruptible man. I do not disagree with these sentiments. Some like me have known the man for the better part of 20 years and can even claim some level of friendship and greater familiarity than most".

On a final note no insight on the complex inter-religious relationship between Christians and Muslims has been proffered beyond the thought provoking intervention courtesy of the Zaria native Nigerian-Arab, Dr. Hakeem Baba Ahmed the Chief of Staff of Senate President of Bukola Saraki during the 8th Assembly, who so eloquently put it that in the North "Being Christian or Muslim is a valuable currency, or a virtual death sentence" The one-time Political Science lecturer at UDUS and now a major stakeholder at Baze University went on "In the last 25 years, thousands of Northerners have died in the hands of fellow Northerners in the name of religion. The two communities have drifted apart, but they have nowhere to go" Dr. Baba Ahmed was reacting to the face-off between Bishop Kukah and Prof. Ango Abdullahi that took place on Saturday, October 29, 2011 at the Arewa Hall in Kaduna venue of the book launch of the memoirs of Prof David Adamu Baikie CON. The guest lecturer was Malam Sanusi Lamido Sanusi, then CBN governor who addressed a crême of both Christian and Muslim Northerners at a banquet hall associated with the life and times of Sir Ahmadu Bello. Malam Hakeem, the former INEC Secretary when the electoral body was NEC under IBB added "The North is only as strong as the unity of its people, and its weaknesses which are being exploited both by Northerners who ride to power and wealth through exploitation of faith, as well as other regions which exploit its heterogeneous nature will be paid for by all Northerners"

The Secretary of the Kaduna State Government under Colonel Hamed Ali concluded "There should be no terms and conditions for being a Northerner, but unity has to be a product of hard work, sacrifice and justice. What the North needs is to produce a leadership which can provide this: because without it, its Christians and Muslims will all be victims".

Yobe community appeals for reconstruction of deplorable road

Some residents of Jajere, Fune local government area of Yobe State, have decried the poor condition of the road linking Tikau, Jajere and other villages.

Kanem Trust gathered that the road was constructed over 15 years ago and covers a distance of 45 kilometers, which used to take motorists less than 25 minutes to cover but they now spend up to two hours due to its state of dilapidation.

Mallam Shehu Umar, a resident and a businessman in the area, who said he plies the road almost three times a week, said the journey on the road was becoming unbearable to passengers and vehicle owners.

"The road is presently looking beyond rehabilitation due to its deplorable condition," he added.

Umar noted that the many villagers used the road to convey their goods to markets in the area.

"During last year's rainy season, most of the businessmen using the road found it difficult to transport their commodities to the nearby markets while many people could not visit their relatives due to the dilapidation of the road" he said.

He said apart from the commercial activities, residents around the area are considered among the active voting population with an

estimated 600,000 voters.

Wakili Buba, a driver and one of the community leaders in the area, said not less than 1000 passengers and more than 100 trucks ply the poor road every week.

Buba, who spoke to our correspondent on phone, said passengers were at the mercy of God each time their vehicle spoils on the road.

"I pity the hardship passengers go through especially during rainy season because many drivers suspend trips on the road," he lamented.

He said rehabilitation Tikau-Jajere road is a dream of many of them living around that axis, adding that they have complained severally to the relevant authorities but their effort have not yielded the positive result.

He urged the state government and all other stakeholders in the area to join hands in reconstructing the road.

"We are seriously soliciting urgent reconstruction of the road. It will boost the economy of the state by increasing the Internally Generated Revenue IGR."

Kanem Trust gathered the Yobe State Governor Mai Mala Buni, in his inaugural speech on May 29, 2019 pledged to reconstruct the Tikau-Jajere road.

"In fulfilment of our campaign promises government will construct Gujba-Ngalda road, Daura-Maluri-Maiduwa roads,

Tikau-Jajere and completion of the Yusufari Machina Trans Sahel road. We shall extend this to many other communities as we intend to execute them in phases" the

governor had promised.

When our correspondent visited the ministry of works, the commissioner was not on seat and could not be reached on phone.

"In the night I used pieces of wrapper to tie the tubes to avoid him from spoiling his body. When he passed stool I used wrapper to clean it and apply perfume all over his body.

"Initially his father used to buy sterilize diaper at the cost of N42,000 but later he couldn't because he was sacked from his job at the local government."

Aisha broke down in tears when our Yobe State correspondent handed the money to her.

She said it was the happiest day of her life and she would use the money to set up small business at home to take care herself and the children.

I'm a Christian with 2 titles from Shehu of Borno - Zanna

Recently the Shehu of Borno turbaned Baba Madami Auta as Zanna Sotoma of Borno, the first Christian in the state to be so honoured. He told *Kanem Trust* how he feels about the honour done to him.

Briefly tell us about yourself?

My name is Beta Madami Auta. My father's name is Baba Madami Auta and my mother's name is Yathlama Madaki Auta. I was born on 2nd August 1950. I'm from Biu, I did my primary school at Marama and attended Borno Teachers College. From the teachers college I went to Ahmadu Bello University Zaria for my diploma and degree courses.

I started work as a clerk in 1972 at Barclays Bank in Gombe. I later left for ABU for my degree course after which I returned to Barclays Bank which later became Union Bank. I worked with Union Bank till 1983 when then Bank of Credit and Commerce employed me and from there I moved to Owena Bank and retired in 1993 as Controller North.

Are you from a royal family?

I'm not from a royal family but my father was almost like a royalty because he was the Madakin Jos as far as 1962 or 1963. So I can't say we are not part of the royalty. Since then he has been a leader in the community. So I can say we are part of the royalty.

You were turbaned as Wakili of Shehu of Borno in Kaduna?

Yes the late Shehu of Borno appointed me as the Wakili Shehu of Borno in 2007. After his demise the present Shehu of Borno reappointed me and even gave me a special cap as Wakilin Shehu of Borno and

I served him up to 2019. This means from 2007 to 2019 I have been on this position of Wakili.

During that period, I was opportuned to serve as a community leader. I was able to represent him so many times here in Kaduna, Abuja, Borgu, Niger State, Bayelsa and so many other places. So far so good there has not been anything he asked me to do that I did not do.

What led to your appointment as Wakili despite the fact that you are not from a royal family?

Well there is a Hausa proverb that said "Idan Allah ya ce zaka yi sai ka yi", which translates: if God said you will be you will be. And God chooses anybody because I can't say I'm the best, I can't say I'm the richest and I can't say I'm the most well-read. But I believe it is God's choice.

Recently you were also conferred with another title of Zanna Sotoma of Borno. How did you feel?

I was so happy I couldn't believe my ears when I heard it the first time and when they brought the letter officially to me as the Zanna Sotoma of Borno (Chief Host) and the Wakilin Shehu of Borno - holding two titles at the same time, I felt so happy and I thank God Almighty and I also thank the Shehu of Borno for bestowing these positions on me. May his throne and kingdom be healthy, peaceful and prosperous. May God continue to protect us.

With the new title what will be your new role?

My role is almost as before

but now I'm the chief host of the Shehu of Borno and since I do represent him in various places it has strengthened me now. I can represent him as Wakili and also as Zanna. Which means I can take better decisions, work better and serve better.

Are you the first person to hold those two titles in the emirate?

Yes, this is the first time because I was holding one before, now I have the second. **You are a Christian yet**

you have been conferred with these titles. How do you see the gesture vis-a-vis coexistence between the two religions?

As I earlier said, with my appointment as Wakilin Shehu of Borno and Zanna Sotoma of Borno, I believe the Shehu of Borno should be commended. I wish other emirs and chiefs would emulate him. This is because he knows very well that I'm a Christian, and not even a Kanuri man, but he bestowed

the titles on me.

This shows he is a father and leader to all. If you are a leader and have a large heart and an open mind, that will make people to serve you better. Your people will be proud to serve you and you too will be proud to serve them.

So what the Shehu of Borno did showed the people of Borno that he is a leader to all and he has nothing to hide.

What is your message to people in your community?

My message is not only for my community but to the whole people of Borno that we should work for peace. We should make sure that this country is not polluted. A lot of things happening now are rumour and not good for this country. I can tell you that I'm a Christian but for the past 10 years now every fasting period I used to invite sheikhs and reverends to a big hall alongside 300 to 500 people to drink and eat together.

We preach peace and I tell people that this should be encouraged. I have hosted it for the past 10 years but I couldn't this 2019 because my wife was sick then. She died so I couldn't do it.

I tell people that if they emulate what I'm doing in Kaduna State nationwide, that will bring peace and unity.

So I encourage all those holding positions to do same and encourage people to promote peace during festive periods. We should come together and preach peace to our people and children. I pray for peaceful coexistence in Nigeria.

The monarch also expressed gratitude to Borno State Governor Babagana Zulum for the assistance.

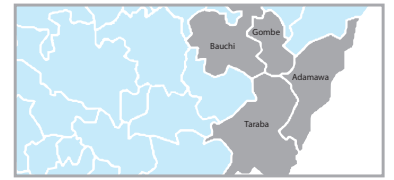

Taraba community opens cattle market to boost economy

The Mutumbiyu community, Gassol Local Government Area in Taraba State has opened a cattle market aimed at boosting economic activities in the area.

The Chairman of Mutumbiyu Development Association, Alhaji Tukura Julde told North East Trust in an interview that the market would solve the problem of pastoralists travelling long distances to take their cattle to markets.

He said the area had large population of pastoralists who complain of long distances they cover to reach neighbouring cattle markets.

Alhaji Tukura Julde said the main occupations of people in the chieftom are farming, fishing and cattle rearing due to vast grazing land and rivers that provide water all year-round.

He said although the town could boast of a big grain and fish markets there has not been a cattle market in

the area until now.

The chairman said they got a donation of the land from the Chief of Mutumbiyu, Alhaji Sani Muhammed,

where they established the cattle market.

He said few months before the market was opened wide consultation was held with

all stakeholders including pastoralist, cattle merchants and it was agreed that the market should hold every Saturday.

He said he was impressed with the turn out of both pastoralists and cattle merchants at the market when it started operation last Saturday.

Alhaji Tukura Julde said the management of the market have plans to build stalls, borehole and parking space soon to ensure hitch-free operations.

He said stakeholders have agreed to ban night movement of cattle into the market to avoid theft.

He, however, called on security agents, especially the police, to assist in providing security on market days and reduce the number of check points along roads leading to the market.

The Chief of Mutumbiyu chieftom, Alhaji Sani Muhammed also said the market would boost the economy of both the local council and the community.

He urged those charged with running of the market to be honest in their activities in order to attract cattle merchants and owners to the market.

1,500 benefit from Nigerian Army free medical outreach in Gombe

More than 1,500 less privileged have benefitted from a free medical outreach conducted by the Defence Headquarters at Kurugu village in Kwami Local Government Area of Gombe state.

The outreach was carried out through the Operation Safe Corridor, a programme for De-radicalisation, Rehabilitation and Reintegration (DRR) of ex-Boko Haram fighters.

Speaking at its flagging-off yesterday at the Kurugu village, Commandant of the DDR Camp in Gombe, Brigadier General Musa Ibrahim, said the intervention was to provide free medical services to the less privileged members of their host communities.

"We are targeting 1,500 people in Kurugu village, which is one of the immediate host communities of the DRR camp. Our target is to win their heart in order

"During the outreach, our medical team will provide different services ranging from medical check-up for different ailments, eyes and dental care, Paediatric and surgical operations among others which comes at no cost," he said.

The commandant added that through the operation safe corridor programme, they also provided beddings, mattresses and dug

boreholes in a secondary school located opposite the DRR camp.

The Director of Primary Health Care of Kwami LGA, Umar Musa expressed satisfaction with the medical outreach conducted by the army, saying it has tremendously helped and will have positive impact on people of the community.

Some of the beneficiaries of the outreach expressed satisfaction with the services provided by the medical team.

Malama Aishatu Isa, 70, who was diagnosed and given drugs for an eye ailment, said she has been suffering from the problem for many years.

How volunteers bring succour to Bauchi hard-to-reach communities

For many communities in the remote areas of Bauchi state their access to health care services now largely depends on the 1,200 volunteers engaged by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF).

The programme, tagged: Community Oriented Resource Persons (CORPS), now provides basic health care needs in the hard-to-reach communities of the state.

The 1,200 CORPS volunteers, who came from each ward in the areas, were trained in Integrated Community Case Management (ICCM) of common childhood illnesses including malaria, diarrhoea and pneumonia. They were also provided with working kits, tools as well as necessary agents necessary for easy diagnosis and treatment of children aged two to 59 months.

The volunteers were also trained to identify and refer serious cases to the nearest Primary Health Centres. Health workers from the main PHC in each ward where the CORPs operate were also trained to supervise the volunteers.

In addition, 45 health workers, including (Nurses/midwives, Community Health Extension Workers and Record Officers) were engaged to visit and render other services such as ante-natal care, post-natal care, management of labour and nutritional screening.

Chief of Field Office, UNICEF Nigeria, Bauchi Field Office, Bhanu Pathak, said the scheme had treated 68,000 out of the 93,000 children who were brought in with malaria, diarrhoea and

pneumonia since the start of the programme in 2017.

Similarly more than 8,000 pregnant women were attended to during the period.

Given further successes recorded under the programme the Coordinator Maternal and Neonatal Child Health Dass LGA, Saratu Muhammed, told North East Trust that the intervention had raised the number of pregnant women who attended antenatal care and delivered at health facility from about 200 monthly to about 500.

A CORPS member, Yusuf Hashimu of Ren village in Dass LGA, said he was given a register, drugs including and chart booklet to aid his work.

"I treated over 400 children suffering from malaria, diarrhoea, pneumonia and throughout this period only one child resisted to the drugs I administered on him.

I referred him to the PHC at Polchi.

"My greatest joy is that I contributed my quota in alleviating the suffering in our community. This project, I believe, has great impact on all of us."

Another volunteer, Mato Idi, who operates at Gundin village, said he has learnt a lot since he joined the scheme.

Idi said he has learnt that during the rainy season there is a surge in cases of malaria and cough due to the weather which caused a large turnout of people at the health centre.

"We are helping to reduce the load on the health facilities by attending to some of the children at home. Our major focus is those who are under five years."

A female volunteer, Saadiya Samaila of Dalan village, said: "We were trained on how to take a blood sample check it out on a Rapid Diagnose Test kit. If it's positive we

give drugs that have been provided. We also refer cases that are beyond our capacity to healthcare facilities.

"I have been attending to children in our settlement whose parents, in the past, were unwilling to take them to the hospital for treatment because of their traditional beliefs, economic hardship and bad roads to a healthcare facility. I am extremely happy to be part of the project because I feel very proud to contribute to the health of people in my community especially children and women."

A beneficiary and mother of six in Ren village, Salma Rabo, said she was happy with the free medical services they are receiving.

"We are happy with the free medical services for our children as it has relieved our sufferings. It takes us three hours to access healthcare in Dass because sometimes

we have to cross rivers and hills. The worst experience is during the rainy period when many of our children and women are affected by diseases like malaria, pneumonia and cough. We are grateful for the medical outreach team that has been sent to us to treat some of our illnesses. We pray that it continues."

Another beneficiary in Dalan village, who took her son to one of the volunteers for malaria treatment, Zuwaira Muhammed said the outreach has changed their way of thinking.

"Before the UNICEF programme many children died as a result of absence of health services in this community and because we were not taking them to hospitals. We relied on herbs and traditional healers.

"This intervention has created a lot of benefits to the people including the awareness on the importance to healthcare services."

Dauda Ibrahim Gurama, Community leader in Polchi, thanked UNICEF for improving access to healthcare services especially for women and children.

"This intervention has made our community to embrace primary healthcare services and abandon traditional healers. We are appealing to Bauchi state government to sustain it."

Similarly, Shu'aibu Chede, the Village Head of Dalan in Dass LGA, said that the intervention had reduced the difficulties they face in accessing healthcare services. "We are seeing progress because majority of children are being treated for free."

"Before we used traditional healers but now the coming of the outreach to our village has change the people.

Yola FMC gets facility to accommodate in-patients relations

Relief came the way of relatives of in-patients at Federal Medical Center (FMC) Yola, as two philanthropists donated two buildings to serve as accommodation while they look after their relations.

North East Trust reports that persons looking after in-patients at the hospital were being forced to sleep in the open, along the corridors or under staircase.

The situation often resulted in the littering of the environment while exposing them to diseases.

However, in a bold move to solve the problem, the hospital's management

She commended the donors for making life easier to family members of patients as they could now do laundry, cook their food and other chores without restriction.

Usman Toungo from Toungo Local Government Area, said he was happy with the facility and urged other wealthy persons to emulate the gesture.

He said with the new facility they no longer sleep outside or under staircases.

In an interview with North East Trust, the Medical Director of the hospital, Professor Awwal Abubakar, noted that the facility had ameliorated the suffering of many people who came from far places to stay with their sick relatives at the hospital.

He said the facilities also helped to decongest the wards and hospital corridors, giving nurses and other medical workers more space to perform their duties without hindrance.

He also noted that the new measure had resulted in significant reduction in cases of theft in hospital wards.

of the state or not."

"Last year, people were evacuated, but this year nothing of such happened because our people listened to our jingles warning them of the danger and asking them to relocate. This has helped us to manage the situation better," he said.

Responding on behalf of the council chairmen, Mrs. Stella Ugiagbe from Ovia South West, commended governor Obaseki for providing succor to victims and declared support for his administration.

A/Ibom Village Head raises alarm over threats to lives

The Village Head of Idung Udoette Oniok Village in the Edo group of villages of Esit Eket local government area in Akwa Ibom State, Prince Henry Abia, has raised an alarm over alleged threats to lives of his subjects.

Abia said his people have been continuously threatened by a cult group allegedly recruited and funded by an oil company.

Speaking yesterday in a statement in Uyo, the village head alleged that the company, Frontier Oil, is using the group as its strike force to "harass, destroy and molest innocent young men and women whenever there are contending issues between it and the host communities."

The monarch explained that the relationship between the communities and the company degenerated in 2016 when an oil spill was discovered.

He stated that since then, there have been series of clashes between the company and the host communities.

He said the recent clash happened when the company acquired land for right of way for its gas pipeline and failed to pay compensation to the people for their farmlands, fish ponds and other things destroyed in creating the way.

He noted that when his

people complained, the company recruited thugs to terrorise the community on a daily basis.

Abia recalled that on December 9, 2019, when the people led a peaceful protest against the company, it unleashed its killer squad against the people and the security agents who were drafted to maintain peace during the protest.

He said the 'killer squad' broke into his palace and destroyed property estimated at millions of naira and damaged other peoples' houses.

Abia called on the federal and state governments to declare a state of emergency in the area to address insecurity posed by the activities of the cultists.

Reacting to the allegations, Public Affairs and Community Relations Officer of Frontier Oil, Mr Sam Atara described the allegations as unfounded and false and urged the public to disregard the allegations.

He said Frontier Oil is a corporate organisation with a subsisting Memorandum of Understanding with its host communities, adding that the allegations are spearheaded by few members of the community.

He said: "The allegations are unfounded and false and are spearheaded by one or two members of the community. Disregard these as untruths."

He said as a private businessman, Ugwa has carried several life touching projects for the good of his people, urging him to do more.

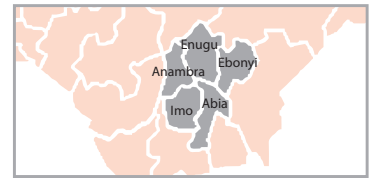

Abia Govt awards contract for the rehabilitation of bridge after report

It was a moment of jubilation in the community when the Abia State government began the construction of a brand new bridge for the people of Amoji Imenyi

The award for the reconstruction of the bridge came few days after the attention of the Governor, Dr Okezie Ikpeazu was drawn to a report published by *Daily Trust* on May 31, 2019 with the caption "How Abia Community was cut by a collapsed bridge"

According to the report a number of villages that make up of the community have been cut off due to the collapse of the bridge. As the result many found it difficult to visit markets to sell their products while some children and teachers had stopped going to schools.

The Commissioner for Information and Strategy, Chief John Okiyi Kalu had told our correspondent that the governor was not happy with the situation when he read the report on the collapsed bridge.

He said the governor summoned the then Transition Committee Chairman of Bende Local Government Area, Mr P.C Onyegbu, who narrated the plight of the people to the governor especially during the rainy season.

Though the commissioner refused to disclose the cost of the contract, but sources said the governor approved the sum of N40 million.

Our correspondent, who visited the bridge's site found that work was going in earnest.

According to the contractor, who identified himself simply as Engr. Mba, the engineers have redesigned the bridge to make it stronger.

He said he decided to embark on the job during the rainy season so as to ensure that the project was properly done.

He said they have planned to finish the work by the end of January.

Finally, Imo community abolishes 'Osu' caste system

Henceforth it is a taboo for anybody in Abba clan in Nwangele local government area of Imo state to refer to a fellow indigene as an outcaste (Osu/Ohu or Ume).

It is also an offence to segregate anybody on account of being an outcaste.

This was the resolution of the entire community when they gathered to do away with the age old caste system, which had dogged Igbo race for centuries.

The journey to the ceremony, which started on November 2, with a sensitisation programme to all the four autonomous communities of Umuokwara, Umudurunna, Ekitiafor and Ogwuaga, and the daughters of Abba (Umuada), culminated on December 3, with the rites of abrogation performed by the traditional title holders (Ndi Nze na Ozo and Oji Ofo) and witnessed by a delegation from Nri Ancient Kingdom, said to be sphere of religious and political influence in Igboland.

Speaking at the final Christian renunciation ceremony, the Catholic Archbishop of Owerri Metropolitan Province, Archbishop JVC Obinna said that for the past 65 years he had championed the abolition of the Osu caste system. He expressed delight that Abba people have finally decided to take a major leap

in the abrogation of the caste system.

He expressed optimism that with the example laid by Abba community, other communities in Imo, still deep in the practice of the obnoxious Osu system, would understand that it is out of touch with humanity.

He said: "Today in the four communities of Abba we are rejecting bad customs and behaviours. We are rejecting bad talks, insults, intimidation, unnecessary envy, looking down on fellow citizens and the worship of idols and all things associated with the Osu/Ohu and Ume caste system in Abba clan. This is the resolve and the promise we make today in the

name of Jesus Christ."

Chairman of Abba Autonomous Communities Development Union (AACDU), Nnanyereuo Paul Ozigbo, said that it was the collective will and resolve of the four communities that made up Abba clan to abolish and abrogate the system from their land.

He thanked all the indigenes of Abba at home and in The Diaspora, traditional title holders, (Ndi Nze na Ozo and Ndi Oji Ofo) for making the ceremony successful.

Traditional Ruler of Ekitiafor, Ekiti II, Eze Boniface Ononenyi Uzoma, apologised to all those who have suffered from segregation or considered as

second class citizens.

He warned that by the final renunciation ceremony, anybody or group that segregates against the other person or group of persons will be sanctioned.

The highpoint of the ceremony was the administration of mixture of salt and water on the chiefs, elders and traditional rulers from the four communities as the final rites of renunciation and act of reunion by the Archbishop.

The Osu caste system is an ancient practice in Igboland that discourages social interaction and marriage with a group of persons called Osu considered to be slaves or strangers.

Abia market fire victims solicit govt's assistance

Victims of Wednesday's fire at the Umuahia Industrial Market have appealed to the Abia government to come to their rescue to enable them to return to their business.

News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) reports that the timber section of the market was engulfed by a midday fire on the New Year day.

The leadership of the market claimed that the fire destroyed 53 shops, together with 48 machines and other valuables worth several millions of naira.

Although the cause of the fire had yet to be ascertained, the traders feared that it could be wild fire from the bush that surrounded the market.

The Chairman of the market, Mr Austin Onyenweaku, said that they only got the information about the fire around 1pm.

"We cannot say exactly the cause of the fire or when it started. We only got a phone call around 1pm that the market was on fire.

"By the time we got here, the entire timber section was already engulfed by the inferno," Onyenweaku said.

He said that it took the combined efforts of the state Fire Service personnel and traders to bring the fire under control.

He said that the level of destruction could have been worse if the fire service did

not respond in time.

Addressing the Commissioner for Trade and Investment, Cosmos Ndukwe, who was at the market on Thursday to ascertain the extent of damage, Onyenweaku said that they lost millions of property to the fire.

Also speaking, the Chairman of Umuahia Timber Dealers Association, Mr Ndubuisi Nwogu, expressed deep sorrow over the incident.

Nwogu said that their members suffered "colossal loss" to the fire, adding that "53 shops, 48 machines and other property were completely burnt."

The two market leaders

appealed to the state government to come to their financial aid to enable them to start all over again.

In his remarks, the commissioner described the New Year day fire as "a very bad way to begin the year."

He commiserated with the victims and assured them that Gov. Okezie Ikpeazu would personally visit the market to see things for himself.

Ndukwe promised that the state government would set up a panel of inquiry to look into the cause of the fire.

He charged the leadership of the market to always take proactive measures, especially during the harmattan, to avoid a recurrence. (NAN)

NSCDC nabs 3,000 suspects over various crimes in Niger

The Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC), Niger Command, says it has arrested over 3000 suspects for committing various offences in the state in 2019.

Mr George Edem, Commandant of the Corps, announced this while addressing newsmen in Minna on the activities of the command in 2019.

Edem said that the suspects were arrested for committing offences such as kidnapping, illegal mining, vandalism and armed robbery.

According to him, the command had resolved over 2,000 cases, prosecuted 68

and convicted 39 cases within the period under review.

He said seven cases had been dismissed, while 22 were still pending, and 45 cases were transferred to the Nigeria Police, four taken to NDLEA and three to the Nigeria Immigration Service.

Edem said the Corps had also transferred 25 cases to Child Rights Act, two to NAFDAC and another two to the Standard Organisation of Nigeria.

He also disclosed that the command had recovered over N30 million from breach of trust during the year under review. (NAN)

2 die in auto crash in Niger

The Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) Command in Niger has confirmed the death of two people after an auto crash along Bida-Kutigi road in Bida Local Government Area (LGA) of the state.

The state FRSC Sector Commander, Mr Joel Dagwa disclosed this while speaking with the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) in Minna on Thursday.

Dagwa said that the accident which occurred on Wednesday involved a Toyota Camry with registration number BCH 652 QD and a motorcycle with registration number RBC 102 MJ.

He said that seven people were involved in the accident, but two were killed; one female and one male.

"We have deposited the corpses at Federal Medical Centre Bida," Dagwa said.

He blamed the incident on dangerous overtaking.

Dagwa said the corps would continue to monitor road users to guard against overloading and dangerous driving.

"We will sustain our ongoing aggressive patrols across highways to ensure that road users adhere strictly to traffic rules and regulations to avoid road accidents," he said. (NAN)

The prosecutor said that on investigation, three accused persons confessed that the fourth accused, Liadi Jinadu, sent them into the complainant's building to steal the above mentioned items.

The prosecutor further

disclosed that investigations also revealed that the four accused persons conspired and trespassed into the complainant's property.

He said that the accused persons committed offences punishable under sections 97, 348 and 287 of the penal code.

The accused persons, however, pleaded not guilty as charged.

The Senior Magistrate, Muhammad Ndakene, granted the accused persons bail in the sum of N200,000 and two sureties each in like sum.

Ndakene said that the sureties must reside within the court's jurisdiction and adjourned the case till January 23, for further mention. (NAN)

Benue community raises alarm over oil polluted wells

Kpejnde/High-level community in Naka town of Gwer West Local Government Area in Benue State has raised an alarm over the continued pollution of their hand-dug wells with substances suspected to be petroleum products.

Residents of the community told newsmen, who visited the vicinity following consistent complaints, that over 40 wells were affected, thereby causing scarcity of drinking water in the area.

They alleged that the pollution could have occurred from a nearby filling station.

The affected residents including the community leader, Angba Francis, narrated that varied challenges arising from the polluted wells, especially affecting the source of their drinking water and other domestic use had become unbearable for them.

Francis accused the only filling station in the community of the development, alleging that the pollution of the wells may have resulted from a leaking underground tank belonging to the station.

A woman, Mrs Iveren Abwa, told journalists that her

daughter was almost engulfed in flames one morning while trying to boil water she fetched from the well.

"Suddenly, before she (daughter) knew it, the fire exploded. She however sustained minor injury but for the grace of God, it could have been a different story," Abwa said.

Others residents; Nyigba Geoffery and Gerrard Ugbede, claimed that they began to notice the pollution of their

wells over three years ago and had reported the matter to the owner of the filling station, the police and the Department of Petroleum Resources (DPR).

The residents appealed to the state government, security agencies and the State House of Assembly as well as other relevant stakeholders to come to their rescue before the situation worsens.

Meanwhile, the owner of the fuel station has denied the allegations as he claimed to

have carried out assessment on his underground tanks and there was no any problem with them.

The Head of Health, Safety and Environment at DPR in Makurdi, Salihu Mohammad, confirmed that the department was aware of the situation and had requested that the community do a formal letter to enable them take up the matter by carrying out sample of the exact pollution in the wells.

Oil starts 2020 higher on trade optimism, Middle East tensions

Crude oil price yesterday began 2020 with \$66.25 up from December 2019's \$62.50 per barrel as a result of improving trade relations between the United States and China which eased demand concerns and rising tensions in the Middle East.

"We do not see a threat to Iraq's crude supply at the moment, other than a small wind down over the first few months of 2020 in line with its OPEC cut agreements," consultancy JBC Energy said.

"Nevertheless, heightened tensions in the region involving Iranian-backed forces may introduce a certain geopolitical risk," they added.

Oil was also boosted by optimism that trade talks between the world's two largest

economies will support demand.

U.S. President Donald Trump said on Tuesday the U.S.-China Phase 1 trade deal would be signed on Jan. 15 at the White House.

"We may need to see that economic optimism turn into better data before we see more substantial gains," analysts at OANDA said.

January also marks the scheduled start of deeper output cuts by the Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) and its partners, including Russia.

The group agreed to cut output by a further 500,000 barrels per day (bpd) from Jan. 1, on top of their previous cut of 1.2 million bpd.

The cuts come as Russia reported record high 2019 oil and gas condensate production C-RU-OUT of 11.25 million bpd, beating the previous record of

11.16 million bpd set a year earlier, Energy Ministry data showed on Thursday.

A fall in U.S. crude inventories last week also supported prices. U.S. crude stocks fell 7.8 million barrels in the week ended Dec. 27, 2019 compared with analysts' expectations for a decrease of 3.2 million barrels, data from the American Petroleum Institute (API) showed on Tuesday Dec. 31, 2019.

Official data from the Energy Information Administration (EIA) is due on Friday having been delayed by two days by the New Year's holiday.

In 2020, Brent is forecast to average 63.07 dollars a barrel, up from December's 2019 estimate of 62.50 dollars, while WTI is forecast to average 57.70 dollars per barrel, up from December's estimate of 57.30 dollars, a Reuter's poll showed.

Dangote's fortune increased by \$4.3bn in 2019

African richest man Aliko Dangote has significantly moved up in the World Billionaires' list as he emerged 96th richest person in the world, with an estimated worth of \$14.8 billion, as against his previous ranking of 103rd in the world.

Dangote, who remains the richest man in Africa for the 8th year running, was the only Nigerian on the list of the top 100 billionaires, as released last week by Bloomberg in its yearly billionaires list.

Jeff Bezos remains the richest in the world with \$115 billion in his kitty while Bill Gates and Bernard Arnault followed as 2nd and 3rd respectively with \$11.3 billion and \$105 billion. Warren Buffett was the fourth with \$89.3 billion on the world billionaires chart.

Dangote's estimated worth in the latest Bloomberg ranking far outstrips an earlier ranking by the Forbes Magazine, another elite publication which placed his fortune at \$10.8bn in the 2019 Forbes Africa's Billionaires' list released in January, although he retained the rank as the richest African for the 8th consecutive year in the latter ranking.

Bloomberg is a global information and technology company, that connect decision makers to a dynamic network of data, people and ideas - "accurately delivering business and financial information, news and insights to customers around the world" Bloomberg L.P. provides financial software tools such as an analytics and equity trading platform, data services, and news to financial companies and organisations through the Bloomberg Terminal.

Africa's richest man, with his improved worth of \$14.8 billion, controls Dangote Industries, a closely held conglomerate. The Lagos, Nigeria-based company owns sub-Saharan Africa's biggest cement producer, Dangote Cement, which had revenue of N901.2 billion naira (\$2.5 billion) in 2018. It also has interests in sugar, salt, flour, fertiliser and packaged food.

It would be recalled that Aliko Dangote, was also recently named as the sixth most charitable man in the World by Richtopia, a digital periodical that covers business, economics, and financial news, based in the United Kingdom. This recognition came after he endowed his foundation, the Aliko Dangote Foundation (ADF) to the tune of \$1.25 billion.

NECA advocates synergy between fiscal, monetary policies in 2020

As part of its expectations for 2020, the Nigeria Employers' Consultative Association (NECA) has called for synergy between the fiscal and monetary policies of Federal Government.

NECA's Director-General, Timothy Olawale, made the call in an interview with the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) in Lagos on Thursday.

NAN reports that NECA is the umbrella organisation of employers in the Organised Private Sector of Nigeria.

"It seems only the monetary authorities have been in the driving seat of the economy.

"For any economy to fulfil its full potential, efficiency and synergy of the fiscal and monetary authorities is critical," he said.

Olawale, on reviewing the performance of the economy in 2019, said that much was left to be desired.

According to him, the economy struggled with a growth rate average of 2 per cent in the first three quarters of 2019.

"Inflation is still in double digit, orchestrated mainly by increasing food inflation as a result of the closure of land borders in order to curb smuggling.

"Though the economy has great potential for growth, a more concerted and collaborative effort with the private sector could have made significant impact," he said.

The director-general urged the government to remain focused on implementing the Economic Recovery and Growth Plan (ERGP) as part of efforts to restore economic growth.

He also called on the government to expand the tax net to improve revenue generation, rather than focusing on tax increases that had remain burdensome to businesses. (NAN)

Enugu Airport will be ready in April – FG

The Minister of Aviation Senator Hadi Sirika yesterday said the Akanu Ibiam International Airport, Enugu, will be ready before the Easter celebration in April.

The Federal Government however decided to shut it down completely to carry out a comprehensive work on the airport and install other equipment such as instrument landing system, airfield lighting, taxi lighting, among others to aid flight operations.

The Minister spoke when he inspected the airport with

the Permanent Secretary in the Ministry, Engr. Musa Hassan; the Managing Director of the Federal Airports Authority of Nigeria (FAAN), Capt. Rabiul Yadudu and officials of the Enugu State Government.

Also on the inspection was the Chairman, House of Representatives Committee on Aviation, Hon. Nnolim Nnaji.

Daily Trust reports that the project involves the scraping and resurfacing of bad stretch of the runway which was dilapidated

According to the Minister, the Muhammadu Buhari-led government takes the completion of the Enugu Airport project seriously because of its strategic importance to the economy of the entire South Eastern Region.

He said: "I am very satisfied with the level of work. According to the programme of work approved and established by us, we are beating the deadline. As to the question of whether

Easter is feasible, indeed it is. By our programme of work, we would be leaving this runway God's willing before Easter. And that's sacrosanct by the grace of God.

"We take this job very seriously. We know the importance of Enugu, not only being an international airport, we know that it is a centre for the South Eastern part of the country, all of the commercial activities, the trading activities and festivities are domiciled and centred around this city, a very important city for that matter.

"We take it very seriously. Personally from the level of the Ministry and under the leadership of Mr. President, Muhammadu Buhari, every single assignment is in the interest of this country."

Sirika also inspected the new terminal at the airport being wholly funded by the Federal Government and undertaken by the China Civil Engineering and Construction Corporation (CCECC).

He said the terminal would be delivered by the end of 2020, saying while government secured loan to fund four terminals in Lagos, Kano, Abuja and Port Harcourt, the Enugu is being funded by the Ministry through budgetary provision.

The Minister assured the people of Enugu and all users of the airport to expect a brand new airport which would have all the modern facilities and equipment to enhance safe flight operations.

"The runway when completed will have other equipment such as the instrument landing system, airfield lighting, taxi lighting and every single equipment and system that will enhance safe flight operations," he added.

The Enugu Deputy Governor, Cecilia Ezeilo who represented Governor Ifeanyi Ugwuanyi noted that the closure of the airport is affecting "everybody in Iboland" but expressed delight on the pace of work.

REA MD, Salihijo assumes office, 2 days after appointment

The Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Rural Electrification Agency (REA) Ahmad Salihijo Ahmad has assumed office.

According to a post by the REA, the new boss was at the office yesterday and met with the management and staff of the agency.

It said the MD would continue the drive and mandate of the federal government in connecting rural areas to electricity.

The new MD, who is in his mid-thirties, is said to have vast experience on renewable energy. He worked at the Infrastructure Concession and Regulatory Commission (ICRC), and was a technical assistant to former Minister of Environment.

Salihijo from Adamawa State and son of a consultant to Buhari during his days at Petroleum Trust Fund (PTF), is the newest young person at the management level of REA.

President Muhammadu Buhari had appointed Dr. Sanusi Ohiare from Kogi in 2017 as the Executive Director, Rural Electrification Fund in the agency, supervising major solar power projects and funds from the World Bank.

Salihijo's appointment by Buhari was announced on Tuesday. It came one week after the Minister of Power, Engr. Saleh Mamman suspended the erstwhile MD of REA, Damilola Ogunbiyi over infractions. She had spent four and half years driving the agency before vacating office.

Damilola who had been appointed as the Representative of the United Nations Secretary General on Sustainable Energy for All, equally assumed duty at the UN on Thursday.

Vitafoam rewards first babies, hospital management

SMEDAN urges FG to adopt OLOP, CGS as national programmes

The Small and Medium Enterprises Development Agency of Nigeria (SMEDAN) has urged Federal Government to adopt its One Local Government, One Product (OLOP) and Conditional Grant Scheme (CGS) models as national emergency programmes.

Dr Umaru Dikko, Director-General of SMEDAN, in an interview with the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN), in Abuja on Thursday said that the two programmes if adopted would promote rural industrialisation, address unemployment, poverty and insecurity in the country.

NAN reports that these programmes are targeted at providing finance, workspace, capacity building, working capital equipment, micro insurance, formalisation and business development service to Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) operators.

Dikko said that OLOP, as one of its flagship programme was aimed at

utilising local raw materials to provide a cluster formation, machinery needed to escalate businesses and capital to increase level of production.

"When we have clusters of people who have common facilities and do common things, it will help to develop and scale up production, increase package, quantity and quality to compete globally.

This, he said was necessary especially now that Nigeria has signed the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) agreement to encourage standardised products and prevent Nigeria from being a dumping ground for other African nations.

He further said that SMEDAN also introduced the CGS which is aimed at boosting formalisation of MSMEs by providing entrepreneurship training, one year micro insurance and registration with Corporate Affairs Commission (CAC).

The Director-General noted that the



scheme is also aimed at assisting the MSMEs in opening a bank account, providing a token of N50,000 to improve business and add one person into the business to increase number of people in employment sector of the economy.

"We have a very large informal sector in Nigeria, the MSMEs constitutes 41 million.

"We must ensure that the informal sector of the micro businesses is formalised because the chances of growth and development for MSMEs operators, who are not formalised is very low.

"So we need to comply with global happenings to boost formalisation," he said.

According to him, the two programmes are in line with President Muhammadu Buhari's second tenure agenda, to create millions of jobs in Nigeria and move millions of people out of poverty. (NAN)

Africa's MTN exits towers businesses in Ghana and Uganda

MTN Group has agreed to sell its towers businesses in Ghana and Uganda as Africa's biggest mobile phone operator refocuses on high-growth markets on the continent and in the Middle East.

Clashes with regulators in

Nigeria, Uganda and elsewhere have crimped growth, prompting the company to announce a \$1 billion three-year asset-disposal plan earlier this year.

MTN said it had agreed to sell its 49% holdings in Ghana Tower Interco B.V. and Uganda

Tower Interco B.V. to AT Sher Netherlands Coöperatief U.A. for \$523 million.

The sale is expected to close in Q1 2020 leaving MTN with a profit of 6 billion rand (\$425.74 million).

The company also said it had finalized the redemption of

MTN Nigeria preference shares, raising \$315 million.

MTN said it will use the proceeds to pay down its U.S. dollar-denominated debt and for general corporate purposes.

"We remain focused on continuing to execute on the important strategic priorities of

reducing debt, simplifying the portfolio and reducing risk," the firm said in a statement.

The company is aiming to shed loss-making e-commerce assets and exit countries where it has no prospect of reaching the top-two spots in terms of market share. (Reuters)

Xiaomi to invest \$7bn in 5G, AI, IoT over next five years

Chinese smartphone maker Xiaomi Corp will invest more than 50 billion Yuan (\$7.18 billion) in artificial intelligence and fifth generation internet technologies over the next five years, as competition in the sector grows.

Xiaomi Chief Executive Lei Jun made the announcement in a letter posted on the company's social media account on Thursday, but did not provide specific investment details.

"We need to turn our continuous advantage we have in AIoT and intelligent life into absolute victory in intelligent full scene, and completely cement our king status in the smart era," Lei said, using the acronym for artificial intelligence of things, a reference to a combination of AI and internet technologies.

The announced investment increases Xiaomi's pledge made last year to invest 10 billion yuan over five years in an "All in AIoT" strategy.

The Beijing-based company started as an affordable cellphone maker but its internet-enabled products now include smart TVs and rice-cookers.

However, Xiaomi also faces intense competition in its home market from rival Huawei Technologies, which captured a record 42% of China's smartphone market in the third quarter at the expense of other local manufacturers and Apple.

Lei announced in October the company planned to launch more than 10 5G phone models in 2020. (Reuters)

Dollar recovers from six-month low after year-end selloff

The dollar recovered from a six-month low to add 0.44% on Thursday, the first trading day of 2020, ending a four-day losing streak and a downbeat December that had left the index virtually flat at the end of 2019.

Trading is likely to remain thin until Tuesday, when most European countries open after Monday's Epiphany holiday but market players will be relieved that the dollar navigated the holiday period without experiencing the money market squeezes many had feared.

The dollar index slumped 0.4% on New Year Eve as large banks took only a small portion of the \$150 billion offered by the U.S. Federal Reserve's overnight repo operation and borrowing costs fell to the lowest level since

March 2018.

While worries remain that there could be a repeat of last January's so-called flash crash, when massive stop-loss selling swept through holiday-thinned currency markets driving the Japanese yen up dramatically against the Australian and U.S. dollars, analysts said the Fed's liquidity injections had reduced the risk.

"The liquidity squeeze didn't materialize so that's contributing to stability in broader financial markets," said Lee Hardman, senior FX strategist at MUFG.

"But the dollar story has been turning negative in recent months, partly because of action taken by the Fed to ease dollar liquidity," Hardman said, referring to the U.S. central

bank's balance sheet expansion relaunched in October.

Having ended December almost 2% lower against a basket of currencies, the dollar index inched up to 96.805 .DXY while against the euro, it was at \$1.117, knocking the single currency from its highest level since early August of \$1.125.

The dollar index ended the year virtually flat, after a fall in December erased the greenback's outperformance for most of 2019. December's drop was primarily attributable to lower demand for the dollar as a safe-haven asset as trade tensions with China eased and global growth prospects picked up.

Investors are now waiting for the U.S. ISM manufacturing

survey due on Friday. Across much of Asia and Europe, final purchasing managers' indexes painted a slightly brighter picture, with French, German and euro zone readings a touch better than advance PMIs. But they also confirmed an 11th straight month of contracting euro zone activity.

The euro slipped 0.33%, having strengthened 1.8% against the dollar last month. However, euro zone bond yields extended their rise and inflation expectations rose to the highest since July.

U.S. President Donald Trump said on Tuesday that Phase 1 of a trade deal with China would be signed on Jan. 15 at the White House. Markets are awaiting further details. (Reuters)

Tesla will start delivering China-made Model 3s to public Tuesday

Tesla Inc will deliver its first China-made Model 3 sedans to the public on Tuesday at an event at its Shanghai plant, a representative for the firm told Reuters yesterday. The Shanghai plant is part of the Silicon Valley automaker's plans to bolster its presence in the world's biggest auto market and minimize the impact of the U.S.-China trade war.

Fifteen Tesla employees who had purchased the car were the

first to take delivery on Monday after the first China-made vehicles rolled off the plant's production line in October.

The deliveries come a year after construction of Tesla's only plant outside the United States began. Production started in October with a target of 250,000 vehicles per year once the Model Y is added to the line-up. "As Model 3s roll off Tesla's Chinese manufacturing facility with local subsidies intact, we

believe the U.S.-based focus will need to shift globally for the company," Canaccord Genuity analyst Jed Dorsheimer wrote in a note to clients. China will be an important market for the company in 2020, said Dorsheimer, who raised his price target on Tesla to \$515, the second-highest on Wall Street.

The Model 3 is priced at 355,800 Yuan (\$50,000) before subsidies. Tesla said previously that it wanted to start deliveries

before the Chinese New Year beginning Jan. 25. Tesla's China general manager, Wang Hao, said the company plans to ramp up Model 3 deliveries in January.

Tesla executives also told reporters the plant had achieved a production target of 1,000 units per week, or around 280 cars a day, and that sales for the China-made sedan had so far been "very good".

Hao had said the company will double the number of

service centers and fast charging stations in China in 2020.

Shares of Tesla, which is expected to report its fourth-quarter delivery numbers in the next few days, rose 1.1% to \$422.88 in premarket trading.

The stock, which touched a record high of \$435.31 last week, has had a strong run in recent months on the back of posting a rare profit in the latest quarter and news of China ramp up. (Reuters)

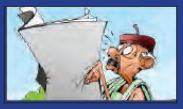

2019: A mixed year for pension and pensioners

The year 2019 has come and gone, forever. But the good things and challenges it brought to pension and pensioners while it lasted will linger on for a while. Examples of those good things and challenges are narrated below.

First, the good things: the payment of the entitlements of the staff of the privatised Nigerian Airways workers by the Federal Government was a good one. Indeed, it was so good that when the Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) was reviewing its successes in 2019 mentioned it together with the minimum wage as some of the many reasons for labour's commendation of the Muhammadu Buhari-led administration.

Labour and pensioners will continue to have reasons to commend the President given what he said about them in his New Year (2020) address: "Workers will have a living wage and pensioners will be looked after. We are steadily clearing pensions and benefits arrears neglected for so long."

The verification and biometrics capture of retirees in its care by the Pension Transitional Arrangement Directorate (PTAD) in their homes and sick-beds, and subsequent payments of their stipends, was emotionally touching. It is a good way to demonstrate love and respect for the elderly in our society.

The payment of their pensions by PTAD contrasts sharply with when retirees pursuing pensions slept in the streets in downtown Abuja. Some of them died, ironically, in the vicinity of the Three-Arms Zone. They were practically abandoned by the former unfeeling managers of the Defined Benefit system.

The nascent Micro Pension Plan (MPP) for the self-employed, small businesses, freelance journalists, artisans and an assortment of workers in the "informal sector" is in line with the need to reduce old-age penury among these categories of Nigeria's economic players.

The main objective of the Micro Pension Plan of giving financial security to subscribers when they retire from their businesses, makes it a humane project.

Its flexibility through access to contingent fund in savers' Retirement Savings Accounts (RSAs) will cushion the turbulence in the world of small and self-employed businesses, which can swing from a torrent of cash inflow to an occasional trifle, or even zero, daily earning.

Enrolment in the MPP is so far slow and low at less than 40, 000 due to certain factors including its voluntary nature, poor awareness of its potential benefits, faulty marketing by the National Pension Commission and Pension Fund Administrators and, mistrust for the financial services sector by the segment of the population it is primarily designed to serve.

Another good news regarding pension and pensioners is the growth of the pension fund under the Contributory Pension Scheme (CPS) to around N10 trillion by the end of 2019. The expanding contributor-base is also good.

The "challenges" or bad things for pension and pensioners in 2019 include the persistent refusal by the 36 state governments to embrace the Contributory Pension Scheme fully. The elements for full implementation are enacting a law establishing and creating an institution to manage pension; regular contributions by the employee and employer; the timely remittance of the total contribution to appropriate PFAs, and the provision of group insurance cover to workers in the states.

The failure of the state governments to implement the CPS fully and pay their pensioners on the Defined Benefit (DB) scheme regularly is painful.

The case of Benue state is so pathetic. The state Governor recently told a foreign radio station that he cannot source the money required to pay the pension arrears.

The failure of Union Bank Plc to remit N76.7 billion to the Retirement Savings Accounts of its 900 retirees has led to a class action against the bank at the National Industrial Court. They want the court to order the Bank to remit the N76.7bn and N13.7bn accrued interest to their RSAs. All relevant agencies should support the retirees in this struggle.

PenCom lists roles of pension contributors, employers for CPS

The National Pension Commission (PenCom) has said those in pension enrolment under the various Pension Fund Administrators (PFAs) have roles to play in the success of the Contributory Pension Scheme (CPS) this year.

The Commission itemized the six key role and responsibilities of the pension contributors in a recent publication.

The contributor is expected to ensure that he or she receives quarterly statements of the Retirement Savings Account (RSA) from the PFA. They can also report the non-remittance or incomplete remittance of their monthly pension contributions to PenCom for onward action.

Periodic review of the RSA statement is important for the contributors so that they

can check the performance of their fund. This is because their fund is put into various investments and it out to bring in some yields which grow the fund.

A contributor should ensure that he does not open more than one RSA as this could cause conflict in the long run especially on reconciling remittances and is a breach of the pension contribution objectives.

Pension contributors should verify that their employer is making complete monthly remittance to their RSA. This responsibility is not limited to the employee alone but it is also that of the employer to check that routinely to ensure compliance.

The contributor should also verify that the employer has subscribed to a Group Life Insurance policy for that contributor and ensure that the premium is being paid annually consistent with relevant laws.

Inflation: Expert offers tips for protecting pension accounts

In this piece which he wrote for the forbes.com, he hinted on how pension contributors can protect their Retirement Savings Account (RSA) from inflation.

You will want to avoid putting all of your eggs in a basket of certificates of deposit or shares in a money market account.

There are times when the rate of inflation is so high, it's unlikely your nest egg will avoid taking a hit. During the 1970s and early 80s, there were several years that saw inflation rates in excess of 10%. It would have been difficult to see your investments grow much under those conditions.

However, under relatively normal inflation, there are options that can help you maintain or grow your purchasing power over time.

What to do!

Get the match

If you're enrolled in a workplace retirement plan, your employer might offer a match. Many employers will match the first 6% of an employee's salary each year. 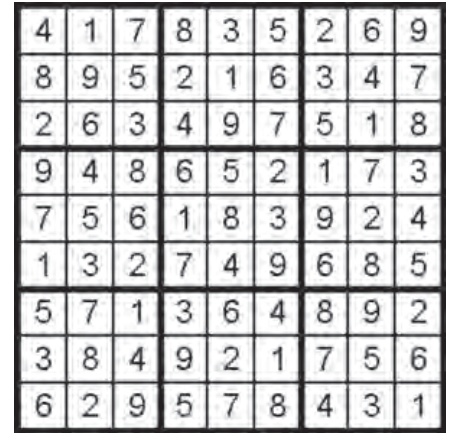

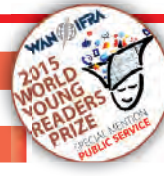

21-year-old Sa'adiya Samaila is one of the Community Oriented Resource Persons (CORPs) trained by UNICEF in Bauchi State to provide free medical services.

The services are carried out under the Integrated Community Case Management (ICCM) of children illnesses including malaria, diarrhoea and pneumonia with working kits, tools and commodities necessary for easy diagnosis and treatment of children in her community in Dass LGA.

Sa'adiya, who is nursing her second child, is a resident of Dalan, a settlement at the volcanic pit in Dass.

In an encounter with

Youthville, she said the project, which started two years ago, had offered her the opportunity to know about the medical profession, and also exposed her to some medical procedures aimed at saving the lives of people.

"I am very happy to be part of the UNICEF free medical services to support children in our villages because the outreach has reduced a lot of things including casualties of children as a result of diseases.

"Parents that are unwilling to take their children to the hospital for treatment because of bad road as you have to pay N500 for motorcycle to transport you to health facility, have now gotten the solution," she said.

Her excitement is more about how she is contributing her part to the society. "My greatest joy is that I am contributing my quota in alleviating the suffering of our community. This project, I believe, has

been of great impact on all of us, especially myself, because it has restored my dream of becoming a doctor.

"I only attended junior secondary school in Dass LGA and got married, but God willing, if I get the opportunity to further my education I want to become a medical doctor.

"If I get the support from anywhere or even agencies like UNICEF and other corporate groups, I will actualise my dream of becoming a doctor," Sa'adiya said.

On the prevalence of diseases in the settlement, she said it is close to a river and is a breeding place for mosquitoes with high rate of malaria especially among children.

"This job has made me prominent in the village and the surrounding settlements; my name has gone where because the services have yielded positive results. Everybody calls me doctor and that tag is firing my spirit, the nickname is touching my life," she said.

IOM, stakeholders campaign on youth migration

Worried by the challenges faced by illegal migrants seeking better future abroad, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and other stakeholders in Edo State have launched a multimedia campaign to help youths make informed migration-related decisions.

The project called WAKA Well (WAKA is a pidgin word meaning move) was recently launched in Oredo and Ikpoba Okha, two LGAs of the state.

It aims to prevent exploitation associated with irregular migration by empowering Nigerian youth to make informed migration-related decisions.

An IOM study conducted in September 2019 in Oredo and Ikpoba Okha, reveals that 58 percent of the 419 respondents aged between 13 and 40 have not heard or seen information on the dangers of irregular migration in the last year.

A lack of access to accurate and trustworthy information, both online and in-person, on regular migration options and the available opportunities in Nigeria were identified as key knowledge gaps.

"WAKA Well by IOM X includes a video highlighting migration experiences and individual definitions of success," said Abraham Tamrat, IOM Nigeria Programme Manager. "The videos were created and validated through a process which brought together relevant stakeholders, including government and civil society partners from Oredo and Ikpoba Okha between August and December."

Edo state alone accounts for 42 percent of the 18,079 stranded migrants received by IOM and the Federal Government of Nigeria from April 2017 to October 2019.

Minister wants adherence to youth parliament

Several parents take advantage of schools to keep their children busy while they attend to their careers. School vacations, therefore, present to some challenges of how to successfully combine that with the home front.

As schools are set to resume from the four-week-long vacation, some parents said they relied on their family and relatives for the care of their children because the vacation coincides with the festive period. So teachers that engage in extramural classes would also want to spend the season with their families.

"Teachers also would want to spend the holidays," Mrs N. Modesty said. Modesty, whose husband operates evening classes for students



in Lokogoma, Abuja, said, "I would want my husband to also spend time with the family."

Another parent who simply identified herself as Alhaja Kuburat said she took her children to her home state, Kwara, to spend the yuletide

with their grandparents.

"This is an opportunity for them to get to know their grandparents and also understand the local language. My siblings also brought home their children. It is more like integration. They got to see their cousins and share several

stories while I also saw my siblings that I have not seen for some time," she said.

Alhaja Kuburat, however, said because of her job, as a civil servant, she was unable to spend the entire holidays with the children but was able to join them in Ilorin before the New Year.

While Kuburat visited her home-state, Mr Joseph Bamigboye made plans to invite his parents to Abuja.

He said his sister and father would be coming over to spend the festive season as such his wife, a civil servant, needed not to worry about their children. He said his father would want to spend time with his grandchildren while his sister enjoyed the company of her nephews.

"By so doing, they would be babysitting the children while my wife and I attend to our

office work. We return home together in the evening.

"During Christmas, we had fun going to Children Zoo, Millennium Park and other fun spots," he said.

Mrs Mariam Afolayan, another civil servant, said she applied for her leave from the office as such had time to care for her children. She said her children were already of age and even with or without the vacation they are old enough to care for themselves.

"It is just two of my children that are in school. They are in secondary school so the elderly ones take care of them. I left them in Abuja while my husband and I travelled home," she said.

She said with the leave that she applied for, they had the opportunity of travelling home to their hometown in Kwara State.

Co-created content

New start for children who survived abduction

Fati (name changed to protect identity) smiles, waving as the van pulls out of the transit centre in which she has stayed for two months. After being held for three years by a Boko Haram faction in northeast Nigeria, she is finally going home to her family.

Not so long ago, she feared she might not ever see them again.

In 2015, then 14-year-old Fati was shopping for dinner at a market with her mother. But that afternoon, her life took a tragic turn: an armed group attacked the market, abducting all the girls and killing most of the men.

Fati and the other girls were taken to the Sambisa Forest, where the Boko Haram faction is said to be based. There, she joined the many other girls who had been abducted in raids by the group.

Food was minimal – the girls ate just one meal of instant noodles a day. They were locked

in a mud hut and only allowed out to use the bathroom.

One morning, they were asked to bathe, and then to line up. A group of men came and chose wives.

"I refused. I did not want to be married; definitely not to a man I did not know," Fati says.

Fati was flogged 100 times for her refusal, and dumped in a room with 20 or so others who had also refused to be married.

The men eventually returned and told her she was to be married, but again she refused, along with two other girls. The three girls were flogged again and thrown back into the hut.

Later, the girls were approached for a different reason: they were to become suicide bombers.

Fati did not understand the connection between the vest, the button and God. She decided not to push the button and watched as her two friends detonated themselves at the



military checkpoint, killing two soldiers. She raised her hands and told the soldiers she also had a bomb, but did not want to detonate it. The soldiers helped her remove it and took her to a military detention facility. Fati's case is not unusual. The conflict in northeast Nigeria has seen non-state armed groups

regularly use children as suicide bombers. In 2017, 146 children (mainly girls) were used as human bombs. In the first six months of 2018, 43 children were used in this way.

Fati is one of more than 200 children taken into administrative custody before eventually being cleared of ties

with armed groups and released. These children were sent to a UNICEF-supported transit centre in August 2018, where they were provided medical and psychosocial support, learning and life skills.

UNICEF was also able to locate Fati's family. Some three years after being taken, Fati and her mother were reunited at the transit centre.

"When I saw her, I cried," Fati says. "I never thought this day would come. My mother was crying too. We could not speak – we cried for a long time."

As Fati reflects on returning to her community, she's full of hope and optimism. "When I get home, the first thing I want is to eat my mother's pepper soup and then go and register in school," she says, smiling. And while Fati has undoubtedly been changed forever by the ordeal, she has not allowed her dreams to be taken from her – including one of becoming a teacher.

3 killed, 6 injured in Abuja-Lokoja road crash

According to the witness, the man and two children died on the spot, while six others sustained injuries and were

taken to hospital.

When contacted, Abaji unit commander of the Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC), ACC Olasupo Esuruoso, confirmed the accident which he attributed to mechanical

deficiency and speed limit violation. He said three corpses were deposited at Abaji General Hospital morgue, adding that the six injured victims were also taken to the same hospital for treatment.

Wuse market traffic: AMML to adopt automated tolling system

Abuja Markets Management Limited, Managers of Wuse Market, has said it will provide solution to the perennial traffic challenge within and around the market soon.

The market managers were responding to a letter from the Ministerial Task Team on Traffic, which was signed by the chairman, Mr Ikharo Attah, urging them to take a bold and speedy step to address the menace.

A letter addressed to the task team by the Managing Director, Abuja Markets Management Limited

(AMML), Abubakar Usman Faruk, indicated that provision of automated tolling system at the market's gate would eliminate the traffic.

He said they were already at the verge of eliminating the traffic gridlock even before the request from the task team was made.

Faruk said: "We are aware of the status of Wuse market as the shopping destination of choice in the FCT and the expected traffic challenge that comes with it. As a leading facility management company in the country, we couldn't have folded our arms and allowed this very key service

delivery issue to linger."

The market managers said it had in the past, applied various manual traffic management approaches even in collaboration with some relevant agencies but that the pressure did not abate.

"After a long period of consultation with our key stakeholders, we are now introducing technology to the parking/traffic management by first automating the access and tolling processes" they added.

Noting that this process was already about 70 percent completed before the observation of the task

team, AMML assured that the automated tolling system would be rolled out in matter of weeks.

"When this takes off, we intend to programme the parking software in such a manner that people who park cars in the market for the whole day would be discouraged from doing so", the letter read.

It added: "That to us, is the most sustainable strategy that can guarantee free flow of traffic in and out of the market since parking space as a fixed factor, cannot be increased endlessly to match increasing demand".

Man, 40, sentenced to 10 years imprisonment for burglary

An Ekiti State High Court, sitting in Ado-Ekiti, yesterday sentenced a 40-year-old man, Akeem Bakare, to 10 years imprisonment for burglary.

Justice Lekan Ogunmoye held that the prosecution had proven the case of burglary preferred against Bakare beyond reasonable doubt.

Justice Ogunmoye, who didn't offer the convict any option of fine, said he was being lenient with the sentence as the accused person was a first-time offender.

According to the Ekiti State Director of Public Prosecution, Mr Gbemiga Adaramola, Bakare committed the offence on or about December 31, 2017 at Road 6, Ifesowapo Street and the

Better Life area of Ado Ekiti.

The prosecution told that court that the accused person unlawfully broke into the house of one Mulikat Arogunmati.

To prove his case, Adaramola called four witnesses and tendered exhibits that included a cutlass, a cap, two big stones and the victim's statement made to the police.

Bakare, who was led in evidence by his counsel, Mr Adekunle Ojo, called no witness during the trial.

Ojo pleaded with the court to temper justice with mercy as his client was committing a criminal offence for the first time. The convict was first arraigned in court on November 7, 2018 when the charge was read and interpreted to him, but he pleaded not guilty.

Four die, others injured in Lagos-Ibadan expressway crash

Four persons yesterday died while four others sustained various degrees of injury when a truck carrying yam crashed at the pipeline junction, Ogere, on the Lagos-Ibadan expressway.

Daily Trust gathered that the accident, which occurred in the early hours of yesterday at about 4.30am, involved a Man Diesel truck with registration number TKP 653 XA.

The Public Relations Officer, Ogun State Traffic Compliance and Enforcement Corps (TRACE), Babatunde Akinbiyi, confirmed the incident to newsmen in Abeokuta, the Ogun State capital, yesterday.

Akinbiyi stated that the accident involved 14 people, comprising 13 male and one female. Four of the men died, while four other men sustained injuries.

"The vehicle was coming from the North in-bound Lagos, loaded with yams. The casualty figure was high because some of the passengers, who were also likely owners of the yam, were sitting on the yam in the open space at the back.

"The driver lost control of the vehicle due to excessive speeding and poor visibility and fell on its side, with the yam and vehicle falling on some of the passengers," he said.

The corpses of the deceased, the spokesman added, had been deposited at the FOS mortuary, Ipara, Remo, while the injured were taken to Idera Hospital, Sagamu.

Akinbiyi implored drivers to ensure proper maintenance of their vehicles and avoid speeding, especially at night and during the harmattan season when visibility would be poor.

Lagos moves to optimise independent power plant output

The Lagos State governor, Mr Babajide Sanwo-Olu, yesterday disclosed his administration's plan to expand the capacity of the state-owned independent power plant (IPP).

Sanwo-Olu said his administration would be harnessing private investment to boost the output of the IPP in response to the growing need to sustain his predecessor's 'Light-Up Lagos' project.

The governor disclosed this during a facility inspection

of the IPP in Alausa, which is being managed on behalf of the government by Alausa Power Limited.

"We considered embarking on this facility inspection of the Lagos IPP to see how we will optimise the current usage of the plant early this year, given the growing demand for electricity to power public facilities around.

"Knowing the current output of the power plant is necessary for us to decide what kind of investment is required to solve the operational issues and upscale the output. When the IPP was built in 2013,

it boosted the capacity of government's offices in Alausa and helps us in our Light-Up Lagos project. But there is a need for us to expand the services for more coverage," he said.

Saying the current output could no longer meet the demand of the state, Sanwo-Olu said the inspection tour would be followed up with a meeting with partners on the IPP initiative to discuss sustainable growth plan on the output, as more government's facilities were set to be integrated into the power grid.

Lagos will invest heavily in transportation in 2020 - Sanwo-Olu

The Lagos State government has stated it would be prioritising investment in critical infrastructure this year with a new vigour.

The governor of the state, Mr Babajide Sanwo-Olu, in a statement yesterday from his Chief Press Secretary, Gboyega Akosile, said his administration would renew its focus on waterways and rail transportation in the current year.

The objective, Sanwo-olu explained, was to disperse traffic on the roads and give commuters a new choice in mass movement across the state.

The governor said that with the signing of the state's N1.168 trillion 2020 budget into law last Tuesday, his administration had been statutorily emboldened to fully tap into the potential of its waterways and rail corridors by pursuing fresh investment and partnerships that would help the government deliver an inter-modal transportation model.

He said, "Lagos is endowed with a large body of water that has been under-exploited over the years. This is why we have challenged ourselves to invest in channel. Work will begin to happen on our waterways and the Lagos State Waterways Authority (LASWA) has been saddled with this responsibility.

"In terms of the pace of work going on our Blue Line Rail project, which stretches from Okokomaiko to Marina, we expect the work to pick up and get Phase 1 of it completed for operations. Also, construction work will commence on the Red Line that will stretch from Agege to Ebute Meta, this year."

Sanwo-Olu disclosed that the Lagos State Public Works (LSPW) had been complementing his administration's infrastructural renewal programme with persistent rehabilitation works on existing roads to ease flow of traffic on feeder roads. The repair work, he stressed, would continue across the state.

Why I can't resign as APC chair – Oshiomhole

The National Chairman of the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC), Comrade Adams Aliyu Oshiomhole, said yesterday that his accomplishments since assuming the mantle of leadership in 2018 did not deserve the call for his resignation.

Oshiomhole said this yesterday at the Presidential Villa, Abuja, shortly after presenting a card to celebrate the 2020 New Year to President Muhammadu Buhari.

He was accompanied by the Party's National Publicity Secretary, Malam Lanre Issa-Onilu and National Vice Chairman (North Central), Alh. Sulaiman Wambai.

The former President of the Nigeria Labour Congress (NLC) wondered why some people would demand his resignation in spite of the electoral successes recorded before and after the 2019 general elections.

He said the National Working Committee (NWC) under his leadership reclaimed Ekiti State and retained Osun State before the 2019 general elections.

Oshiomhole said President Buhari also garnered more votes to defeat his challenger in the 2019 presidential election than in 2015, stressing that "we would like to claim credit for that because if it went the other way, we would be crucified."

He added that the party's national leadership was able to ensure that its preferred candidates for leadership positions in the National Assembly were elected contrary to what happened in 2015 when the APC's majority in the legislature was rendered useless because of the emergence of Senator Ike Ekweremadu from PDP as Deputy Senate President.

Oshiomhole wondered how some people would be calling for his head one week after recording significant victories in Kogi and Bayelsa States.

He said, "You also know this proverb, 'It's a tree that bears fruits that attracts stone.' You hardly see people throwing stone at a dry tree, palm tree. But if you see a mango tree, when it is its season, people throw stones at it when passing. I think that is my lot. But my report card is also very clear. You, my comrades, should

also help in interrogating the process, how a performance of a National Working Committee of a political part should be evaluated. But I think the evaluation should start mostly, how many elections did you lose?"

"I think there was somebody who wrote something in Kano that while the APC gave financial support; we gave financial support from our own resources, the PDP didn't give kobo to any of their candidates. But we did that for the first time. We didn't do it in 2015. I can point to a lot of innovations that we have brought on board.

"The reward for hard work is even more work. Those who are determined to criticize you, don't ever deceive yourself that you have done well, they will stop. But I think for me, that is an incentive to recognize that we must continue to think creatively and see to it that we are able to manage the party. I am very confident that our party is stronger today than it was before I became the chairman," he said this when asked to react to the call on him to resign because of the feud between him and Governor Godwin Obaseki of Edo State.

Race for 2023 presidency begins as Bode George indicates interest

The race for the 2023 presidency may have begun in earnest as a former Deputy National Chairman of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP), Chief Bode George, has indicated interest in the number one position in the land.

Though the PDP leader in Lagos is yet to formally announce his intention, some of his supporters and close aides have started mobilising for him.

Feelers told our correspondent yesterday that George is strongly interested in the race.

In fact, a new group known as the Pathfinder Consortium emerged yesterday ostensibly to champion the ambition of George, who was one-time PDP Vice-Chairman in the South-West, Deputy National Chairman (South) and Deputy National Chairman in the PDP headquarters.

The group is led by Prince Uthman Shodipe-Dosumu, a Special Adviser to Bode George, as Director-General.

It would be recalled that George indicated interest to be the National Chairman of the party during the last convention of the party where Prince Uche Secondus emerged as the party's Chairman.

With President Muhammadu Buhari, a Northerner, completing his eight-year tenure in 2023, there has been strong nationwide clamour for the zoning of the presidency to the South.

The PDP also hinted recently it was shopping for a consensus candidate to fly the party's flag in 2023.

Also in Lagos, several groups and stakeholders have started clamouring for the National Leader of the All Progressives Congress (APC), Asiwaju Bola Tinubu for the 2023 presidency.

Shodipe-Dosumu in a statement yesterday tagged: "2023: The Pathfinder is coming", said a "pathfinder" who is believed to be Chief Bode George "is already warming up."

The statement read: "The big game is afoot. The Grandmasters are now at the chessboard. The maneuverings are deepening in thoughtful articulations and firm, deliberate commitment.

"The schemings are widening far beyond the bright and the nocturnal passages. It is settled!

"Our visions stripped of ethnic or sectarian articulations. It is about rebuilding the broken walls, rectifying the festering wrongs, healing the persisting wounds.

"The Pathfinder is warming up...Serious business! Watch out! Link up with a New Beginning! Be a part of a New Vision!

"We are aroused with a bold, audacious and redeeming leadership. We will engage, inform without derogatory withdrawal.

"We will challenge, debate, instruct without angry, expletive crudity. We will sustain and affirm in deliberate Churchillian supremacy.

"Pretenders and the perennial time-servers shall disappear from the fray. Only the robust and the lucid patriotic band shall endure.

"And the dark, disruptive uncertainties shall cease, giving way to a renewal and a rebirth of democratic contention. Soon, very soon, we will unveil the Big Masquerade."

How Ogun commissioners' list sparks off fresh controversy in APC

An 18 - man commissioners' list transmitted to Ogun State House of Assembly by Governor Dapo Abiodun has sharply divided the ruling All Progressives Congress in the state, Daily Trust reports.

When the Governor of Ogun State, Dapo Abiodun, at different fora, promised to run "all inclusive government", little did he know that the move would land him in a troubled water. If he knew, perhaps, he didn't envisage the controversy that has trailed the list of commissioners compiled in the first year of his government.

Abiodun's victory at March 9 polls was a product of multi-parties alliance. And this was in spite of being a candidate of the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC). Shortly after the poll, Abiodun set up a transition committee, comprising party leaders from the APC, the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP), the African Democratic Congress (ADC) and the Social Democratic Party (SDP), apparently setting the tone for his planned "inclusive government."

The move was largely seen as payback to the opposition parties.

But watchers of Ogun politics have dismissed the promise, ab initio. Abiodun himself admitted about three months into his government that his party men were constituting a clog in the wheel of progress.

"I want to be the most inclusive governor this State has ever had. I have extended a hand of fellowship to members of the opposition parties, especially those that we contested together to join hands with me in taking the State to greater height.

"But I know that some people in our party are not favourably disposed to my decision to run a participatory government... they are saying, what manner of inclusiveness is that?," the governor had told journalists.

For seven months now, the governor has been battling with diverse political blocs over "who takes what" in his cabinet. He held series of meetings both with his party leaders and leaders of the

opposition, who obviously want to take "their share" in government.

Interestingly, his delay in appointment of commissioners was one of the yardsticks with which political pundits have rated his style of governance as "slow."

Finally, he Abiodun sent an 18 - man Commissioner - nominees' list to Ogun State House of Assembly for screening and confirmation. The list, expectedly, raised the dust over the alleged sidelining of some political blocs in the appointment.

Insiders told our correspondent that the list was exactly what the aggrieved political blocs need to vent their anger against Abiodun and his government. Besides, women group also viewed the appointment, which conceded only two slots to womenfolk as "unacceptable."

Some APC chieftains loyal to former Governor Olusegun Osoba were first set of political blocs who threw caution into the wind by rejecting the nominees' list.

The controversial list did not represent Abiodun's proclamation that "he will run all inclusive government in Ogun State," they submitted.

The loyalists under the aegis of "Osoba Political

Family", in a strongly worded statement, said some individuals "who are conservatively greedy business men and hijackers of power" had succeeded in hijacking the soul of Abiodun - led administration. The statement was jointly signed by Otunba Ayo Martins and 23 others.

"Osoba Political Family has patiently observed the activities of these individuals who are conservatively greedy business men and hijackers of power who have succeeded in hijacking the soul of the present administration in Ogun State.

"These power manipulators were part of past government in Ogun State that people in their wisdom rejected but stealthily walked back into the realm of government through the calm approach to governance by Prince Dapo Abiodun and are ready to wreck further havoc to the dreams and aspirations of the Progressives in the APC and the State who worked tirelessly for the emergence of the Governor," they said in the statement.

Continuing, they said "We also want to remind the governor that the all-inclusive government promise has not taken the Osoba Political Family into

consideration in the past and present appointments made, as there are loyal, distinguished, qualified and experienced persons in the Osoba Political Family.

However, the group called on the National Chairman of the APC, Adams Oshiomhole, former Governor of Lagos State, Asiwaju Bola Tinubu to prevail on Abiodun to "do the needful and correct the imbalance perceived so far in Ogun State."

While the dust raised by the "Osoba Political Family" is yet to settle, the Senator representing Ogun West at the National Assembly, Tolu Odebiyi, threw his weight behind them.

In a statement titled "Before we lose it all, let's stop the drifting," and personally signed by Odebiyi, a former Chief of Staff, described Abiodun's commissioners' list as an attempt to exclude people who suffered for his emergence as the APC candidate and his eventual victory during the election.

The senator warned Abiodun to reverse the commissioners' list in the interest of the state.

"It is unfortunate that things are drifting apart in our party, the APC in Ogun State. We are daily frittering the massive goodwill of the party men and women

who toiled day and night to ensure our success in the face of daunting political opposition and uncertainty which confronted us before the 2019 general elections.

"For some of us who, against all odds, supported the APC, at the precipice of losing our political goodwill and that of our forebears, it leaves a sour taste in our mouths.

"At the risk of being physically attacked by some of our constituents for sticking by our party and showing loyalty, because they felt we should do otherwise.

"We were insulted and called names. Nevertheless, we were not only undeterred but also unwavering and unflagging. We worked hard to ensure the success of our party at the polls.

"Why then is the government we laboured to install being run in exclusion of those that worked for the success of the party?," Odebiyi asked.

Scores of women in Ogun State also stormed the governor's office and the State House of Assembly complex to turn down the list.

Speaking on behalf of the Coalition of women in Ogun state, the convener, Dr Abiola Akiyode, said the women rejected the list submitted by the governor

on the ground that there is only 11.5 per cent women representation.

Akiyode argued that the governor had refused to fulfill his promise of 50 per cent women representation in his cabinet.

She described the list as an affront to women in the state, adding that the women of the state were angry with the governor.

"Gbenga Daniel had about 37 per cent women representation in his governance and Ibikunle Amosun appointed like 45 per cent of women.

"We were shocked to see the list the governor sent to the House of Assembly and we think this is an affront looking at our contribution to his emergence," she said.

Despite torrent of rejection and controversies, the APC in the state, defended Abiodun's list and described the rejection and protests as a distraction to both the party and the government.

The Publicity Secretary of the APC Caretaker Committee, Tunde Oladunjoye, in a statement issued, said the composition was based on the lists of nominees sent by the party leaders to the Governor.

According to him, the conclusion reached at the party's caucus meeting, on Friday, October 11 was that every leader of the party in each Federal Constituency should forward the list of candidates to be considered by the Governor as Commissioners.

Oladunjoye said, contrary to some peoples' views that the list was lopsided, investigation by the party revealed that majority of the party members were satisfied with the list.

"We plead with the few who may have misgivings or have not made the list, to allow the expressed will of the party leaders to prevail. It is too early for divisiveness and distractions," the statement read.

However, the rejection and protest could not deter members of Ogun State Assembly House of Assembly who had screened and confirmed 17 out of 18 commissioner - nominees. However, one of them, Dr Tomi Coker, failed to appear during the screening.

SOMALIA

Demonstrations in Mogadishu over bomb attack

Hundreds of people have attended a local government-organised protest against militant group al-Shabab in Somalia's capital, Mogadishu.

The demonstration comes after the militants killed more than 80 people in a bomb attack on Saturday. On Monday, the group apologised for the attack and offered condolences to victims' families.

The UN and African Union-backed government is battling al-Shabab for control of the country.

Saturday's blast took place at a checkpoint at a busy intersection in the capital and was one of the deadliest the militants have carried out.

The protest was organised by Mogadishu's local administration and was held at the secure General Kahiye police academy.

The demonstrators carried placards with slogans demanding unity and warning that "those who kill our brothers, will also want to kill us".

SYRIA

Artillery fire kills nine at school in rebel-held Idlib

Syrian government artillery fire killed nine people, including five children, in opposition-held Idlib province on Wednesday, first responders say.

Sixteen others were injured when cluster munitions hit a school in Sarmin which was sheltering displaced people, according to the White Helmets.

It came as pro-government forces continued an offensive to the south.

Idlib is the last major region still held by rebel fighters and jihadists opposed to President Bashar al-Assad.

The United Nations says the hostilities are having devastating consequences for the three million people living there, of whom 76% are women and children.

A ceasefire halted a government assault on Idlib in August that had reportedly left more than 1,000 people dead and displaced an estimated 400,000 others.

However, skirmishes and bombardments continued and on 19 December fighting resumed along the frontlines in the south of the province.

LEBANON

Govt receives Interpol arrest warrant for Ghosn

Lebanon has received an Interpol arrest warrant for former Nissan boss turned international fugitive Carlos Ghosn, while Turkey launched an investigation on Thursday into his daring escape from Japan via Istanbul.

The Interpol red notice, which calls on authorities to arrest a wanted person, was received by Lebanon's internal security forces and has yet to be referred to the judiciary, a Lebanese judicial source told Reuters News Agency.

The former Nissan boss revealed on Tuesday that he had fled to Lebanon to escape

what he called a "rigged" justice system in Japan, where he faces charges relating to alleged financial crimes.

Sources close to Ghosn said a delay in a trial and a strict ban on communicating with his wife motivated him to go ahead with a plan to use a private security company to smuggle him out of Japan via private jet.

A senior Lebanese security official said it was not yet clear if Ghosn would be summoned for questioning over the Interpol warrant but said Lebanon does not extradite its citizens to foreign states.

ETHIOPIA

Curbs on political gatherings relaxed with new anti-terror law

Ethiopia's parliament on Thursday passed an anti-terrorism law that relaxed restrictions on political gatherings, broadening reforms introduced under Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed.

The legislation repealed the 2009 anti-terrorism law that said staging gatherings that could cause "serious interference or disruption of any public services" was an act of terrorism.

The new legislation states: "If the disruption of public services was caused by a legally recognized protest,

meetings or job strikes, the act will not be taken as a terrorist act."

Since coming to power in 2018, Abiy has implemented a series of reforms that have reshaped public life in Ethiopia.

He made peace with Eritrea, freed political prisoners, and is opening up the economy to foreign investment by loosening state control.

The country is due to hold a general election this year, which will test the popularity of Abiy's reforms.

TURKEY

Turkish MPs vote to send troops to Libya

Turkey's parliament has passed a bill that will allow the government to deploy troops to Libya to intervene in the civil war. Turkish lawmakers passed the bill on Thursday, with 325 in favour to 184 against.

Turkey is allied with Libya's UN-backed government, which is based in the capital, Tripoli.

The Libyan government has been fighting an insurgency by forces under Gen Khalifa Haftar, based in eastern Libya.

Egypt, which backs Gen Haftar, condemned Turkey's vote, saying it would "negatively affect the stability of the Mediterranean region".

Last week, Turkish President

Recep Tayyip Erdogan said he would seek parliamentary approval to provide military assistance following a request by the Tripoli government.

The bill allows for the deployment of non-combat troops, to act as advisers and trainers for government forces against Gen Haftar.

AUSTRALIA

Angry residents berate PM Morrison in blaze-ravaged town

Australia's PM Scott Morrison had to cut short a visit to a town ravaged by fire after angry locals heckled him over the government's response.

Locals said he had done very little to help Cobargo in New South Wales (NSW), where two people died earlier this week and many lost their homes.

The PM said he was "not surprised people are feeling very raw". NSW's premier has declared a week-long state of emergency in response to the escalating bushfire threat.

Since September, bushfires have killed 18 people and destroyed more than 1,200 homes across NSW and

neighbouring Victoria. At least 17 people remain missing after fires this week alone.

Thousands of people are already fleeing a vast "tourist leave zone" in NSW, with supplies running low in some cut-off towns. It's been called "the largest relocation out of the region ever".

BELGIUM

Court suspends extradition of ex-Catalan leader

A Brussels court has suspended the extradition of former Catalan pro-independence leader Carles Puigdemont, his lawyer said on Thursday.

Paul Beckaert told Reuters that the Belgian judge in charge of the case had ruled in favor of Puigdemont and Toni Comin, another former

member of the Catalan government, citing their immunity as members of the European Parliament (MEPs).

The Belgian federal prosecutor's office was not immediately available for comment.

The pair are wanted in Spain on charges of sedition after

organizing a failed Catalan independence referendum in 2017 but Madrid's three previous extradition requests have been refused.

Another Catalan leader and MEP, former vice-president Oriol Junqueras, is serving a prison sentence for his role in the banned referendum.

KENYA

Three killed in bus attack

Three people have been killed after a bus was attacked in Kenya close to the Somali border, local officials say. Two others were injured and are being treated at local clinics. The bus was travelling from Mombasa and was targeted in Lamu county when heavily armed men stopped it and sprayed it with bullets.

The gunmen have not been identified, but the Somalia-based al-Shabab militant group has carried out a number of attacks in the country. Local authorities say security forces are pursuing the attackers, who fled the scene.

Kenya has troops in Somalia supporting the UN-backed government in its fight against al-Shabab.

TAIWAN

Top general killed in helicopter crash

Taiwan's top general has been confirmed dead after a helicopter made an emergency landing in northern Taiwan, the defence ministry has said, just days before the island goes to polls to elect a new president.

Chief of general staff General Shen Yi-ming and seven other people were killed after the UH-60M Black Hawk helicopter crashed in mountains near Taipei on Thursday, according to defence ministry spokesman Shih Shun-wen.

Shen, 62, and several top military officials were on a routine mission to visit soldiers in the northeast Yilan county before the lunar new year later this month.

SOUTH SUDAN

President Kiir pardons dozens of prisoners

South Sudan's President Salva Kiir on Thursday pardoned dozens of prisoners including a prominent economist jailed for giving interviews to foreign media, saying it was a goodwill gesture to rejuvenate the country's stalled peace process.

In June 2019, economist Peter Biar Ajak was sentenced to two years in jail for disturbing the peace because he gave interviews to foreign media after he was arrested on treason charges that were subsequently dropped.

State TV South Sudan Broadcasting Corporation (HSBC) said a total of 31 people had been pardoned.

A Muslim fast-food worker has shared a video she claimed shows her boss sending her home for turning up to work in a hijab.

Folake Adebola shared the 45-second clip on Twitter Monday of a confrontation with her boss at a Chicken Express restaurant in Fort Worth, Dallas, United States.

In the video, she could be heard remonstrating with her boss, saying: "It's a part of my religion. I felt like if I work here you all could be able to (accommodate) my religion."

But Adebola's unnamed boss answers by telling her the headscarf was "a different thing... that's a part of your personal life out there."

He insisted that asking her not to wear her hijab was "nothing to do with religion."

The clip ends with Adebola failing to reach a resolution with her boss, as she told him that she would continue to wear the head covering.

She later shared another clip where a man could be heard

insisting that the hijab was "not part of the uniform."

She later wrote: "I converted to Islam not too long ago and I started wearing my hijab, I went to work today and was kicked out because my hijab was not part of the 'dress code' apparently and I wasn't allowed to wear it. "Don't come to the chicken express in Fort Worth!! This is discrimination at its finest! I will not tolerate this at all." Chicken Express refused to comment when contacted about the videos. 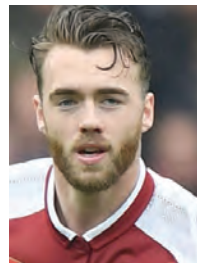

I have to be more clinical, says Chelsea star Pulisic

Christian Pulisic says he and his Chelsea team-mates have to develop a killer instinct in front of goal if they are to stop dropping points as they did against Brighton on Wednesday.

The 21-year-old United States captain

missed three gilt-edged chances in the 1-1 draw - though ultimately it was not too costly in terms of the race for Champions League places as both Manchester United and Tottenham Hotspur lost.

Fourth-placed Chelsea have a five-point advantage over United while Spurs and Wolverhampton Wanderers are a further point adrift.

However, Pulisic, who has

scored five times in his first season with Chelsea since his £58 million transfer (\$76 million) from Borussia Dortmund, says Chelsea must put right their lack of accuracy when chances pop up.

"We said at half-time that we had the chance to kill the game and we just weren't able to," said Pulisic.

"We couldn't get the goal and in the end, they found an

unbelievable goal.

"So now it is about doing a bit more to keep going, attack and create chances and just have that killer instinct. Just a little bit of that, we are missing that."

Pulisic, who earlier in the season became the youngest Chelsea player to score a hat-trick in the 4-2 win over Burnley, says he is as much to blame as the others.

Dare pledges four football stadia by May

The Minister of Youth and Sports, Sunday Dare, has said four football pitches of international standard will be built and completed before the end of the first quarter of year 2020.

The minister in his New Year message via his twitter said that talks were ongoing with a state government and some corporate players on how to revitalize the Obafemi Awolowo Stadium in Ibadan formerly known as Liberty Stadium.

The federation's Acting President, Olamide George, in a statement signed by the Head of

Media, Dare Esan, said that the federation has learnt from the mistakes made since the current board was inaugurated and will put all supporting structures in place this year to ensure a proper and sustainable growth for the sport.

"The era of square pegs finding unmerited home in round holes is over. The AFN will be governed by its constitution and international best practice.

"It was the total disregard for this that made us objects of international ridicule right from the Commonwealth Games in the Gold Coast, Australia in 2018 where we ran foul of an international freeze on change of allegiance to the embarrassment in Doha at the World Championships in the last quarter of last year, when Blessing Okagbare and Divine Oduduru were initially disqualified from the championships just because

somebody failed to discharge his responsibility," said George, a former member of the Ondo State House of Assembly.

"Never again will it happen where Nigeria will be stripped of medals won by her athletes at international championship/games because those saddled with the responsibilities to ensure proper things are done displayed uncommon incompetence," he said.

Ronaldo owns the most expensive Rolex ever produced

The case and bracelet are made from 18K white gold, and the 13mm thick case can is waterproof to 330 feet.

While most of the surface is covered in brilliant-cut diamonds, the bezel is set with dazzling baguette-cut diamonds to create a subtle geometric contrast.

Khaka to stay at Arsenal, says Arteta

Arsenal coach Mikel Arteta has said Granit Khaka will stay at the club after the Swiss midfielder produced a gritty performance to help his side to a 2-0 win over Manchester United on Wednesday.

Khaka was in the firing line earlier in the season after he reacted furiously to fans booing him when he was substituted in a 2-2 draw at home to Crystal Palace in October.

The incident led to him being stripped of the captaincy and also saw him left out of the side by Arteta's predecessor Unai Emery for a month.

Khaka has started six of Arsenal's last eight league games but British newspaper The Times reported on Tuesday that he was looking to leave in the January transfer window, saying the 27-year-old was targeting a move to Bundesliga side Hertha Berlin.

Arteta, however, said the midfielder has told him he wants to remain in north London, also praising him for his performance against United, which was Arsenal's first win in five matches and took them up to 10th in the standings.

"I think he's going to stay. I really like him. If we get him on board he can be a tremendous player for the football club," the Spanish coach told a news conference.

"I love the way he is, the way he lives his profession. He is a great football player. Today he was excellent at cutting out passes and he made a lot of great passes. I like how focused he is, he's willing to learn."

Vidal bonus dispute clouds Barca's derby preparations

La Liga leaders Barcelona will be looking to preserve their two-point lead over Real Madrid when they visit local rivals Espanyol on Saturday but their preparations have been hit by a legal battle with their own midfielder Arturo Vidal.

The Chilean's lawyers filed a complaint to Spain's player's union (AFE) last month citing an unpaid bonus of 2.4 million euros (2.04 million pounds), news of which emerged while the player was back in his homeland during the league's winter break.

Barca have declined to comment on the complaint, while Vidal has said it's an issue for his representatives but has declared it is "unfair" he has not received all of the 4.1 million euros his people believe he is owed in total in appearance bonuses.

Vidal has only started four of Barca's 18 league games this season, making 10 substitute's appearances, and was left out of the line-up for the club's biggest matches against Atletico Madrid and Real Madrid.

Ancelotti aiming to upset Liverpool once again

When Carlo Ancelotti took over at Everton last month, the Italian already had an eye on Sunday's FA Cup third round Merseyside derby against runaway English Premier League (EPL) leaders Liverpool.

Ancelotti, at his previous club Napoli, managed to do what no other manager in England has achieved this season - beat Juergen Klopp's side.

Liverpool lost 2-0 in Naples in the UEFA Champions League in September and followed that up with a 1-1 draw in the return game at Anfield.

That was the only time the Reds have not won at home this season.

The only other defeat for Liverpool this season came in the EFL Cup when the club were forced to play a youth team against Aston Villa.

This was due to their first team being on duty at the Club World Cup in Qatar.

"The Evertonians know my record against Liverpool, they will be happy with this," Ancelotti said when he was unveiled as manager.

"It's a big rivalry here and a big motivation for us. I have a really good relationship with Juergen Klopp. It is always exciting playing against them."

"Of course, I have beaten them, but they are not used to losing. It was a good day for me. I know how much Evertonians want to beat Liverpool."

"It's not mission impossible, nothing is impossible in football," he added.

Tokyo Olympics: Use 1992 Yugoslavia precedent for Russians, historian advises

Clean Russian athletes should be allowed to compete in individual events at this year's Tokyo Games under the banner of "Independent Olympic Participants", historian Bill Mallon suggests.

It is a designation used for athletes from Yugoslavia in 1992.

It is also one which Mallon thinks offers a good road map of how to issue Russia a meaningful punishment without imposing a blanket ban.

The 1992 designation was for what was then known as the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, composed of Serbia and Montenegro after the break-up of socialist Yugoslavia.

This was due to its role as aggressor in the Balkan war.

Russia's potential ban from Tokyo, this time around, stems from doping violations.

Some Russian athletes were allowed to compete at the 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Games under the designation "Olympic Athlete from Russia".

It was a punishment by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) for "systematic manipulation" of the anti-doping system in Sochi four years previously.

"But the semi-ban in 2018 did not go far enough, because of the explicit reference to Russia in the official designation," says Mallon, a past president of the International Society of Olympic Historians.

The World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has banned Russia from Tokyo as punishment for manipulating doping tests.

But it has left the door open for clean athletes to compete if they meet rigid criteria laid out by the agency.

Although Russia's circumstances are different from Yugoslavia's, Mallon thinks it is timely to dust off the playbook used to handle the situation 28 years ago and occasionally since.

"If it was up to me, I think they should do what they did in '92 with Yugoslavia," he said in a phone interview with Reuters.

2020, Nigeria and the West Africa challenge

West Africa is undergoing a very difficult phase in its evolution. A report just published by the International Crisis Group draws attention to the spectre of jihadism haunting the whole region. Islamism militancy has been growing dramatically in Burkina Faso which is emerging as a terrorist corridor linking the Sahel to the coastal states of Benin, Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana and Togo. The terrorists, it would be recalled struck Côte d'Ivoire in March 2016. The ICG report points out that the jihadist groups are advancing toward the south and east of Burkina Faso, approaching the Gulf of Guinea states. On November 7 2019, an attack on a convoy of workers from the Boungou gold mine, which killed at least 38 people, confirmed their presence in the east of the country, bordering Benin and Togo. Burkinabé security forces also recently intervened in the region of Pô, a town bordering Ghana in the south east of the country, killing six individuals suspected of terrorism.

In 2012, terrorist groups took over Northern Mali and would have marched to and taken over the capital, Bamako but for the intervention of French troops. There have been a number of attacks on the border between Mali and Côte d'Ivoire. The jihadist group - Islamic State in the Greater Sahara (ISGS) appears to be trying to open a corridor from northern Mali to north-western Nigeria and northern Benin, passing through the Nigerian town of Dogondoutchi. Meanwhile, there are reports that the Islamic State in West Africa Province (ISWAP), a group that emerged out of Boko Haram, is poised to move into the security conundrum that has emerged out of the growth of rural banditry in Zamfara creating the possibility of building bridges with the increasingly active groups operating in Niger.

In a video dated November 8 2018, three leaders of a terrorist coalition affiliated with al-Qarda - the Group to Support Islam and Muslims (GSIM) — Iyad Ag Ghali, Djamel Okacha and Amadou Koufa, called on the Fulani people who are found all over the Sahel and West Africa to "pursue jihad". The specifically called for action in Senegal, Benin, Côte d'Ivoire, Ghana and Cameroon. Meanwhile, the Jihadi groups have been regularly attacking army formations in Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger. The same is happening further to the east with Boko Haran and ISWAP attacking the military in the Lake Chad Basin countries of Nigeria, Niger, Cameroon and Chad. What is happening is that the attacks are increasing over a wide area suggesting that the core strategy of the terrorists

is that of decentralization making it difficult for national security agencies and international forces to cope with their activities. They have moved into deprived rural areas which have virtually no State presence.

Meanwhile, the basic strategy within West Africa appears to be to prevent coordination in tackling the menace of terrorism. There is an assumption that everyone knows has no basis that Islamic terrorism will remain a Sahelian phenomenon. It was on this basis that the G5 Sahel Joint Force (Burkina Faso, Mali, Mauritania, Niger and Chad) was conceived. This assumes that the jihadist threat would expand horizontally, crossing the western Sahel from east to west and remaining there. Meanwhile, what is emerging is also a vertical march towards the south and teaming up with Boko Haram in North East Nigeria. The G5 has not even taken off in its operations and its clearly too narrow an approach to contain the situation. What is clear is that France insists on this narrow definition of the terrorist threat.

From the very beginning, efforts should have been coordinated at the level of ECOWAS. The problem is that ECOWAS has neither the vision nor the leadership to play an effective role. The deep Francophone/Anglophone divide within the organisation remains an important constraint. It has blocked the development of greater coordination; better intelligence gathering and sharing; and more effective border controls, which will require tackling the corruption that is rife in many customs services and police forces.

A new front of discord has emerged in the region on the economic front. Nigeria has closed its borders with its neighbours since August last year to control smuggling. This has caused serious concerns in Cameroon, Niger, Benin, Togo and Ghana. The establishment of the West African currency, which is programmed to be launched this year has become another divisive issue. This year, the 30-year struggle for a West African currency might not happen as planned.

On the 21st of December 2019, President Alasane Ouattara of Cote d'Ivoire together with his French counterpart, President Macron announced that the 8 West African countries using the CFA Franc currency would adopt the Eco as their new currency this year. The announcement was done the same day ECOWAS met and took the momentous decision to adopt the Eco, also this year. Clearly, the involvement of France poses the risk of breaking up the Eco. France is very keen to take over the

responsibility of establishing and even printing the new currency and presents the other countries in the region with a fait accompli. Although France has said it would relinquish its position on the board of the CFA Central Bank and the requirement of depositing 50% of a member country's foreign reserve with the French treasury, it is clear that they are seeking to establish a controlling influence over the Eco.

It is true that the long delay in establishing the Eco has been caused by the inability of the 15 ECOWAS countries to meet the convergence criteria they set for themselves, notably; that the inflation rate of less than 5 percent is maintained, a budget deficit of not more than 3 percent of GDP and that each country has enough foreign reserves to cover at least 3 months of imports. We note that after failing to meet these conditions over the past two decades, the eight countries have now adopted the currency without meeting them. This means sound economic principles has been set aside for political reasons. On 28th December, Ghana announced that it was considering joining the 8 countries but would prefer a flexible exchange rate regime, implying it was not keen on pegging the Eco to the Euro. There has been silence on the Nigerian end until the 30th of December when the Ministry of Finance, Budget and National Planning issued a press release informing Nigerians that Government was studying the situation and would soon issue its position.

The most important element of the on-going West African crisis is that Nigeria has essentially abdicated its leadership role built on the lives of our soldiers that fought to defend Liberia and Sierra Leone. Nigeria needs to reinvent its leadership role on both the security and economic fronts. On the new currency, the 8 CFA countries cannot be a vanguard for monetary integration in West Africa when they account for only 21% of West Africa's GDP and 32% of the region's population. Nigeria alone accounts for about 66% of ECOWAS's GDP and 55% of its population. Nigeria therefore has to play a leadership role in the establishment of Eco just as Germany played the anchor role in establishing the Euro.

The adoption of the Eco provides Nigeria a golden opportunity to lead the sub region. This would require greater coordination between the different arms of Government particularly the Presidency, Central Bank, Ministry of Finance, Budget and Planning, the academia, the Business Community, the press and civil society organisations. Eco can only be built on the basis of strict adherence to the convergence criteria laid down by ECOWAS's West African Monetary Institute. Starting the Eco system without adherence to the convergence criteria poses enormous risk of Eco's sustainability and international credibility. Nigeria should break out of its silence and immediately make it clear to ECOWAS members that third parties from outside the region cannot play a leadership role in establishing Eco.
